## Plains Independent School District

From The Superintendent's Desk



Now that we are about to complete the first six weeks of school it seems appropriate to update our community on the statistics concerning Plains I.S.D. The following information is published in a brochure each year and is made available to those persons with an interest in our school district

Plains I.S.D. has an area of 599 square miles with an assessed valuation of $\$ 846,757,826.00$. Our school tax rate is $\$ 0.34$ per $\$ 100.00$ valuation which results in a revenue of $\$ 2,967,745.00-92 \%$ of our total revenues. State funds provide $\$ 115,900.00$, approximately $3.5 \%$, and Federal funds $\$ 135,145.00$ approximately $4.5 \%$. Of the $92 \%$ generated by local taxes, $95 \%$ are mineral and $5 \%$ property taxes. The $1986-87$ budget is $\$ 3,603,147.00,65 \%$ is allocated for in istruction costs, $14 \%$ for maintenance, $10 \%$ for administration, $7 \%$ 'for food services and 4\% for transportation.

Of the 85 persons employed by Plains Schools, seven are administrators, forty-six are teachers, six clerical, eight aides, ten maintenance and transportation and eight food service employees. Our food service ladies served 77,274 lunches last year and 23,715 breakfasts. The transportation department operates and maintains sixteen buses and twelve other vehicles including two tractors. Our six daily bus routes travel a yearly total of 148,651 miles. In addition our buses travel a total of 57,943 activity miles (sports, industrial arts, FHA, etc.) yearly. The ten Plains I.S.D. maintenance and grounds personnel maintain all buildings and grounds in the 23.4 acre campus.

Our forty-six teachers guide and teach an average of 510 pupils, 123 in High School, 163 in Junior High School and 224 in Elementary School. The average yearly cost of educating each student is $\$ 7,065.00$. Plains I.S.D. pays professional persons $\$ 7,000.00$ above the state recommended salary base. The monthly payroll is \$187,913.00.

Plains Independent School District's Board of Trustees and administrators spend many hours in budget planning each year as they seek to use tax dollars to the best advantage for students and patrons.
