Federal Government Threatens To Close Tokio Post Office

The Yoakum County Chapter of Texas Farmers Union held its December meeting at Johnnie's Restaurant in Plains. The new officers elected to serve in 1987 are: President, Ty Earl Powell; first vice-president, Dan Wall; second vice-president, Darrell Barron and secretary-treasurer, Linda Lowrey. The group also elected delegates to the 1987 State Convention which will be held in Austin Jan. 29-31. Delegates are Melvin and Linda Lowrey. Alternates are Carl Lowrey and Dan Wall.

The invocation was delivered by special guest, Reverend Ken Peterson, of Plains First United Methodist Church. Linda Lowrey reported that she is serving on the Policy Drafting Committee which will present a proposed policy statement to the 1987 delegate assembly in Austin. She mentioned that the organization will again take a strong position in favor of retaining the current homestead protection for Texans.

Several members expressed concern because the federal government is threatening to close the Tokio

Post Office. The following resolution was unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, the rural farming communities of our state and nation have historically provided their neighbors with an abundance of quality food and fiber; and

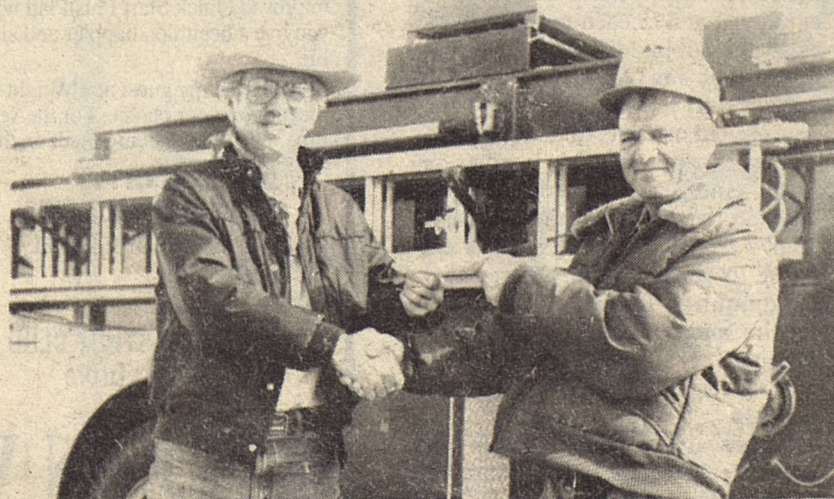
WHEREAS, government services have been provided to nurture and enhance the quality of life in rural America, and

WHEREAS, none of these services is more important to the continued vitality of a rural community than an effective, convenient postal system,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED,

That the Yoakum County Chapter of Texas Farmers Union urges the United States Government (1) to continue full postal services to the citizens of Tokio, Texas, and (2) to reject any proposed reduction of services to the taxpayers of rural America because the rural communities are essential to the preservation of a strong America.

Copies of the resolution will be mailed to members of Congress.

Ty Earl Powell announced that the next meeting will be held on a February date in the evening. Texas Farmers Union is a general farm organization whose primary purpose is to save the family farm, to preserve our rural communities, and to work with other farm organizations to accomplish a fair and effective farm program. The annual dues are either \$45 or \$60, depending on the method of payment. Farm families interested in joining are urged to contact one of the new officers.

Commissioners' Court

Yoakum County Commissioners Court met in special session Dec. 29. All members were present.

Resignation of A.J. Fowler was accepted effective Dec. 15. Mike McClure and Weldon Jones were employed at \$75 each per month to clean the jail building in Denver City effective Jan. 1.

The court set 10 a.m. Dec. 31 for new elected officials to take oaths of office and approve their bonds.

An emergency was declared to amend the budget and transfer \$5,077 from Precinct 2, vehicle expense to general fund/Denver City Community Building for roof repairs and to transfer \$567 from Precinct 1, vehicle expense to general fund/Yoakum County Park expense.

Approval was given a motion to advertise to receive bids to purchase a loader for Precinct 3 with bids to be received Jan. 19.

Bills were read and approved for payment.

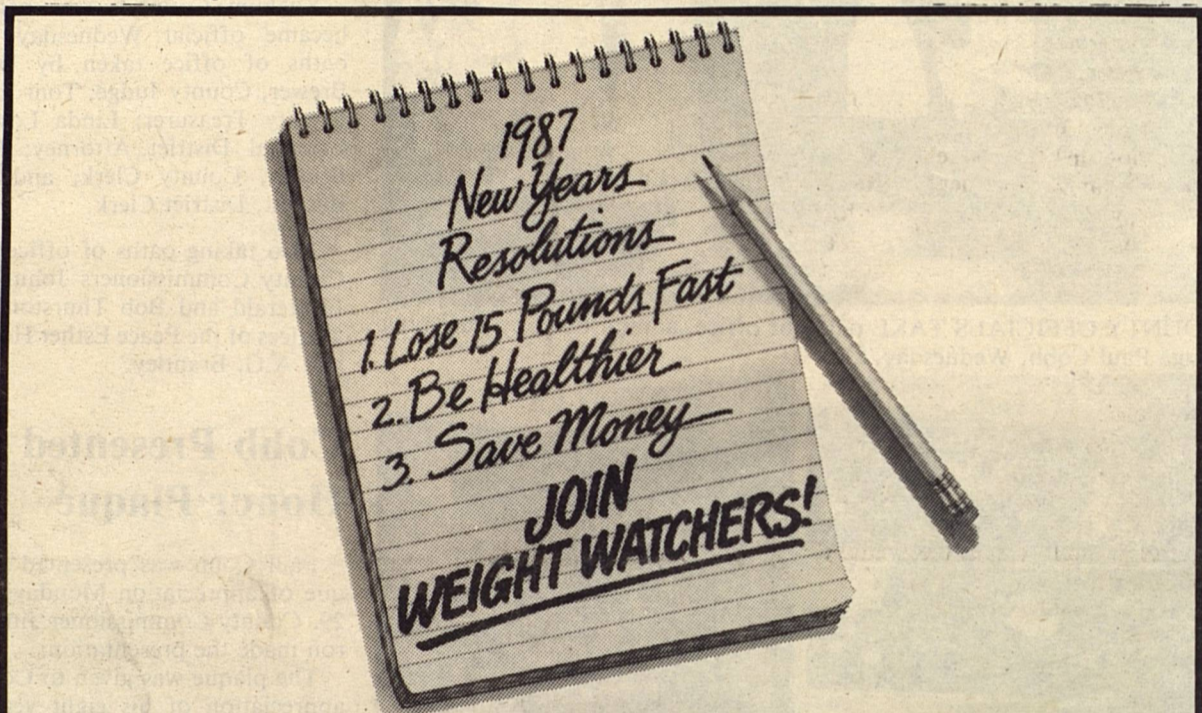

'Deaths Decline In Texas' Says American Heart Assoc.

Heart disease is still the number one killer in Texas and the United States. In 1985, heart disease claimed 51,539 lives in Texas. That accounts for 43.6 percent of all deaths in the state.

During the last 31 years, the percent of deaths attributed to heart disease slowly rose, peaked in the early sixties and then slowly decreased to its current new low. In 1966, over half of all deaths were caused by heart disease.

"The American Heart Association credits this dramatic turnaround to an increased public awareness of heart-healthy lifestyle habits, increased efforts in prevention, and innovations in diagnosis and treatment of heart disease," says Addison A. Taylor, M.D., President of the Texas Affiliate of the American Heart Association. "However," Dr. Taylor says, "it is not possible to determine whether the decline in death rate reflects a reduction in the frequency of attacks, or an improvement in life expectancy after an attack, or both."

AHA computations using Texas Department of Health vital statistics show that 51,539 people died of heart and blood vessel diseases in 1985.

Of those deaths, diseases of the heart accounted for 40,079 deaths; hypertension 367 deaths; cerebrovascular disease 8,793 deaths; and atherosclerosis 1,278 deaths. Diseases of the arteries, arterioles and capillaries caused 1,022 deaths.

Approximately 10,976 (26.8 percent) of all deaths from cardiovascular diseases in Texas occurred in persons under the age of 65. The AHA defines death prior to age 65 as premature.

Despite the common misconception of heart disease striking mostly men, 26,238 victims were male and 25,301 were female.

"We believe that heart disease is largely preventable," says Dr.

Taylor. "And in that belief, we work toward the prevention of premature death and disability due to cardiovascular disease, including heart attack and stroke."

The underlying cause of heart disease is atherosclerosis -- a build-up of fatty deposits on the blood vessel walls that restricts and blocks the flow of blood. Studies indicate that elevated blood cholesterol levels, smoking and high blood pressure all contribute to the risk of developing atherosclerosis.

SPC To Offer Various Courses

A variety of courses which offer entry level training skills will be offered beginning in January at South Plains College.

Courses are non-credit and enrollment can be completed by mail, according to Mary Rooker, associate dean and director of continuing education at SPC-Lubbock.

Courses include air conditioning maintenance, 6:30-10 p.m. Mondays and Wednesdays for 12 weeks beginning Jan. 19, \$120 fee plus book, designed for those who want to troubleshoot and repair home air conditioning equipment; beginning office worker, 9 a.m.-noon for 16 weeks beginning Jan. 17; graphoanalysis (handwriting analysis), 6-8 p.m. for eight weeks beginning Jan. 19, \$40 fee, introduction to the study of handwriting as a tool that can be used for assessment of personality traits.

Medication administration for nursing home aides will meet 5:30-8:30 p.m. Tuesdays and Thursdays beginning Jan. 8, which provides Texas Department of health-regulated training limited to nurse aides in nursing homes who are high school graduates or have a general education development (GED). Fee is \$150 plus book.

Home health aides will meet 8:30 a.m.-3 p.m. Saturdays for eight weeks beginning Jan. 24. Fee is \$125 plus book. This 100-hour course, which is followed by a week of training with a home health agency, leads to a certificate which qualifies a person to work for home health agencies caring for homebound patients.

Intermediate construction will meet Mondays and Thursdays for six weeks, beginning in January. Cost is \$35 plus books and materials. This course is excellent for those interested in preparing for advanced careers in construction estimation and scheduling.

Secretarial refresher meets 6-9 p.m. Mondays and Wednesdays for eight weeks beginning Jan. 19. Cost is \$75 plus book. Skill building in typewriting, and an introduction to 10-key calculator and word processing will be included.

Ward Clerk/Unit Secretary class will begin Jan. 19 with a fee of \$125 plus book. The 100-hour class is designed to train persons to manage a ward office in a hospital. High school graduation and good language skills are necessary.

Word processing will meet 9 a.m.-noon Saturdays for six weeks, beginning Jan. 17. Fee is \$75 plus book and disk. The class is an introduction to word processing on a micro-computer. Wordstar software is used to learn to process various office correspondence and records on a desktop-type computer. Computer operation is taught but typing ability is a pre-requisite. IBM-compatible personal computers are provided for each student.

Courses which pertain to the licensure of insurance agents, counselors, food service personnel and others also are scheduled this semester. For more information, contact SPC's Continuing Education Office at 747-0576, ext. 618.
