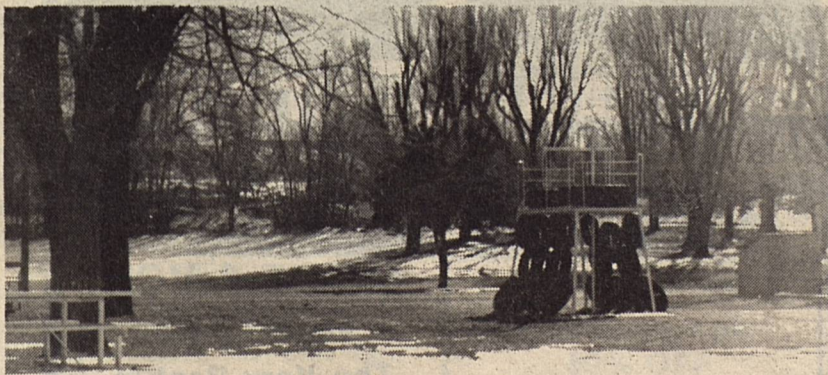

Firemen Answer Calls To Trailer Home, Gin

Plains Volunteer Firemen were called Tuesday to extinguish a fire in the trailer home of Paul Vasquez.

Heavy smoke damage resulted of the fire that was contained mostly in a back bedroom.

Nancy Whittaker, sister-in-law of Gloria Vasquez, had come to the Vasquez home to pick up her children. She ran to the Gene Wauson home in search of a fire extinguisher to put out the fire that started from a heater.

Wauson ran to the trailer but realized he could not extinguish the fire without help. He pulled Mrs. Vasquez, who had collapsed in the kitchen, from the trailer and then closed doors and windows in the trailer to help contain the fire.

When firemen arrived at the fire, they discovered the fire plug was frozen but they were fortunate in having enough water on the truck to stop the fire. Commissioners John-

nie L. Fitzgerald and Jim Barron had water ready in the event it was needed.

Wauson said "We were lucky to contain the fire because 90 percent of the trailers that catch on fire are a total loss." He states that it is important that persons get out of trailers in the event of fire because of deadly gases produced by burning materials and trailer contents.

Mrs. Vasquez was taken by ambulance to hospital in Denver City and released later that night. Mr. and Mrs. Vasquez are staying with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Richard Garcia.

Wednesday, the department was called to a cotton fire at Co-op Gin, west of town. With the WEPS unit received last summer from the Forest Service, they were able to extinguish the fire quickly. The WEPS unit is especially effective in fighting cotton fires.

Yoakum County Commissioners Court met at 10 a.m. Monday with all members present.

Jerry Corbin, city attorney of Denver City, submitted first draft of a Hold Harmless Agreement for the court's consideration. A work session will be held later to consider the agreement.

Bids were opened for a loader for precinct 3. Bids were submitted by Yellowhouse Machinery, \$38,000; Waukesha-Pearce Industries Inc., \$49,500; and West Texas Equipment, \$62,039. The bid from Yellow House Machinery was accepted.

Miscellaneous bills and extra hire were read and approved for payment.

A revised and updated version of Guidelines and Eligibility Requirements for Indigent Care was introduced by Judge Dallas Brewer in reference to the Grievance Petition filed by Texas Rural Legal Aid, Inc. The revised guidelines were adopted and the old guidelines included in the minutes.

County Auditor Hazel Lowrey met with the court to call attention to the need for an Agent Registrar for the hospital bonds. She stated that Financial Advisor Joe Smith had offered to contact various banks for proposals regarding their capacity to act as a bond registrar. The court voted to have Smith contact various banks including local banking institutes, in reference to acting as agent registrar.

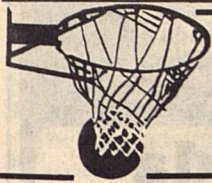

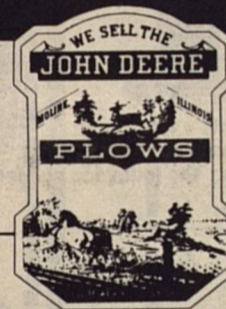
