Plains Resident's Free Time Literally 'For The Birds'

Some folks enjoy the hunt of gamebirds. For Plainsman Hershel Smith, the pleasure is in raising them. He has pursued this interest three years, getting involved initially by a co-worker, Royce Randall.

Impressed with Randall's set up for raising birds, Smith decided to get involved in the fascinating hobby. At present, he has three varieties of pheasants, the Ringneck, Silver and Golden. He has two varieties of quails, the Blue Scale and Gambel.

Smith was recently contacted by a representative of the State Government about raising a new strain of pheasant. Called the Afghan Cross, it is similar to the Ringneck but is heartier and better suited to the West Texas climate.

Anyone interested in raising the new strain or in stocking them on their land may contact Smith for information on obtaining them.

Enjoying his free time evenings with his flock of gamebirds, Smith says the hobby is a family affair that

includes his wife, Debbie and their sons, 12-year-old Jason, and eightyear-old Luke. His boys enjoy getting into the pens and have managed to tame some of the birds the family has raised.

Parents of junior and senior students need to be aware that there is a growing practice with profitmaking organizations, of contacting parents of college-bound students with offers of guaranteed student loans, grants and scholarships, according to Plains I.S.D. Superintendent Dean Andrews.

"It is important to realize that these services usually have costs attached. Some insurance companies offer guaranteed student loans, but have tied high premium life insurance policies to them. Some technical schools with very expensive tuition have recruited students in their homes. It is wise to be cautious," warns Andrews, "when considering unsolicited offers."

South Plains **Schedules Exam**

Commissioners' Court

Commissioners Court of Yoakum County gathered in special session Monday. All members were present. James Sage's name was drawn to

replace Armida Ybarra as a member of the Grievance Committee for 1987. Ybarra refused to serve.

Yoakum County Golf Club's income and expense statement for 1987 was introduced and reviewed. It was approved as submitted.

County Auditor Hazel Lowrey read a letter from Washington National Insurance Company advising the Court that authorization from two members of Commissioners Court was necessary in order to surrender the policies and pay the cash value to Yoakum County as policy owner. The needed authorization was approved.

Judge Dallas Brewer read correspondence from Texas Department of Public Safety, Division of Emergency Management, stating that Yoakum County has been declared as a contiguous county for USDA assistance.


The court voted permission to MCI Telecommunications Corporation to cross county roads providing all caliche and paved roads be bored and those not bored be restored to their original condition to a depth of 42 inches below the bottom of the barrow ditch.

A motion to advertise for bids to sell the Service Officer's previous county station wagon was approved. Bids will be opened Feb. 16.

Walter Pate, representing Pate and Associates Architects-Planners Inc., appeared before the Court stating his firm would proceed with the first phase (systematic design) of planning for the new county hospital. The phase will take about two to three months at approximately \$30,000. Payment will be deferred until after bonds are sold.

Judge Brewer read a letter from Texas Department of Health reporting public drinking water supply at the County Park and Golf Course is in general compliance with state statutes and department regulations.

Johnnie Fitzgerald was appointed as Judge Pro Tem for the next special session of the court.



'Spending Plan' Tips Given By Extensionist

Going over last year's receipts, cancelled checks, W-2 forms and other papers to get ready for tax time is never much fun. But it's even more bothersome when it creates some nagging doubts about how well last year's income was spent, according to Mary D. Williams, Yoakum County Extension Agent.

You might avoid the problem next year by establishing a family spending plan for 1987 while the year is still young. Whether you have a lot of money or a little, a sound plan for spending is the key to having dollars for what is need and wanted before the money disappears in unexpected ways.

It's fairly simple to set up a spending plan. First calculate your 1987 income from all sources. Then, while you've got all your 1986 financial records out, use them to estimate your expenses for next year. period, and how much you should set aside in savings to meet irregular bills and unexpected expenses.

Having a spending plan also allows you to "bill" yourself for a certain amount each pay period which can go into savings to meet long-term financial goals. That goal might be a downpayment for a new house or car, college expenses, a vacation or a retirement nest egg.

It takes practice and patience in keeping financial records so that you can use fairly accurate amounts for planning rather than estimates. But good records can help you see where you might want to cut your spending plan in some areas and increase it in others.

We have a number of Extension publications which contain worksheet and logs to help keep track of family spending. There is a letter series -- "Mastering Money Management" available. Call the



If you were to ask someone my age or older, "What comes to mind when you see the word "ENTER", they would probably say it is a sign over a door inviting you to go through. A younger person though might have a much different answer. Soon all young people will recognize the word "ENTER" as being the command in computer operations that enables the hardware to operate.

Several people have seen and asked about the 10' satellite dish on the southeast corner of the high school gymnasium. This dish is an essential part of the TI-IN (Texas Interactive Instructional Network) system for receiving educational programs for instruction in our school. This satellite dish combined with the computers already in our school allows us access to a vast amount of information. This means of communication was almost unheard of five years ago and is now a reality in our school. Many good things will come through this system. We will receive two educational stations but no H.B.O. or other controversial programming.

Our high school students will be able to take many advanced courses for credit such as computer mathematics, calculus, computer science, creative writing, trigonometry, French, German, Latin and many others. Programs are also available to assist students in preparation for TEAMS testing, ACT and SAT testing, as well as basic skills. Our junior high and elementary students will be able to participate in basic skill booster programs. TEAMS testing information and enrichment courses will also be available for these students.

Our community will also be able to participate through our community education program. Courses available will include college level courses in English, small business computer accounting and micro-computers for agriculturalists.

Our teachers will be able to receive inservice training in areas of developing writing in the elementary grades, drug abuse prevention, varying instructional strategies, teaching reading as thinking, and many more.

The Texas Education Agency has scheduled three and one half hours weekly to discuss various problems facing education and strategies for meeting the needs of students in these changing times. The mandates of curriculum changes are causing schools to seek new ways to meet the needs of their students. I don't think we are extreme, but just maybe a step ahead in trying to give our students and staff an even sharper edge. Our staff is doing an excellent job of teaching and is continuously getting better.

Next meet was Saturday in Andrews. Last year Plains students won the sweepstakes trophy at Andrews.




Allsup's Training Course Is Completed By Wallace






