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From The Superintendent's Desk
I am asked many questions each day about our school and why we must do things in certain ways, but I think the hardest question to try to answer is, "How do we teach children to think?"

The question was asked last week by a parent and after some thought, I gave the following answer. Perhaps this answer might be of help to other parents and students.

We all are aware of the importance of being a competent thinker, to be able to analyze facts, solve problems and defend opinions. Many of our teachers wrap their instruction on thinking around everyday lessons and use some of the following methods.

When new information is taught, students should compare that information with facts already known. "Matching" can categorize words for pre-schoolers. Matching up such words as duck and hen with the word bird, is a good example. High school students might categorize wartime figures such as Hitler and Napoleon according to personality traits.

Another way to encourage competent thinking is to give students a way to evaluate information. Asking such questions as: Is it unusual? Is it common knowledge? If it isn't common knowledge, is there proof? Is there enough proof to prove reliable?" can teach the student to evaluate and categorize items and thoughts.

It is important to help students to develop a good problem-solving framework. Students should learn to first understand the problem, then design a plan to solve it, carry out the plan, and then evaluate and decide if the plan worked.

Another good way to encourage students is to use "guided imagery". This method is often used to teach children important or hard to group information. In guided imagery, the student imagines an event or an experience. Also it is helpful to teach a child to elaborate, to extend circumstances of things read or seen. Imagination can play an important part in a child's learning experiences.

Encourage students to set goals. Ask them to decide what they think they should achieve within a time frame. Encourage your child to write down their goals and then evaluate them periodically to see if they are "on target".

The most important steps in developing a competent thinker is to practice what you are teaching, to be consistent, and to encourage each learner.
