



**Commissioners**' Court

Regular session of Yoakum County Court was held Monday afternoon. All members were present.

Members of the court unanimously approved a motion to cancel a Performance Bond of Geo-Search Corporation at the request of Agent Aetna Casualty and Surety Company to be effective March 31.

Appointments of Child Welfare Board members were discussed and postponed one week.

A check was received from Washington National Life Insurance Company cash surrender of policies when coverage was changed to Massachusetts General. A motion was approved to roll over amounts needed to cover vested people to Massachusetts General and place remainder in a C.D. until the end of the year when a decision will be made as to disposition.

A resolution was approved the Notice of Sale and Bidding Instructions on #3,805,000 General Obligation Bonds. First City National Bank of Austin was approved as paying agent registrar for the hospital bonds and to execute the agreement.

Also adopted was a resolution to execute a Warranty Deed conveying real property unto Lea County Electric Cooperative Incorporated amounting to 10x208.71 feet or .05 acres which is a west extension of existing Lea County Electric's substation site. Lea County Electric agrees to pay for a .05 acre portion of additional property to be exchanged for this tract.

Toni Jones was appointed to replace Genice Logan as coordinator to implement Revenue Sharing Handicapped Regulations.

Correspondence was read from Kike Moeller, Deputy Commissioner of Agriculture, reporting that Generic Certificates for the disaster declaration are being processed by the local ASCS and that 73.9 percent of the amount requested would be sent to farmers in Yoakum Coun-

ty. This amounts to \$2,211,855.50. County Auditor Hazel Lowrey was granted authority to correct errors in issuance of warrants. February bills were approved for payment including hospital bills in the amount of \$70,392.13.

The court voted to enter into a Hold Harmless Agreement with the City of Denver City.

# Extensionist Explains Care **Of Self-Cleaning Ovens**

-- they do the job by themselves.

Yet customer service representatives from major appliance companies say that they often get questions about using oven cleaners in a self-cleaning oven. Often the customer is concerned that use of a commercial cleaner has destroyed the oven's finish.

Fortunately, this is not the case. The finish in a self-cleaning oven is not damaged by commercial cleaners. The warning in the oven instructions against using cleaners is to prevent the generation of fumes and smoke that can be toxic, says Mary Dale Williams, Yoakum County Extension Agent, Home Economics.

To remove oven cleaner from a self-cleaning oven follow these steps: \*Using a sponge, apply full strength white vinegar to oven walls covering all surfaces to which you applied the cleaner. Vinegar helps neutralize and dilute the highly alkaline oven cleaner. \*Rinse oven walls thoroughly with warm water. \*Follow oven instructions for a twohour self-clean cycle. Be sure the room is well ventilated. Stay out of the area to avoid breathing fumes or smoke. \*After the oven cools, rinse walls again with warm water.




Self-cleaning ovens are just that on, and foods should not be cooked in it until the oven cleaner has been removed by this procedure.




Plains students also competed in science. In the junior division, Brad McWhirter placed eight. In the senior division, Joe Harris placed fifth.







## **Appraisal Ratios Show Improvement**

In 1986, property in Texas was appraised for local tax purposes at an average of 91.3 percent of its market value, as determined by the State Property Tax Board (SPTB). In 158 counties, the median 1986 ratio was 90 percent or higher. In contrast, only 100 counties reached that level in 1985.

This reflects continued improvement in appraisal practices. Nevertheless, averages ranged as low as 55 percent of market value in Nacogdoches County, and below 70 percent in Coleman, Kimble, LaSalle, McMullen and Starr counties.

Yoakum County was among eight counties in Texas to have a preliminary appraisal ratio of 100 percent.

#### GREENIES 1 cup butter

- 4 squares (4 ounces) unsweetened chocolate
- 1/3 cup Baileys Original Irish
- Cream **5 large eggs**
- 2 cups granulated sugar 1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- teaspoon salt
