School Board Reviews Teachers Contracts Monday

School board members met in special session Monday evening.

A request for the use of the gymnasium April 13 was approved for Plains Little Dribblers Association.

President of the board Jack Palmer announced the board would enter executive session to consider contract renewals of Tom Sears, Paula Cullins and Jim Baldwin.

Foster Family Guidelines Cited By Human Services

Texas Department of Human Services, traditionally referred to as "Child Welfare" has a continuing need to locate families to provide temporary care for pre-school and school age children, sibling groups, minority children and children with special physical and emotional needs. Families that can provide for up to 30 days, and families that can provide long-term care, for up to six months, are needed.

In order to be a foster parent, one needs to be 18 years of age or older, and single or married one year. One must not have any health problems which would interfere with caring for a child. Families should be able to meet their own financial needs and homes must pass a fire and health inspection. Both parents may work as long as adequate child care arrangements are made. Families must also be willing to provide a positive family experience for children.

Preservice orientation and training sessions are available to provide detailed information about how the Foster Home Program works and how to deal with children placed in foster care. A home study is conducted after the training to permit persons to examine their interest in the program and evaluate the types of children that would work best for each family.

One of the primary factors stressed throughout the training and home study is that persons are not committed to become foster parents until they have enough information to make their own decisions. In short, one may obtain all of the available information and decide that it is not a good time to become a foster parent, based on the current family situation. Accurate information is needed to make a realistic decision, however, and the Department of Human Services encourages interested persons to find out more about the program before deciding.

Commissioners' Court

Commissioners' Court of Yoakum County convened in special session Monday.

The 1986 Immigration Reform and Control Act and its effect on county governments was discussed. Correspondence from South Plains Association of Governments was read announcing a seminar on the subject.

Correspondence was also read from Secretary of State Jack Rains requesting support and ideas to improve recently introduced legislation to require single location polling places for primary elections in order to reduce costs to the state.

Insurance agents Don Hosch of Lubbock and Jim Warren, representing American Heritage Life Insurance Company, presented a Cancer and Dread Disease Insurance Plan and made comparison of benefits with the current plan. No action was taken.

Winn Children Recognized, Training For Nationals

Whether spelled with double letters - Winn - or one n - "Win" - they are one and the same when attached to the names Ashlee, Ladd and Shyloh, three true competitors of acrogymnastics. The children of Tony and Lynne Winn and grandchildren of Billy and Zareta Winn, and Johnnie and Melba Fitzgerald, all of Plains, have been actively involved with acrogymnastics since each became two years old. Their accomplishments were recognized Thursday evening at the annual Chamber of Commerce Banquet.

Each has won several district, state and national-regional titles. They have also competed in the past four National Championships held in Cleveland, Ohio; Las Vegas, Nev.; Amarillo; and Mobile, Ala.

Ladd won the power tumbling title in 1985 competition in Amarillo. Ashlee competed at that time in Junior Olympics with youth 18 and under. Ashlee and Ladd then competed in an Invitational World Meet in June 1985 in Solon, Ohio. There Ashlee won the synchronized trampoline title and second place in individual trampoline. Ladd won

tumbling and synchronized trampoline.

These competitions in combination with qualifying scores enabled them to be a part of the USA team traveling to Paris, France Oct. 18-26, 1986 to compete in World Championships which are held every two years in acrogymnastics.

In France, Ladd won the power tumbling competition and became the 1986 Champion for ages 10 and under. He also won a silver medal on the double-mini trampoline. Ashlee placed fifth in 11-12 year old division and Shyloh was seventh in girls division, 10 and under. Shyloh was the youngest competitor in the entire meet which included 1,500 competitors from 14 countries.

All three young Winns are currently training for the 1987 National Championships to be held at the end of June in Rockford, Ill. and 1988 World Championships to be held in Lubbock.

The children are part of the South Plains Acrospirits and Plains Royal Bounders tumbling teams. Sherry Arnwine and Pat Green are their coaches.

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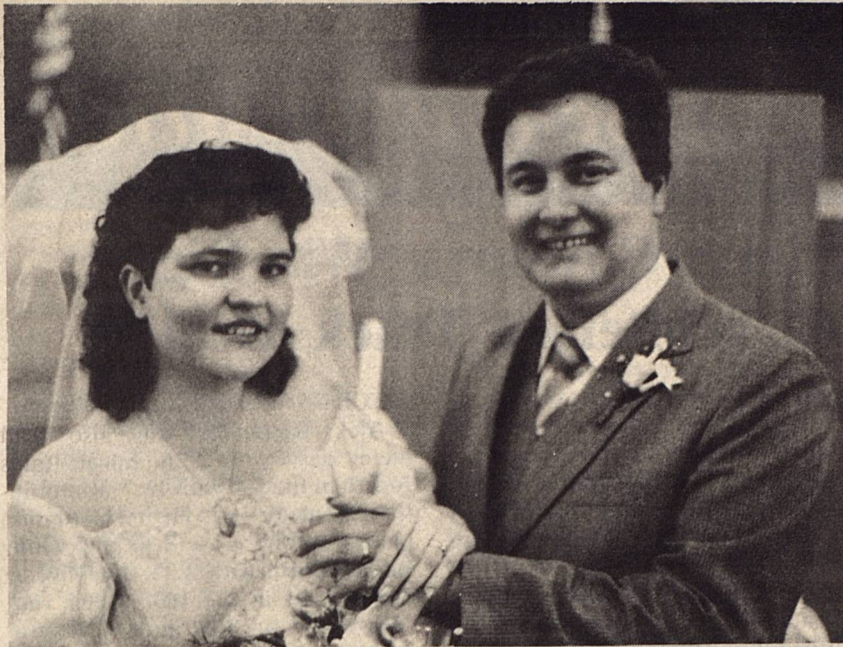

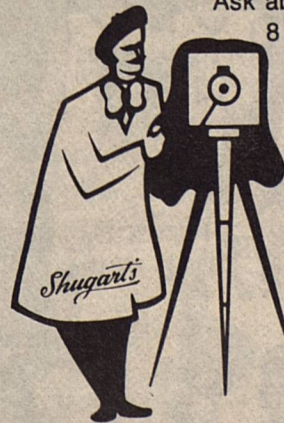

From The Superintendent's Desk

State Education Commissioner W.N. Kirby had some interesting remarks recently about demographics and education. "A few months ago I couldn't pronounce it (deomographics)," Kirby said. "Now it scares me to death. Right now fully one-third of the children in Texas schools are on the free and reduced price lunch program...and our predictions are, that because of the economy, that number will continue to go up."

"Another piece of demographic information is that one-third of our kids we lose without graduating from high school," Kirby said. "It gets worse if you look at Hispanic kids...45 percent of Hispanic kids don't graduate from high school."

Another statistic: 85 percent of the prison inmates today have less than a high school diploma. You have to have an education to make a living. The Texas student population is growing by some 60,000 to 65,000 students per year. Growth is expected to continue into the year 2000 and shortly after the year 2000 the state will have gained (between now and then) a million more children than we have today.

"Yet our public school population is growing in terms of minority children," Kirby says. We are right at the 50th percentile now -- right at the point of having about half our children minority students -- half Anglo and half black and brown. It is these minority children that we do least well with in school -- not because they are minority but because of the tremendous pressure on families and on children and a high difficulty in getting a quality education.

"Not only are we facing (budget) cuts," Kirby concludes. "But at the time that we are facing cuts our needs are greater than ever before."

Plains Cowboys 'Win Big' At Whiteface Track Meet

Cowboy thinclads last week captured their second meet championship in as many outings. The PHS tracksters scored 148 points to lead all 10 competing teams at Whiteface. Wilson was runner-up with 116.

The Cowboys scored in every event. Jeff Ashburn and Mike Diaz turned in outstanding performances with Ashburn running his best of the season. His 16.4 performance easily won the high hurdles. Diaz ran with the winning 400 and 1600 relays, placed second in the 400 meter dash with 56.2 and finished fourth in the long jump with 19'7".

Alex Barrientes was second in pole vault with 10'6" and Baldwin and Shawn Booth were fifth and sixth in high jump with 5'6" leaps.

Editors Note:

Economic times have really hurt us all and we would certainly like to be able to say that we will be publishing The Plains Pride for many years to come, but as we look to the future, it is very bleak.

Despite our pleas for support of the newspaper, advertising revenue continues to decline, while all the costs of assembling the paper remain the same or increase in certain cases.

Many people have commented how much they enjoy Plains having a newspaper, but we cannot continue to operate it without a profit. If there is not enough advertising for a sufficient cashflow, then we will be out of business.

Revenue from an eight page paper should run close to \$700 for it to show any profit. We have averaged \$500 to \$600 weekly this year. It is taking ninety percent of the advertising and subscription revenue to pay the cost of supplies, weekly second class postage, telephone, gasoline, salary for correspondent, rent, composition and printing...not to mention babysitters.

Those responsible for Plains having a newspaper are the consistent advertisers, who are repeatedly called upon for support. Their only desire is for Plains to have a newspaper.

Although we are not looking to throw the towel in just yet, there is a lot we are very concerned about. Namely, today's economy and the effects it will have on our determination to survive. Hopefully The Plains Pride will celebrate another birthday.
