Accident Claims Three Lives

Tragedy struck Plains Wednesday when an early morning accident claimed the life of Dora Elia Rios and her children, Abel Dan Rios and Mary Alice Rios. The fatal accident occurred about 1 a.m. on Texas 214 near Plains when the pickup in which they were riding struck a calf on the highway and overturned. The mishap was not discovered until approximately 3 a.m.

Mrs. Rios and Abel were pronounced dead at the scene. Alice died at 5:16 a.m. in Yoakum County Hospital in Denver City.

Funeral services for the three were conducted at 10 a.m. Friday in Plains High School auditorium. Officiating was John Casey and Joseph Urban. Altar Servers were Joe Martinez, Brandon McGinty, Chris Chavez and Joe Michael Salas. Burial was in Plains Cemetery under the direction of Singleton Funeral Home of Denver City.

Born in Brownfield Jan. 7, 1954, Mrs. Rios had lived in Plains most of her life. She was manager of Rudy's Spanish Inn and a Catholic.

She is survived by a son, Adrian; her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Alfredo Ramos of Plains; three sisters, Margie Diaz and Estella Caballero,

both of Plains, and Gloria Calsoncin of Lubbock; and three brothers, Freddie Ramos, Rick Ramos and Eric Ramos, all of Plains.

Abel was born in Brownfield and would have celebrated his seventeenth birthday Saturday, May 9. He had lived most of his life in Plains. A junior at Plains High School, he was a member of the varsity football team and was Catholic.

Alice was born in Brownfield, March 20, 1971. Sixteen years old,

she was a sophomore at Plains High School and a member of the volleyball, track and basketball teams and active member of the PHS Cowboy Band. A varsity cheerleader, she had just been re-elected to serve her junior year on the squad. She was a Catholic.

The children are survived by a brother, Adrian; their father, Abundio Rios of Lubbock; and grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Alfredo Ramos of Plains and Mr. and Mrs.

Adam Salazar of Morton.

Commissioners' Court

Yoakum County Commissioners Court met in special session May 4. All members were present.

Approved was a request of Santa Fe Pipeline to cross County Road C-31 with a welded steel, four-inch natural gas liquids pipeline.

Securities of \$1,000,000 and \$500,000 with Federal National Mortgage Association were approved for release.

An order/resolution for a Deferred Compensation Plan for Yoakum County was passed with County Judge Dallas Brewer as administrator.

Extra hire and bills were approved for payment.

The court also approved a motion to go on record opposing House Bill

1962 and Committee Substitute HB 1962 and Senate Bill 1059 relating to conducting and financing Single Polling Place Primary Elections. Letters will be sent to State Senator Montford, State Representative Rudd, Secretary of State Rains, Representative Smith of Brazos County, Senator Krier of Bexar County and Democratic and Republican Chairmen.

Approval was given a motion to advertise to receive bids May 26 for asphalt for precincts one, two and three for the remainder of 1987. Also approved was a motion to advertise for cold mix and hot mix for the remainder of 1987 for all four precincts.

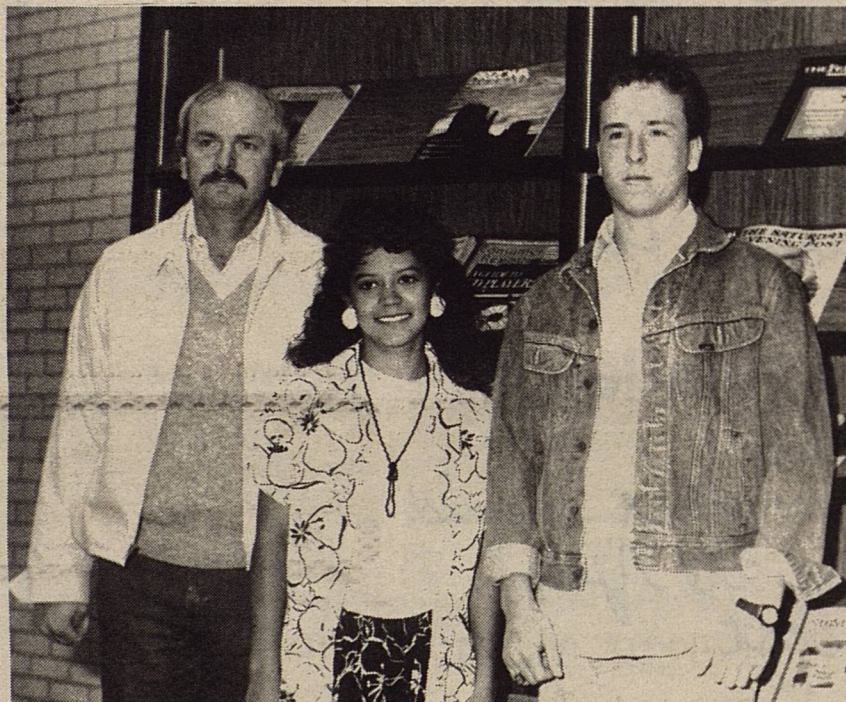

Plains Trio Receives Honors For Chemistry Achievements

Bobby Livengood, Traci Nance and Jody Harris were honored at the Annual Awards Banquet of the Texas Tech Department of Chemistry and Biochemistry, the South Plains Chemical Society-South Plains and Affiliated Institutions. The banquet was held April 23 at the 50 Yardline Restaurant in Lubbock.

The joint awards banquet was held expressly to recognize outstanding individuals in the field of chemistry. Honorees included students and teachers from the entire South Plains and Permian Basin area.

Traci Nance was recognized as Outstanding Freshman in the Department of Chemistry at South Plains College in Levelland.

Jody Harris was recognized as a finalist in the International Chemistry Olympiad. Only five from the South Plains Area qualified as finalists. A team representing the United States will compete in Europe this summer for the international title.

Bobby Livengood was recognized with two awards. As Outstanding Freshman in Texas Tech Chemistry Department, he was awarded the

Samuel Hunt Lee Memorial Award. He was also awarded the Weymouth-Campbell Scholarship which is awarded to students deemed by the Department of Chemistry to have promise of future achievement.

Mackey McWhirter was recognized as the only teacher who had three students, past and present, receiving honors as outstanding in the field of chemistry. The moderator commended McWhirter and Plains Schools for inspiring young people to be high achievers.

Eligible Farmers Invited To Seek Committee Election

Eligible farmers in Yoakum County are invited to become nominees for the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) county committee, FmHA County Supervisor, Trueman D. Murdoch announced today.

As a result of the 1985 Farm Bill, two of the three members of FmHA county committees must be elected. The third member is designated by FmHA. The Yoakum County Committee assists the FmHA county office in determining the eligibility of applicants for certain types of FmHA loans.

Generally, farmers who are residents of the county but not FmHA borrowers are eligible to become nominees for the FmHA county committee.

"Farmers in this county, serving on the committee, play an important role by assisting in the process of loan applications and reviews," said Trueman D. Murdoch.

For this first election only, two members will be elected at the same time. One member will be elected for a term of one year, and one member will be elected for a two year term. The terms of service will be for three years.

Nominating petitions must be returned to the FmHA Yoakum County office by June 10, 1987.

Additional information and application forms for those who are interested in becoming nominees for the county committee are available at the FmHA county office, 605 9th Street in Plains, or by calling (806) 456-2490.

Chamber Adopts Highway Project

Plains Chamber of Commerce, in their regular breakfast meeting Tuesday in Johnnie's Restaurant, voted to participate in the "Adopt a Highway" program. Meeting with the group to explain the project was Elbert Estep, Maintenance Road Supervisor for Yoakum County.

Explaining rules of safety as participants, Estep told the group that groups signing up for "Adopt a Highway", pledge their obligation for one year to pick up trash and litter over a two-mile area of the highway. The clean-up efforts are to be made 12 times a year.

Assigned the two miles east of Plains on Highway 380, the Chamber officially began their project Saturday. They challenge other organizations or groups to sign up for the worthwhile project.

Its purpose is to awaken within youth of the nation a sincere conviction that a well-informed, intelligent participating citizenry is most vitally needed to protect and preserve our American institutions and our American democracy.

4-H Celebrates 80 Years In Texas

As the 4-H program approaches 80 years of existence in Texas, there are reasons to celebrate, says David Kight, county 4-H program leader for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in Yoakum County.

First, 4-H is the largest youth organization in America with 4.5 million members. As other youth organizations decline in membership, 4-H has continued to grow. Texas boasts 305,000 members.

In its 80 year history of 4-H, 50,000 Americans have been members — one out of every six people, Kight points out.

Secondly, 4-H is youth and adults working together.

The 4-H volunteer leader concept is one of the program's strengths. For every one hour of professional employee's time spent in the 4-H program, volunteers contributed ten hours.

The organization emphasizes families because they are the strength of our country and our way of life. It works to strengthen families.

The third reason to celebrate 4-H, according to Kight, is that it teaches leadership and citizenship. The members and clubs participate in projects to benefit the community, and the international program extends 4-H pathways across our borders. The ultimate goal is youth leadership development.

Through 4-H projects ranging from beef to bookkeeping, from forestry to food and nutrition, and from safety to sewing, 4-H members experience "learning by doing". They can select projects and set their own goals. These projects enable 4-H'ers to learn useful skills, the dignity of work, and the satisfaction of responsibility. Many times a 4-H project will lead to a career.

Yoakum County 4-H involves 135 individuals as organized club members and another 500 to 600 annually in special interest projects. Some activities within the county are: leathercraft work, photography project, animal projects, leadership camps, horse project, small gas engines, food and nutrition and clothing. For more information concerning 4-H and how to get involved, call 456-2263.

Girls State is a mythical 51st state where, for a period, its citizens organize their own city, county and state governments. They choose their own officials in accordance with regular election procedures. They learn the duties of the various city, county and state offices. Girls introduce and debate their own bills in a legislature. Justice is administered by their own law enforcement agencies and courts.

In Girls State, young citizens "learn by doing". A visit to the State Capitol is included in the program which offers the girls an opportunity to assemble in the halls of our legislative bodies and meet state officials.

Girls State will be held at Texas Lutheran College in Seguin, June 16-26. Girls from this area will travel by Chartered Bus from Lubbock.

NOTICE OF RIGHT TO NOMINATE BY PETITION

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) is accepting nominations for County Committee elections for Yoakum. This notice is issued to inform eligible voters of the right to nominate candidates by petition. Copies of the petition and instructions on its completion can be obtained from your local FmHA office.

Persons nominated should be currently engaged in the operation of a farm, have their principal farming operation within the County or area in which activities of the County or area Committee are carried out, derive the principal part of their income from farming (that is more than 50 percent of their gross income must come from agricultural production), be a citizen of the United States or an alien lawfully admitted to the United States for permanent residence, not have an FmHA insured or guaranteed loan, and be well qualified for committee work. Nominations must be received in the Plains office no later than June 10, 1987. FmHA committee elections are open to all eligible voters without regard to race, color, religion, national origin, age, political affiliation, marital status, sex and/or handicap.

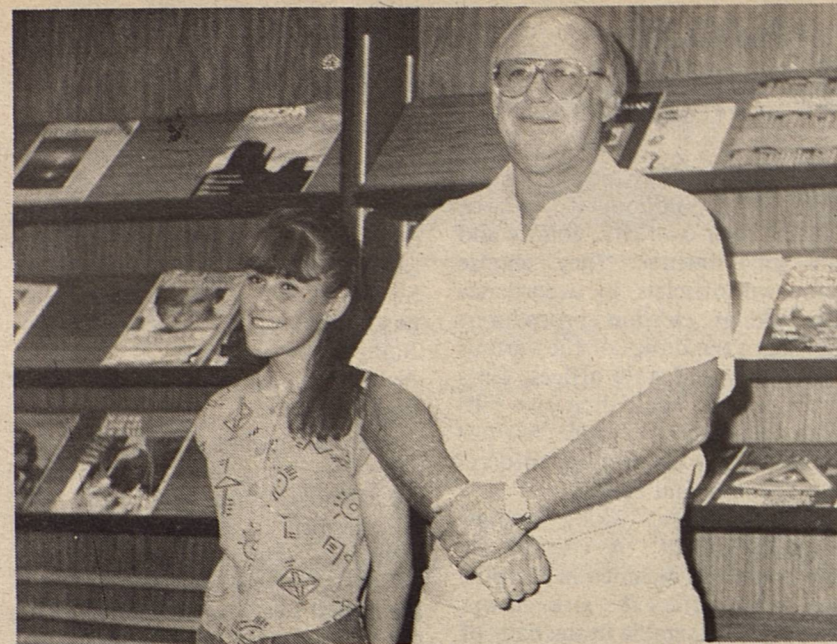

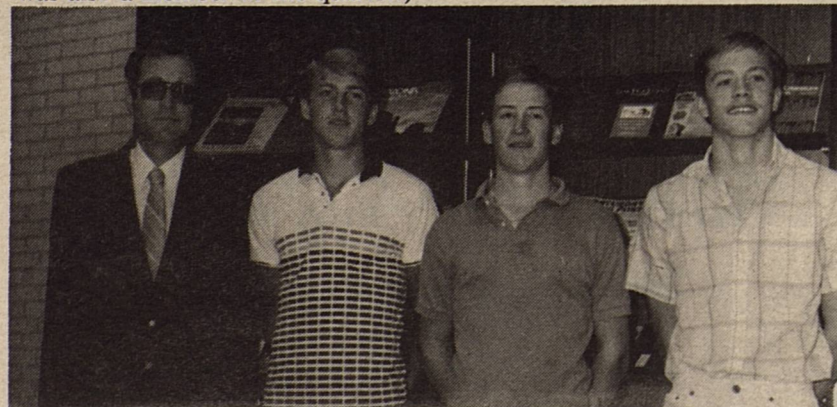

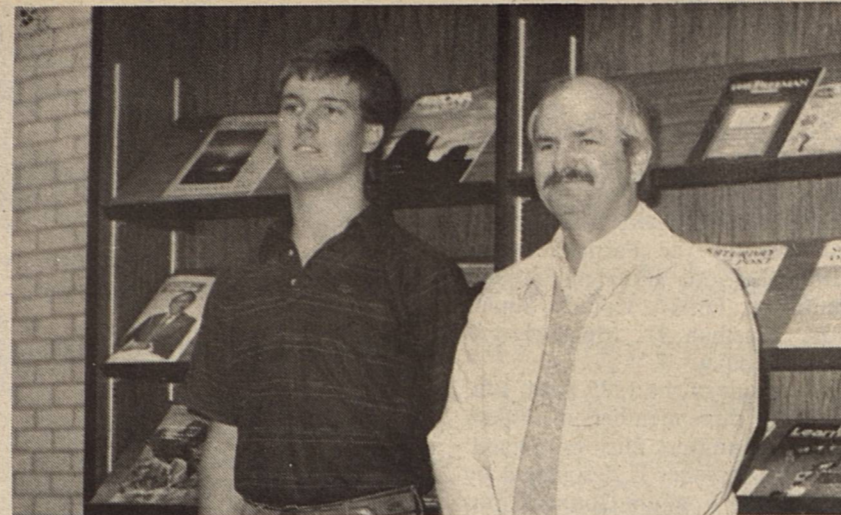

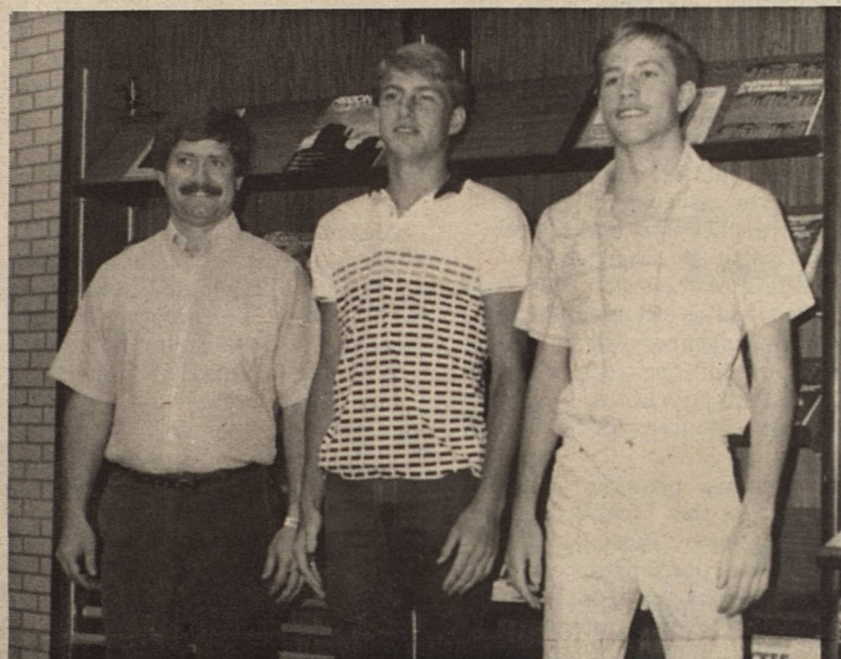

Kitchen Korner

Recipes are shared with good cooks of the Plains community by one who also holds that honor, Mrs. Robert (Ita) Young.

Ita grew up at Tokio and attended school in Tokio and Brownfield. Following their marriage, she and Robert farmed, carried out dairy operations and ran cattle on pasture. In 1951, they entered a partnership with Foy and Redell Cogburn in Cogburn-Young Hardware and Appliance.

After the Youngs retired in 1974, Ita has found time for the pleasures of crocheting and growing African Violets. She is an active member of Plains Dirt Gardeners.

DELLIE FITZGERALD'S PUMPKIN CAKE

Cream 3 c sugar, 1 c Crisco; add 3 eggs (well beaten) and 1 No. 303 can pumpkin. Sift 3 c flour, 1 t soda, 1 t baking powder, 1 t cloves, 1 t all spice, 1 t cinnamon, 1 t nutmeg and 1 t vanilla. Pour into greased and floured tube pan. Bake at 350° for 1 hr and 15 mins or until cake springs back when pressed down with finger.

SWEDISH MEATBALLS

2 lb ground beef
2 eggs
1 c water, for soaking bread
2 boiled mashed potatoes
1 onion, minced
1 garlic clove, minced
3 slices of stale bread
2 t salt
½ t thyme
3 T honey

Dissolve bread in water. Chop onion and garlic. Add mashed potatoes and mix all ingredients in large bowl and work until smooth. Heat oil in skillet. Shape in small balls; brown evenly in oil until all mixture is used up. Make gravy in pan where meat was browned, adding a little sugar. Pour over meatballs and bake slowly for 1 hr.

REFRIGERATOR ROLLS

1 c Crisco
¾ c sugar
1 t salt

1 c boiling water
2 eggs, beaten
1 envelope yeast
6 c flour

Pour boiling water over Crisco and sugar. Stir and cool to warm temp. Mix remaining ingredients and let rise to double. Work down and divide. Roll on dough board to thin and spread dough with melted butter. Roll as for cinnamon rolls and cut into 1-1½" pieces. Place on cookie sheet and let rise. Bake at 350° for 15 mins.

VEGETABLE SALAD

1 hd lettuce, broken up
1 c celery, chopped fine
1 c cauliflower, chopped
4 boiled eggs, sliced
1 10 oz pkg frozen peas, uncooked
½ c green or red sweet pepper
1 sm onion (or onion flakes)
8 slices of bacon, fried & diced

Mix 2 c mayonaise and 2 T sugar. Spread over top. Sprinkle bacon over that; then 4 oz grated cheese. Make layers of these ingredients, using more or less of some, to suit taste. Cover tightly with foil and let set overnight or longer. Keeps for several days.

POUND CAKE

Blend 1 c Crisco and 2 c sugar together. Add 6 eggs, one at a time and beat at lowest speed. Add 2 c flour, 1 t vanilla and salt, if desired. Bake at 350° for 1 hr or til done.

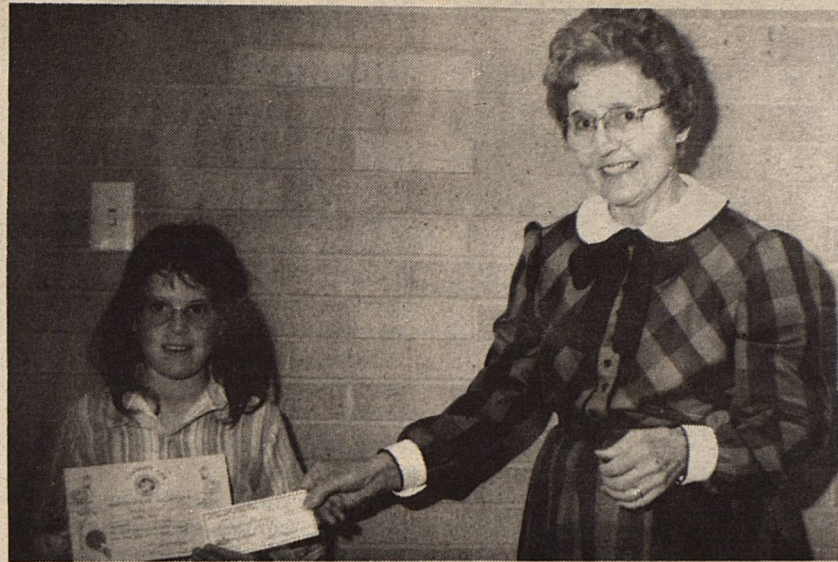

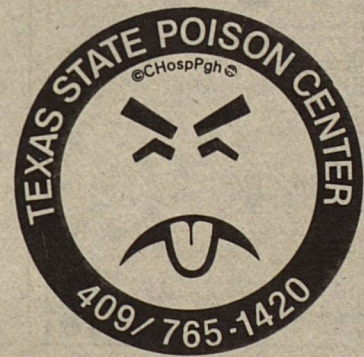
