Mrs. Cannon will be overseeing the entire production of the paper and will be assisted by Mrs. Alcorta. Mr. Alcorta, publisher is now a full-time student at West Texas State, preparing for a coaching career, and will not be available to make the usual trips to Plains, as frequently as in the past.

Effective with the very next issue, there will no longer be a correspondent to gather news. Those who have news items may leave them at Pay-N-Save Grocery, Yoakum County Library or mail to Plains Pride, Box 774, Olton, Texas 79064. Pictures used will be returned to the library. The Enterprise number is 806-28531.

Mrs. Cannon stated that at the inception of the newspap r when "we talked to a number of the Plains residents and business people." they said they were willing to do whatever it took so that Plains could have a paper. We told the people at the newspaper committee meeting that in order for a paper to survive and carry its own weight, it must have at least 65 percent advertising each week and that it would nearly have to be a 12 page paper. As most of you know, the Plains Pride has not reached that goal but in special edi-

"Because of lack of financial support, we will take a long look at the feasibility of continuing the paper in Plains. We must have the cooperation of the entire community - businesses, schools, churches and all residents. Business people will be contacted each week and residents are asked to mail their news into Olton or leave at designated places in Plains.

"This is YOUR paper. If you want it to continue, then it is going to be YOUR responsibility to get items in for publication.

"As the new editor, I will try to give you the same type of good newspaper that Joe and Debbie have been giving you for the past two years....but only if Plains supports it. We will not subsidize it It must pay its own way if it is to continue." Mrs. Cannon concluded. "It's up to you."

Motion was made and approved to place bond proceeds in the bank or banks which would yield the highest net earnings, with Yoakum County State Bank given the first opportunity to compete with other investment mediums and to roll the interest earned from bond proceeds into the hospital construction fund.

Miscellaneous bills and extra hire were approved for payment. A transfer was approved for \$40,000 in fund to Yoakum County Hospital, subject to approval by the County Auditor.

Session adjourned at 10:35 and reconvened at 11 a.m. Meeting at that time with the court were members of Yoakum County Airport Board and an FFA representative from Lubbock. No action was taken.

From The Superintendent's Desk

The article "Sober Warning", which is printed below, came to me from a large city in Texas. I am sharing it with you for information and drug education purposes only. Our local police department and our school administrators have no knowledge of the drug "Blue Star" being in our community, however, it could possibly be a threat in the future.

As a precaution, please discuss this article with your child. Prevention is much easier than cure.

SOBER WARNING

The police department has informed us that there is another danger in our community. It is called "Blue Star" and it is sold all over the United States. It is a white piece of paper with a little blue star soaked in LSD, a very dangerous drug. It is the size of a pencil eraser. You can pull it off the piece of paper and put it in your mouth. This drug can also penetrate the skin just by touching the paper. Some of the pieces of the LSD come on colored pieces of paper which are like postage stamps. Some appear with a picture of Mickey Mouse, others with pictures of Superman and other comic characters.

These stamps are packaged in a red box with a Mickey Mouse print and are wrapped in aluminum foil in a sealed box. The box contains five stamps and is a new method of getting young children hooked on drugs. If an innocent child were to use this drug, he would be in serious danger.


Please advise your children about this drug -- let other parents know as well.

Some adolescents give this drug to children for the purpose of testing the strength of the LSD and then keep them as customers. If you see someone sick because of this drug and know who is selling it, please call the police and give them the information.

The symptoms of this drug are vomiting, hallucinations, and change of body temperature. Please take care of your children and do not allow them to be in the street or in the stores alone without a responsible adult present. IF YOU SHOULD SEE THESE PACKAGES — DO NOT TOUCH THEM.
