## Swine Course

Set June 20
Area swine producers will have an opportunity to improve their herd management techniques during a swine short course which will be of fered at 8:30 a.m. at the Texas Tech University Livestock Arena June 20.

Herd Health and Farrowing Management will be the theme for this year's course, said Stanley Young, Lynn County Extension Agent.

A $\$ 10$ registration fee will enable the producers to hear keynote speakers such as Dr. Billy R. Clay, a Technical Services Veterinarian with the UpJohn Co. in Kalamazoo, Mich.; David Graf, a swine producer from Vernon; Dr. Bruce Lawhorn, an Agricultural Extension Swine Veterinarian from College Station, along with several others, said Dr. John McGlone, a Research Scientist from the Texas Tech animal science department.
"The course is a combined effort aimed to keep area producers abreast of new information and informed on the services available to them," said McGlone.
This year's program is tailored for the smaller and new producers in the swine industry, said Young
The swine course is co-sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, West Texas Pork Producers Association, Texas Pork Producers Association, and Texas Tech University.


## Extension Agent Helps Homemaker Control Pests

Insects often make themselves unwelcome guests in pantries and cupboards. If they weren't brought in as eggs from purchased food, they come from other parts of the home or outdoors to feast on dried food. These pests, like many unwelcome guests, will stay around until they are forcibly removed
Some steps to take to send unwanted pests packing, are suggested by Mary Dale Williams, Yoakum County Extension Agent, Home Economics.
Examine susceptible food, such as dry beans, peas, lentils, flour or nuts, to determine the source of infestation, and throw away any infested items. If infestation is doubtful, or the infested food could possibly be used later, heat it in a shallow pan in the oven at $130^{\circ}$ for at least 30 minutes, or put it in the freezer for a week to kill insect eggs.

Clean out the infested area so it can be treated with an insecticide. Take out all of the food, dishes and cooking utensils, and put them out of the way of contaminating spray particles. Make sure the area has been thoroughly vacuumed, scrubbed and dried before spraying insecticide.
Spray the area lightly, and make sure to get insecticide into all the cracks. If spray isn't available, use a paint brush.

Once the spray is dry, cover shelves with clean paper, and replace the items removed, being careful not to spill food, and keep the area clean.
Buying small amounts of food that will be used in a short time, storing food in sealable containers, and keeping susceptible foods like spices in the refrigerator, may help keep the pests away.

For further information on pest control, contact your County Extension Agent. They have publications available to the public, and are trained to help rid homes of unwanted "guests"
