



Pre-registeration of students for the 1961-62 school year will begin Monday, August 21, at Cisco Junior College, according to an announcement today by President Grady Hogue. This will continue through Sept. 9 with regular registration set for Monday and Tuesday, Sept. 11-12. Mr. Hogue said the dormitories

would be open Sunday, Sept. 10, for both boys and girls. The schedule calls for freshman

Sept. 13 and 14 with first classes on Sept. 15.

The college will run a bus south to May to pick up students at Ingram's Cafe each day in May and at the Elite Cafe daily in Rising Star. The fee to ride the

Rising Star. The fee to ride the bus will be \$6 per menth or \$54 for the school year. Tuition will be \$70 per semes-ter. Mr. Hogue said the costs for a non-dormitory student would be only \$140 per year plus an-other \$54 for those riding the bus. A record enrollment of full-time day students has been indi-cated for the coming year, Mr. Hogue said, Anyone with a question about the junior college pro-gram was invited to visit the college office any time during the day.

Centinued from first page the drouth years. One 100-degree day was recorded-in June. During the past week the city ther. mometer has approached but had not reached that level Tuesday. Saturday it touched 98 degrees. Monday recorded 93 and Tues. day a high of 94 was registered.

The last rain of any consequence fell on July 23, when 1.17 inches were measured by the official gauge of the city. Only a trace was measured Monday.

Among other crops which are sharing the bright outlook are pecans. This crop is rapidly becoming highly important in the farm economy of the section, with an increasing number of large commercial orchards being cultivated here. The prospective yield is one of the best in many years.




