## Local Man Commended For 'Good Neighbor' Deed

Ed Hunter has received commendation by Lubbock EMS for coming to the aid of an EMS crew which became medically stranded in Plains July 25.
The Lubbock ambulance developed trouble after transporting a patient to Tatum, N.M. Five miles west of the Texas-New Mexico line two fan belts were lost. New ones could not be installed because of the lack of a metric wrench set

Despite overheating and charging problems, the crew was able to bring the ambulance into town at 20 miles per hour, only to discover there was no mechanic in town at that hour.

Acquainted with Hunter, a pharmacist at Lubbock General Hospital, one of the paramedics called the Hunter home asking advice. He then escorted the ambulance to his home and helped replace the belts with his own tools.
Hunter's help resulted in a cost savings to Lubbock EMS and also enabled the ambulance and crew to
return to Lubbock as quickly a possible.

His letter of commendation, placed in his personal file at Lubbock General, cites his actions. From Mark Brock, Director, Lubbock EMS, the letter states, 'Mr. Hunter obviously went above and beyond the call of duty, and I respectively request that you place a copy of this letter and the attached incident report in his personal file. He appears to be an excellent example of the care and professionalism exhibited by the employees of this institution, and I am most appreciative of his actions."

Hunter and his wife, Helen, have lived in Plains 31 years. They are parents of a son, Ed Lee Hunter, of Lubbock. He is also employed in the pharmaceutical field. Mrs. Hunter taught school in Plains and Denver City until her retirement

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## Randy Kennedy Reports On Larry Combest's Visit

by Randy Kennedy U.S. Rep. Larry Combest, R-Lubbock, and approximately 25 Yoakum County residents took time out Aug. 27 at the Denver City Community Building to discuss issues facing the 100th Congress when it reconvenes in September.
Billing the discussion a "Community Comment" meeting, Combest immediately opened the floor for random discussion and fielded questions ranging from the Farm Credit System to Central America.
The FCS, a 70 -year-old farmerowned lending organization, has been on uncertain ground for the past two years after disclosures of severe financial problems among several of its nationwide districts. Legislation approved in early August could provide up to $\$ 6$ billion to put the system back on its feet again, but only if certain parts of the system are reorganized for more financial efficiency.

Responding to a question from Yoakum County Judge Dallas Brewer, Combest said the overall performance of the FCS would probably remain the same. "To the extent that it's been there as we know it, doing what we know it to do, it will be unchanged," Combest said. He explained that funds to be loaned to the FCS, predicted at between $\$ 4$ and $\$ 6$ billion, must be paid back into the treasury in an allotted amount of time.

Turning to the plight of ailing Savings and Loan institutions in the state, Combest predicted that several diversified or part-time thrift organizations would soon see their last days. "We're going to get some of the people who are selling hardware and trying to run banks on the side out of the banking business," Combest said.

He said that while on a partisan level he is "basically" for deregulation in the American economy, he also sees the need for cautious regulation in certain areas. "The banking industry is calling for some regulation," Combest said.
On Aug. 16, a Dallas-based federal task force ordered at least 28 thrift organizations to turn over financial records of approximately 290 people involved in deals with savings and loan institutions as part of a massive federal investigation.

Combest then addressed questions regarding the upcoming battle over continued funding for the Nicaraguan freedom fighters, or contras. He expressed concern about the effectiveness of President Reagan's new peace plan for the Central American country, which calls for the leftist Sandinista regime
o institute democratic reforms on its own.
"We cannot scuttle the plan,' said Combest, explaining that any action by the Sandinistas might be 150 days down the road and might not be what the Reagan administration is looking for. Combest said that if a peace plan does not include concessions to the Contras, he believes the Contras should be refunded when the initial U.S. funding expires Sept. 30.
"I am very hopeful that the President will request more funds,' Combest said.

## Rep. Jim Rudd Given Award

The Honorable Jim Rudd, State Representative, District 77, has been recognized as The Friend of Extension Home Economics Award Winner of 1987. The award was presented by the Texas Association of Extension Home Economists at their annual session in Lufkin, Texas. It is given annually to a legislator who has shown outstan ding support of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service programs.
As the chairman of the House Appropriations Committee during a deficit budget crisis, Representative Rudd proposed legislation which preserved the continuance of state agencies including Extension. In accepting the award, he encouraged Extension Home Economics to continue diseminating information which will assist Texas families in managing their resources to cope with changing times
