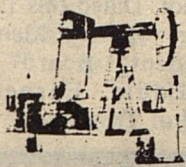

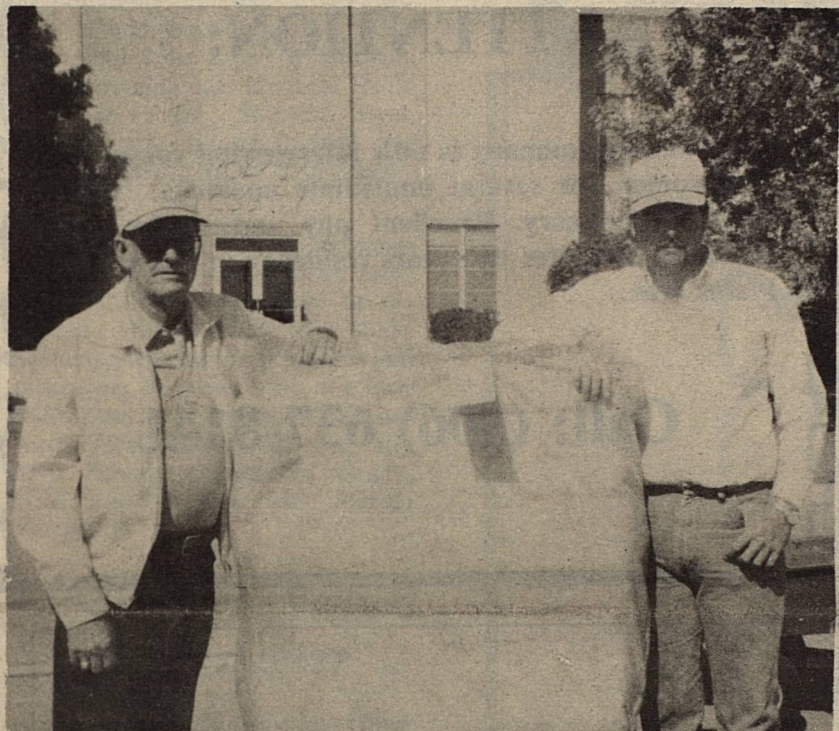

Resolution— Adopted By School Board

WHEREAS, our democracy was founded by our forefathers on the time honored precept of government by elected representatives, and

WHEREAS, in 1984, the Texas Legislature passed House Bill 72, which dissolved the 27 member elected State Board of Education and created a 15 member appointed State Board of Education, and

WHEREAS, the newly created State Board of Education was appointed as a "transition" board to implement the education reforms included in House Bill 72, and

WHEREAS, this significant legislation also provided for the return to an elected 15 member State Board of Education on Jan. 1, 1989, and

WHEREAS, in September 1987, Texas public schools entered their third school year following enactment of the House Bill 72 reform legislation and rules and regulations responsive to all phases of this historic legislation have now been adopted by the "transition" board, and

WHEREAS, in July 1987, the Texas Legislature enacted legislation that placed the following referendum proposition on the Nov. 3 election ballot:

"The State Board of Education shall be composed of members who are appointed from districts instead of elected, with equal representation

from throughout the State of Texas," and

WHEREAS, elected officials are directly accountable to the citizens who elect them to the office they hold, and

WHEREAS, appointed State Board of Education members could be held accountable only by those responsible for their appointment, thus leading to greater centralized control of public education,

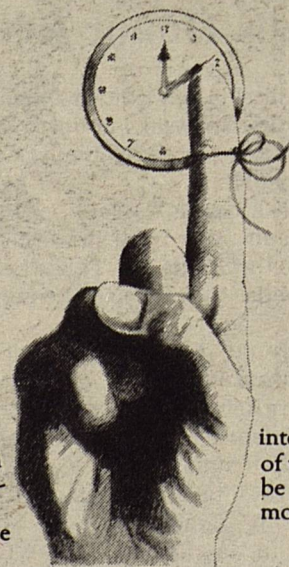
NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of the Plains Independent School District supports the return to an elected State Board of Education and encourages voters in the Plains Independent School District to vote against Referendum Proposition No. 1, relating to the State Board of Education, on the November 3 ballot. Representing the local club, Mrs. Davis was responsible for casting votes for the Association's 1987-88 National Board of Directors.

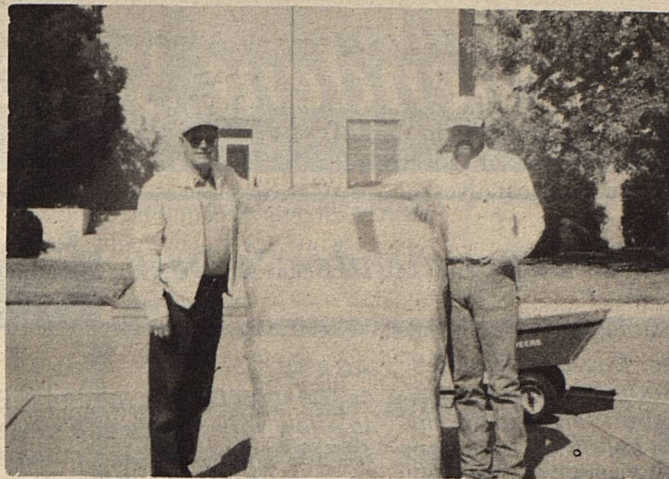

From The Superintendent's Desk

DEAN ANDREWS



At their regular meeting on October 12, 1987, our Board of Trustees adopted a resolution in support of an elected State Board of Education. On November 3, 1987, you will have the opportunity to vote on this issue. The wording that will appear on the ballot is confusing as are many of the constitutional amendments. A vote "for" will be a vote for an appointed state board, and a vote "against" will be a vote for an elected state board.

Our local board along with the Texas Association of School Boards and Texas Association of School Administrators recommend that you vote NO on Referendum Proposition No. 1.

The referendum propositions that will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The State Board of Education shall be composed of members who are appointed from districts instead of elected, with equal representatives from throughout the State of Texas."

Arguments are:

FOR:

1. Many of the persons in the state who are best qualified to serve on the State Board of Education, including current board members, are not willing to engage in politics to the extent necessary to wage a successful campaign. Our schools will be better served if the members are allowed to concentrate on the best course for public education in our state rather than tangential political matters, such as the influence of special interest groups, that will affect the next campaign in their district.

2. An appointed board would provide greater continuity in the administration of state legislation and policy concerning public education, especially the reforms initiated in 1984. Additionally, continuity on the board is needed to deal with the revision of the state's system of public education finance made necessary by an order entered by a state district judge this year in a case in which the judge found the current finance system to be unconstitutional.

AGAINST:

1. The members of the State Board of Education should be elected to allow voters to decide who will represent them at the state level in the decisions that are made that affect their school districts and their children. In 1984, voters were promised a return to an elected board in 1988 and that promise should be kept.

2. Enough time has passed since the enactment of the 1984 reforms for the voters to now judge when a change in board membership is in order. Additionally, continuity is neither ensured by the appointment of the board's members nor necessarily prevented by their election. While electoral politics has its negative aspects, the appointment process suffers from similar problems of partisanship and patronage.

3. Assuming that the need for continuity on the board is a short-term need rather than a long-term need, legislation that extended the time period during which the board is to be appointed before resumption of elections would have been preferable to a permanent change to an appointed board.

We think it is important that our community is aware of the position of our local board of trustees. We hope this information will be helpful to you as you cast your ballot in November.

Cowboys Spoil Homecoming For O'Donnell Eagles, 20-19

Shane McMinn, senior quarterback completed 12 of 21 passes for 231 yards to give Plains a 20-19 win, which spoiled O'Donnell's homecoming.

McMinn whirled 40-, 22- and 3-yard touchdown passes, which stunned the O'Donnell secondary.

On McMinn's first big play of the game, the senior pitched to Michael Diaz, who pitched back, and rolling left, McMinn hit Scott Lowrey for a 40-yard touchdown at the 6:56 mark

of the first quarter. McMinn's PAT gave Plains a quick 7-0 lead.

The touchdown was McMinn's first throw of the night.

The Eagles started a drive of their own on the following possession. O'Donnell drove to the Plains 14 yard line before Daniel Santos coughed the ball up.

McMinn, on his third throw of the night, was intercepted by Charles Sanchez. The interception was the key to O'Donnell's scoring drive in the second quarter.

After Richard Ramirez ran left for 14 yards on a quarterback keeper, and Kelly Sanders tacked on 3 more, Sanders, from the 13 yard line, faked a reverse to Sanchez and swept right for a 13 yard touchdown run at 9:24 of the quarter. Sanders added the point-after kick to tie the game 7-7.

In the third quarter, McMinn chose the big play and went to Jeff Asburn for a 22 yard touchdown pass. McMinn's kick gave Plains a 14-7 lead after three quarters.

A drive that started with 2:04 remaining in the third stanza ended at the 10:24 mark of the fourth quarter on Sanders 2 yard run. The PAT by Sanders, however, failed.

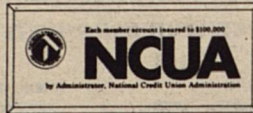

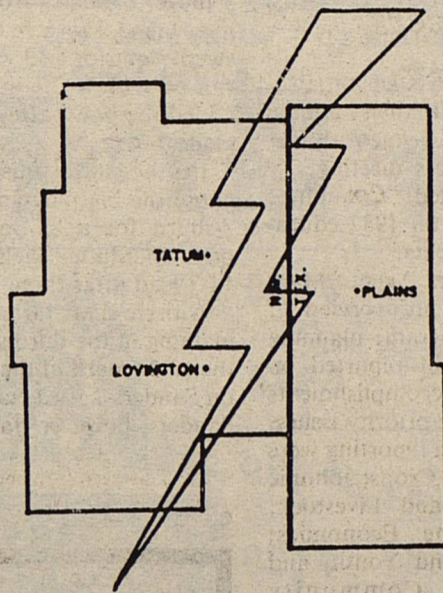
