The Cowgirls notched victories at the Bi-District and Area levels to advance to regional competition at Howard County Junior College in Big Spring today (Saturday, Nov. 14). The Cowgirls will take on Briscoe in a 9:15 a.m. match with the winner seeing action in the finals scheduled for 11:45 a.m. Kelton and Tornillo will begin Class A competition at 8 a.m.

The Bi-District victory did not come easy for the Cowgirls. Playing the Wink Wildcats in a 4 p.m. match at Andrews last Saturday, the Cowgirls fought to take the first game 15-12. They fell behind 3-11 in the second game before rallying to a 13-13 tie and were game point at 14-13 but the Wildcats held on to go ahead for the 17-15 win. The Cowgirls grabbed a five point lead early in the final game but again the momentum went back and forth un-

til they wrapped up the match 15-11 for a Bi-District Championship. The Cowgirl offense recorded thirty team kills. Leading in statistics were Lynda Jimenez, eight kills; Karen Cobb, seven kills; Melissa Welch, eleven service points; Heather McGill, eight consecutive service points, four aces; and Marsha Farnham, five blocks.

The Cowgirls blitzed the Fort Hancock Mustangs 15-1, 15-3 in an area match up at Fort Stockton Tuesday night. Melissa Welch recorded four of the fifteen Cowgirl kills. Lydia Jimenez served eight points including four aces followed by Bertha Gonzales and Karen Cobb with six service points each.

# Cowboys To Play Cowboys In Bi-District Contest

The Plains Cowboys have captured the District 3A football championship and will play the Grandfalls-Royalty Cowboys in the Bi-District football game at Mustang Stadium in Andrews, on Friday, Nov. 20. Game time is set for 7:30 p.m.

The Plains Cowboys traveled to
Wilson Friday night with two goals
in mind, avenging last year's lost to
Wilson and winning their first
district title since 1981. They accomplished those goals by shuttingout Wilson 19-0.

Taking the opening kickoff the Cowboys drove 81 yards. During the drive Michael Diaz had three good runs of 18 yards, five yards and 18 yards. Then Scott Lowrey caught a Shane McMinn pass for 19 yards to the 27 yard line. A 13 yard scoring pass from McMinn to Doug Green completed the drive. The PAT was ruled no good.

The Cowboy defense held the Mustangs to three downs and forced the punt. Shane McMinn eluded a defender in the back field and made eight yards. Scott Lowrey caught a pass for 45 yards and Michael Diaz scored on a 12 yard run. The two point PAT was no good.

The Cowboy defense again held the Mustangs to three downs and a punt. Scott Lowrey then was on the receiving end of a 19 yard pass from McMinn. Green caught an 11 yard pass. The Mustangs then cause a fumble on the 17 yard line and took possession at that point. Wilson had its best drive of the night with two long runs by Ruben Garcia. Chad Guetersloh sacked the quarterback, Greg Spears, for a 17 yard loss and the Mustangs ended up punting the ball.

The next couple of possessions neither team is able to move the ball. The Cowboys then take possession on their 20 yard line. Green takes a 64 yard pass from McMinn to the Wilson 16 yard line. A roughing the passer penalty on third down and long moved the Cowboys to a first and 10 on Wilson's 17 yard line. A pass from McMinn to Green put the Cowboys on the three. Alex Barrientes scored from the one. The PAT by McMinn is good.

The second half opened as the Cowboys kicked off to Wilson. The Cowboy defense held the Mustangs and they had to punt.

Plains moved to the Wilson seven yard line on two runs of 12 yard each by Barrientes and a 17 yard pass from McMinn to Diaz. On a quarterback keep, McMinn rushes to the seven yard line where he is hit from behind and fumbles. Wilson recovers the ball.

The Cowboys next drive starts at their own 47 yard line. A holding call backs them up the 37 yard line. Jeff Ashburn catches a pass for 10, but the Cowboys must punt. Barrientes' 50 yard punt puts Wilson at their own two yard line. Wilson moves to the 35 before they have to punt the ball.

Plains takes possession on their 46 yard line. Diaz gains 22 yards on a run, but is hit hard and fumbles the ball. Wilson recovers.

The Cowboy defense once again holds the Mustangs and they must punt. The punt is good for only eight yards. Ashburn catches a 16 yard pass for a first down on the Cowboy 25 yard line. The third quarter comes to an end as the rain begins.

The rain continued through the fourth quarter. The opening play of the quarter found McMinn throwing his only interception of the night. The Cowboy defense, doing an excellent job, cause the Mustangs to lose yardage and punt. However, the Cowboys also are unable to move the ball and Barrientes punts it away.

Wilson then shows they have some life left on a 32 yard screen pass to Garcia. The Cowboy defense toughens and stops the Mustangs four times inside the ten yard line.

The Cowboys take possession on the five yard line. McMinn throws an 11 yard pass to Ashburn. Barrientes runs 12 yards. McMinn on a quarterback keeper runs 9 yards, then keeps again for the first down. Diaz runs for eight yards followed by Barrientes for one. Then again Diaz takes the ball for 32 yards, seven yards and on the last play, for two yards with the game ending with Plains on the Wilson four yard line.

There is more to Kason Huddleston than meets the eye. Much of what the Eagles' defensive lineman does off the field fills the ear.

Huddleston is a fine pianist, so fine that he travelled to Dallas and represented his Assembly of God church last spring as the district piano champ, that after winning the sectional

But meeting Kason on a sidewalk, well, most folks might feel compelled to step into the street to let the 5-10, 250-pounder pass.

His figure is that striking.

Canyon High's king of the bench press (he lifts 345), Huddleston is gaining an ever-increasing command of the District I-4A trenches.

Just because he is big, strong, and often omery on the gridiron, Huddleston does not look the least bit out of place at the keyboard. Yet he has had trouble at times convincing coaches he should spend time tickling the ivories

On the other hand, there have been music teachers that asked their husky pupil why he's wasting time on the gridiron.

"I've always loved football, and I've always loved piano. I could never choose one over the other."

Despite being pulled by mentors between his two favorite activites, Huddleston has become accomplished in each. And he is currently enjoying the enthusiasm and support of present instructors in both specialties.

"The teacher I have now supports my football, my piano, everything," he

"At Levelland he played the best fundamental two-technique game of anybody I've ever coached," CHS defensive coordinator Ted Gidden said, explaining two-technique as basic inside defense in a 4-3 scheme."

"Playing the piano soothes me," he said. "It helps calm me down.


"Sometimes it helps me get ready for a game, just trying to relax.

"Sometimes after games I can't play piano for a couple of days, but the Lord's blessed me with this talent, and he's really kept his hand over me to where I haven't been hurt in any major way."

Huddleston could have chosen any selection from any style of music during his swing through sectional and district piano competition. He chose a religious composition.

"When I'm not doing something else, I usually go to the piano. It helps the whole family. They like to hear me play."

Kason is the son of Linda and Cardell Huddleston of Canyon, formerly of Plains. He is the nephew of Jack and Martha Palmer and Johnnie and Melba Fitzgerald. He has a younger brother, Jason, a 5'9' 205 pound ninth grade student, who also plays defensive tackle and the piano.

Cathy Anderson is farm wife, mother and registered nurse. She's now added another dimension to her life...weather forecaster.



# County Art Association To Hold Bazaar & Auction





# Guadalupe Economic Services To Offer Low Interest Loans

Guadalupe Economic Services Corporation, through grants from the Farmer's Home Administration, has established a program to provide low interest loans for home repairs.

Funds are available for major repairs such as roofing, plumbing, electrical and structural problems and handicap assessibility, to comply with standards.

The amount of the loan is based on 55 percent of the value of the home with the maximum amount of \$5,000. Loans are repaid at five percent interest, with a ten year repayment schedule. County income limits are based on family size and combined yearly income. Income, credit history, need for repairs and ability to pay, will be considered.

Priority will be given to elderly handicapped and to low income individuals. Each applicant should bring proof of home ownership such as Deed (must have been living in home for one year prior to applying); income verification for 1986, such as W-2 form, 1040 or

Social Security determination letter; and Property Tax Receipts (taxes must be current).

GESC has also been designated as an approved counseling service by HUD and the Texas Veteran Land Board to provide information, assistance and advice to prospective and current homeowners regarding housing questions or problems. These services are open to everyone including those individuals experiencing mortgage difficulties. There is no charge to the client for this housing related counseling. Information on other sources of funding for repairs is available.

Applications from Yoakum County homeowners desiring to repair their residences may be completed at the Denver City Chamber of Commerce meeting room, Monday, Nov. 23 from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.

This program is also available for Garza, Cochran, Parmer, Bailey and Lynn Counties.
