### SOIL MOISTURE CONDITION IS **GOOD AFTER RAINS IN COUNTY**

Every one knows it takes water to grow grass. Both the man of the house mowing the front lawn or the rancher following his herds are ever conscious of the need of grass for water. Our June rainfall was truly a blessing to both.

Moisture studies after our recent rains by local Soil Conservation Service workers show that in general we have enough moisture stored deep in the soil for good grass growth in the immediate future. Prior to our June rains grass growth was much below normal. Grass was suffering for mosture in many places even though we started our spring growing season with saturated soil.

At present sandy land and mixed land pastures are general-ly wet over six feet deep which represents about 8 to 10 inches of stored rainfall. Grass cover on this land is from around two thousand to in some cases over five thousand pounds of green grass per acre. Total green cover depends both upon previous stocking rates and the kind of grass present on the land.

On heavier shaley prairie rangeland (mesquite flats) soil is generally wet to around four feet with some moisture even deeper. This represents about 8 inches of stored moisture. Depending upon stocking rates this past winter and spring this land now has from fifteen hundred to twenty five hundred pounds of green grass per acre a major portion of which is Texas Winter grass. One unusually good site which had not been grazed this past spring and winter clipped six thousand five hundred pounds which probably represents close to the maximum production to be had from Texas Winter grass.

It takes skill to grow grass either on the front lawn or on the range. Most people know that only light sprinkling of the lawn is wasteful of water as only deep watering is effective in growing grass. The stockman can store rainwater deep in the soil only with a good grass cover. In this country this maintenance of sufficient range cover with fluctuating rainfall requires skillful range management. If cover is not maintained rainfall is lost in runoff and grass production declines to an unprofitable point. At present our range grasses are growing vigorously. Sideoats grama and buffalo are seed-

ing and a few bluestem plants are beginning to boot Goats are eating more grass and less brush each day as oak leaves become more mature. The stockmans management as we go into the summer session will do much to determine his future grass production.

In this area are many good fields of sudan and Johnson grass which have been planted to relieve the summer grazing presure on native grassland. By switching livestock to these fields the skillful rancher will assure himself of a better grass crop next year. In addition he will have cured dry grass on the land for wintering his stock next winter.

WEATHERFORD - All roads may lead to Rome but there wll be some detouring as rodeo fans from all over Texas converge on Weatherford for the 14th annual Parker County Frontier Days celebration, July 26-29.

The Parker County city will be the goal of trail drives from three directions as cowboys and cowgirls set their sights on participating in the giant western parade, July 26, that kicks off the World Championship rodeo that night.

Groups of riders from the south and west will meet in Weatherford for the 5 p.m. parade while a lone trail rider from Haskell will enter the city from the north.

Some 26 riding groups including the nationally famous Santa Rosa Roundup riders are joining three bands and area individual riders in the long parade that will snake its way through the downtown streets. The Santa Rosa visitors will also perform at the first rodeo performance te 8 p. m.





#### Vets Questions And Answers Q - I am on active duty in

the Army with a part time job when off duty. If I am disabled or killed on that job, am ? or my dependents eligible for death compensation fro mthe Veterans Administration?

A - Yes. If you should be killed accidently, through no fault of your own, your depen-dents would be eligible for death compensation under the present law. If you should be disabled, you would become eligible for compensation after your separation from the service.

Q - President Kennedy recently asked the VA to pay 1961 GI insurance dividends as soon as possible. When will this be completed?

A - Payment of the 1961 dividend was completed by March 17, 1961, with the exception of some veterans not reached because of address changes, etc.

Q - I had active service from January 1, 1920, to March 12, 1922. I hold an honorable discharge. Can I cansider myself a veteran?

A - Yes, you are a veteran by virtue of your military service. However, you are not a veteran of a "war period." World War I eligibility for benefits is con-sidered as starting April 6, 1917, and ending on November 11, 1918, except for those veterans who served with the United States Military Forces in Russia, in which case the war period starts April 6, 1917, and ends April 1, 1920.

Q - I have found an error in my World War II service record. When can I get it corrected?

A - Submit proof that your record is incorrect to the service involved - Army, Navy, Air Force or Coast Guard - im-



#### **County Is Ahead Of Goal In Sales Of Savings Bonds**

Q - Is there a simple way to determine whether a veteran or dependent is eligible to receive pension under the old or new pension laws?

A - Yes. The magic date is June 30, 1960. A veteran or dependent receiving and entitled to receive a pension from the VA on June 30, 1960, is eligible to receive pension under the old law but can elect under the new law. Those who became entitled after June 30, 1960, must come under the new law.
