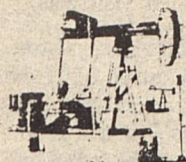

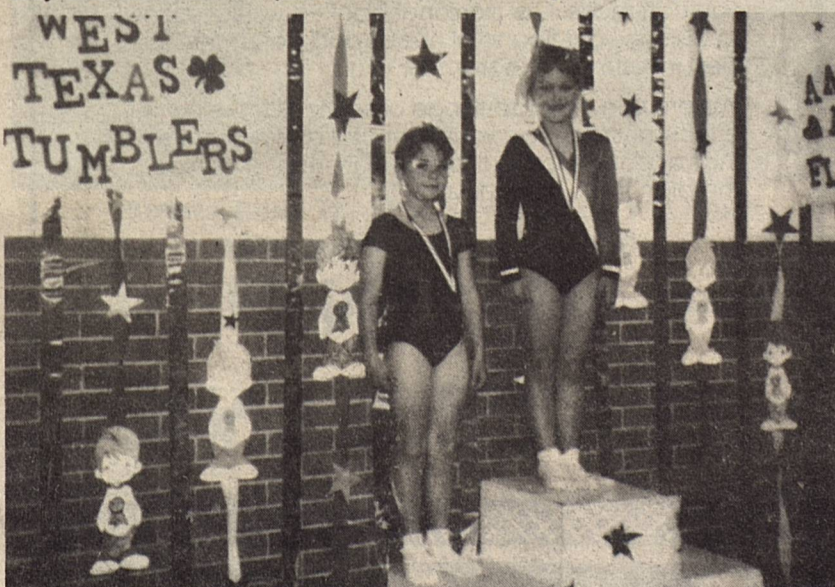

Texas Public Schools Week To Be Observed In Plains

Plains Independent School District will be among 1100 school systems in the State which will be observing Texas Public Schools Week on March 7 through 11, 1988.

"Although parents and the public are invited to visit our schools throughout the school year, we extend a special invitation during Texas Public Schools Week to join in a powerful partnership that will make a difference for the future of our state," Dean Andrews said.

"The youngsters who entered kindergarten in September will be the graduates of the year 2000. But last year, 86,000 Texas students dropped out of school. That's 86,000 drop-outs who lost their options in life. That's 86,000 drop-outs whose survival will cost you and your children billions of dollars in welfare, unemployment and in crime," Andrews said.

"More and more, we are coming to realize that the key to the economic well-being of Texas is our education system. Texas needs useful, educated citizens to meet the challenge of the future. We want everyone to join the partnership with the schools. The task is too important for the schools to tackle alone; we need the support of parents, businesses and all citizens

to ensure a brighter future," Andrews said.

On Friday, March 11, Plains Junior High School will offer a one-act-play dinner theatre. Tickets must be obtained from any one-act-play cast or crew member, or from the Plains High School office.

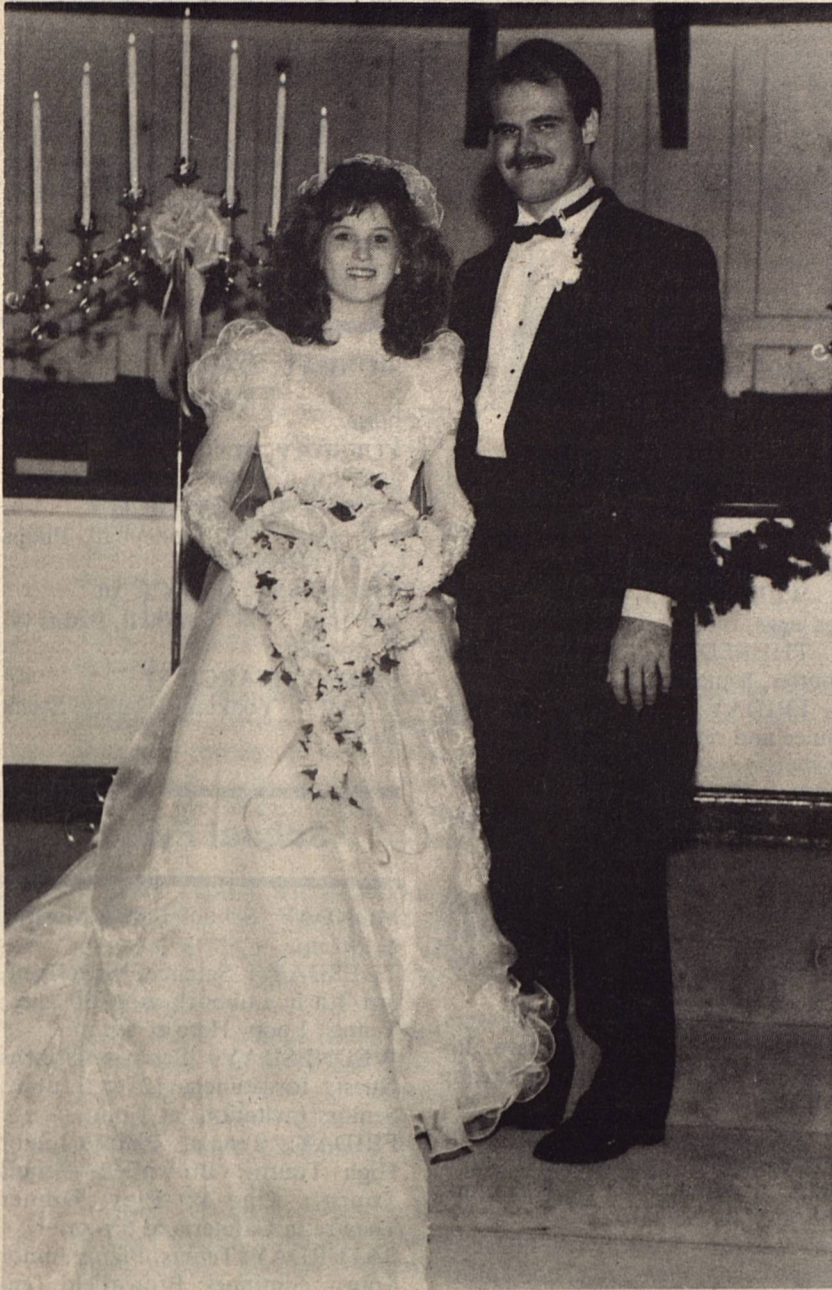

From The Superintendent's Desk

We have been involved recently with various groups that are studying the Edgewood v. Kirby lawsuit. You will be hearing a lot more about this lawsuit in the future because it is definitely going to affect the way schools will be financed in the future.

The financing of public schools is only one aspect of equal educational opportunity, but it is a facet upon which has been focused much of the interest of public policy makers and the courts for the past two decades. National attention turned to school finance equity in the late 1960s as a desegregation (1954), legislative reapportionment (1962), and the protection of the civil rights of the poor (1965).

Texans have become increasingly familiar with the term "Equalization" over the past 15 years. Even though equalization has been a legislative goal since 1915, interests in the concept was quickened by the Rodriguez Case in 1971 and subsequent discussion in several legislative sessions, culminating in House Bill 72 in 1984. The 1987 state court decision in Edgewood v. Kirby, which overturned the state school finance structure as unconstitutional, has further increased interest in school finance equity in Texas. As this case winds its way through the channels of appeal, attention will continue to be drawn to the issue and problems of resource equalization.

This suit, originally filed in 1984, was tried from Jan. 20 through April 8, 1987. The suit is now in the appellate court with a final decision probably coming in February 1989. It is almost certain that reform development that will be pleasing to all people is impossible, but we must look to developing a plan that is acceptable, workable, and in the best interest of all students of this state. There are no easy answers to the funding of public schools.

Math & Science Team Wins Fifth Sweepstakes Trophy

Plains High School's Math and Science Team brought home yet another Sweepstakes Trophy Saturday when they competed in the Lubbock Cooper Pre-UIL Meet. The accounting and writing team joined in this meet.

Micah Stowe and Shane McMinn tied for first place in the veteran division calculator competition. Their score of 335 each was high score for both large and small schools. Chad Guetersloh was fourth in the veteran division. Lance Morrow was second, Nieves Garcia, third and Layne Morrow, seventh in the novice division.

The calculator team posted 915 points for the championship. Runner-up team, Post, scored 535 points. Monterey High School, a 5A school, scored 474 points to lead the large schools division.

Larry Devitt is calculator coach.

Competing in number sense, McMinn was second, Guetersloh, third and Lance Morrow, fifth in the veteran division. Layne Morrow was second, Nieves Garcia, third in the novice division. McMinn's 233 points were the second highest score in the event, in both divisions. The number sense team compiled 547 points to take first place team trophy. Shallowater scored 380 team points for second. Highest scoring large school was Monterey with 414.

Coach is Richie Cullins.

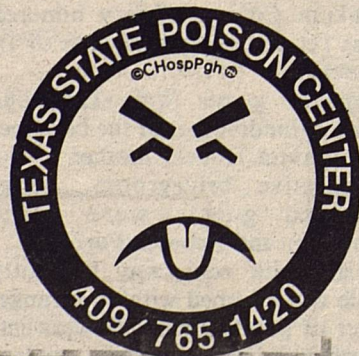
Science competition found McMinn, first and Guetersloh, second in the veteran division. Scoring 102, they were high scorers for the meet in both divisions. In the novice division, Brian Livengood was first, Jesse Ramirez, second and John Harris, fifth. In the junior division, Layne Morrow was second.

McMinn won the overall chemistry award in the veteran division. The science team won the first place trophy with a total of 254 points. Runner-up Abernathy scored 185. Highest ranking large school with 197 points was Monterey High.

Macky McWhirter is science team coach.

Harris was fifth in accounting and Stacy Hinson tied for fourth in literary criticism.

The Math and Science Team will compete March 11-12 in the TMSA State Meet in San Antonio.

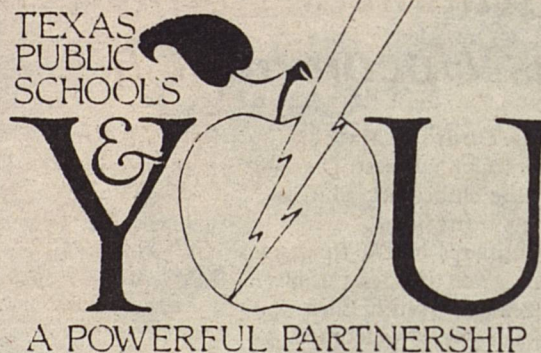

Carol Beth Box directed a program on "Be Prepared For Change".

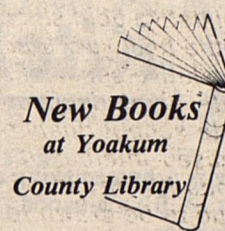
Sheri McGinty resigned as delegate to the District II meeting. Mrs. Redman was elected delegate and Sidney Murphey, alternate.

ANGEL BISCUITS

1 pkg dry yeast
2 T warm water
5 c flour
¼ c sugar
3 t baking powder
1 t soda
1 t salt
1 c shortening
3 c buttermilk

Dissolve yeast in warm water. Combine dry ingredients. Cut in shortening. Add yeast and buttermilk. Knead well, and roll; cut out with biscuit cutter. Bake at 375° for 15-20 mins. Refrigerate dough, and use as needed. Will keep 3-4 weeks.

COCONUT PIE

1½ c sugar
3 eggs, beaten slightly
1 stk oleo, melted
1 t vanilla
1 t vinegar
1 sm can coconut
pecans, if desired

Mix and pour into unbaked pie shell. Bake 45 mins. at 325°.

PINEAPPLE CAKE

2 c flour
½ t soda, sifted in flour
1½ c sugar
1 egg
1 lge (15¼ oz) can crushed pineapple, drained

Mix in order given and bake in a 13x8 greased and floured pan at 350° until light brown.

ICING

1 stk oleo
1 can coconut
1 c sugar
1 sm can condensed milk
½ c pecans
1 t vanilla

Bring to a boil and cook for 2 mins. Slightly beat mixture and pour over cake while cake is still warm.

Letter To Editor

Dear Editor:

The March 8th Democratic Party primary ballot has a referendum issue with the following proposal to vote FOR or AGAINST: "Texans shall maintain their right to select judges by a direct vote of the people rather than change to an appointment process created by the Legislature."

All voters in the Democratic Party primary will have an opportunity to express their opinion as to whether Texans should retain their right to choose judges by direct vote of the people or whether the Legislature should be empowered to create some type of appointment process.

Texans should vote in favor of this referendum issue and in favor of retaining the right to vote to select Texas Judges for several reasons. The most obvious reason is that the right to vote is an important and cherished right in Texas. The right to choose the office-holders who control the justice system that affects every citizen should be preserved for the people.

Those who would abolish the right to vote to select judges and who would replace that system with an appointive process would have judicial selections controlled by a few politicians and their hand-picked cronies, hidden from public view.

Some people feel that the present system allows too much money to be spent in campaign contributions by a few special interests. The solution to that problem is simple and obvious - limit campaign contributions, just as we do in federal elections. Control the money, but don't take away the right to vote.

Protect your right to vote. Let the people choose their judges. Vote "FOR" the referendum on March 8th.

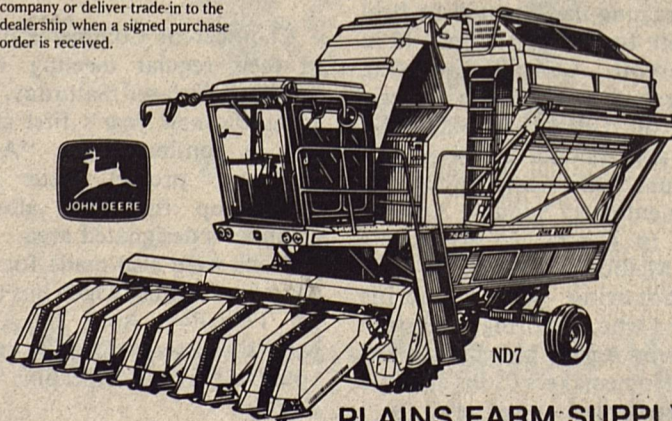

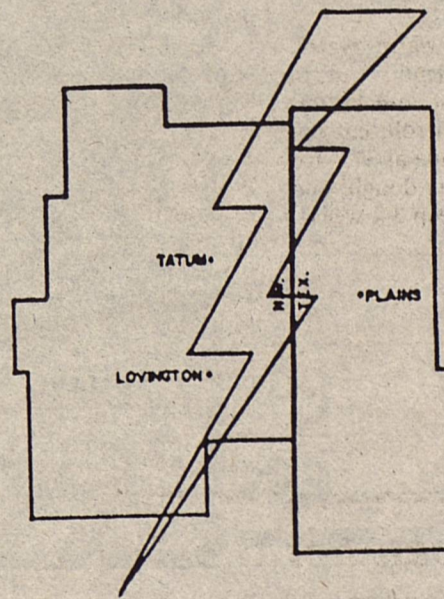
