Helen's parents moved to Plains in the fall of 1942 and on to the Turner Community the following February. Her husband, William, was born and reared in Yoakum County.

"Outside of Staci," says Helen, "I enjoy arranging silk flowers and so forth. I like almost anything I can do as handwork." That handwork pleasure includes quilting and crocheting.

BEACON HILL COOKIES
Melt over hot water:
$1 / 2$ of a 6 oz pkg chocolate chips Beat 2 egg whites with a dash of salt until foamy; gradually add $1 / 2$ c sugar, beating well. Beat until stiff. Beat in $1 / 2 \mathrm{t}$ vanilla and $1 / 2 \mathrm{t}$ vinegar; fold in melted chocolate chips, $3 / 4 \mathrm{c}$ coconut and $1 / 2 \mathrm{c}$ chopped nuts. Drop by teaspoons onto greased cookie sheet. Bake in $250^{\circ}$ oven for 10 mins.

## TOMATO JUICE CAKE

Cream together: 1 egg, 1 c sugar, $1 / 2$ c shortening. Sift dry ingredients together and mix 1 t nutmeg, 1 t cinnamon, 1 t cloves, 1 t soda, 2 c flour. Mix in 1 c tomato juice. Add 1 c raisins, 1 c chopped nuts (pecans). Bake in greased and floured tube pan at $350^{\circ}$ until toothpick is clean.

ICING FOR CAKE
18 oz pkg cream cheese or pure cream
peeling grated from one orange, if desired
juice of orange

Mix with powdered sugar. Spread on cake when cool. Add chopped nuts if wanted.

## HAMBURGER PATTIES

2 lb lean hamburger
1 sm chopped onion
1 med chopped fresh tomato
$1 / 2 \mathrm{c}$ or whatever, chopped bell pepper
salt \& pepper to taste
crumbs of 3 or 4 light bread heels little flour to make it stick together 1 egg
Mix all these in large bowl together then take smaller amounts and press out real thin patties about the size of a saucer. Break 1 slice of American cheese in half. Now put the half pieces of cheese on the meat patties and fold over making a half moon shape. Work edges of meat together so NO cheese is showing. Fry in iron skillet on one side then turn. It's good! These may be put on cookie sheet and frozen. Then removed and put in wrap or zip lock bag. Take out as needed.

## Plains Independent School District

From The Superintendent's Desk Dean Andrews

During the next three weeks we will have guest editors of this column. Our school principals will be writing the articles during this time. This week I would like to write once again of the possible changes in public school financing in Texas.

Changes in Texas School Finance and Governance are coming, and there is no debate about that statement....But there is debate about what the changes will be.

Boards and superintendents throughout Texas have expressed great concern that massive changes in the public school are imminent. Sadly, many citizens and educators are uninformed about the consequences of these coming changes.

Failure to prepare for change could be devastating for Texas school districts and for public school children and youth.

As it now stands, the 71st Texas Legislature has an almost impossible task in finding a school finance solution. In the most farreaching decision ever handed down by a state court on public education, Judge Harley Clark declared the current finance system unconstitutional.

The Judge directed the Legislature to set up a new public school finance system by 1989 that will meet his interpretation of constitutionality. If one is not developed, an injunction will be issued cutting off ALL state funds for the Foundation School Program.

Judge Clark's decision is currently on appeal. It is possible that the decision will be overturned by the higher court. Most educators are convinced that despite a reversal, the Legislature will remain under pressure to make substantial revisions in the current school funding system.

Only school districts that are united and cooperating can hope to be effective in bringing positive change to Texas education. Some change is needed in the school finance system, but wholesale restructuring of governance of school districts must be avoided.

According to Judge Clark's ruling, the 71st Legislature has the following options available: 1) Raise $\$ 5$ billion NEW tax dollars; 2) Place caps on school district spending; 3) Consolidate over 1,000 school districts into twenty or fewer school districts. 4) Submit to the voters of Texas constitutional amendments that guarantee the present school district boundaries and permit use of an improved version of the present finance system; 5) A combination of two or more of the above; or 6) Take all mineral, utilities, and industrial properties, removing these from local school district tax base.
