# Yoakum SWCD Encouraging Citizens To Join Observance

Emphasizing everyone's roll in protecting soil and water resources for future generations, the Yoakum County Soil and Water Conservation District is encouraging local churches, organizations and individuals, to join the nationwide observance of soil and water stewardship week April 24-May 1.

The local district, which works throughout the year on soil and water conservation measures, is providing literature and speakers that highlight man's responsibility to be active stewards of our nations soil and water resources.

David Turnbough, chairman of the Yoakum County SWCD, said while farmers and ranchers know that good conservation practices help increase yields and improve their profit potential, they also know the importance of passing on well-cared-for natural resources for future food producers. "We could give our children all the money in the world, but it would do them little good unless we give them a productive soil on which to live," said Turnbough.

Since 1955, the National Association of Conservation Districts has sponsored soil and water stewardship week in cooperation with nearly 3,000 local conservation districts

nationwide, as one way to emphasize the importance of good stewardship of basic soil and water resources.



# Plains Independent School District

Guest Editorial...JOHN NANCE, Elementary Principal

The students of Plains Elementary School have been involved with taking SRA tests this past week. The question often arises as to the value of so much testing. With SRA, TEAMS, teacher-made assessments, and other diagnostic tests, teachers spend a great deal of time and effort in assessment-related activities. In fact research has shown that teachers may spend as much as 20 to 30 percent of their professional time in testing activities. Classroom assessments are tools which teachers use to determine whether the pace of instruction is appropriate and whether instructional objectives have been met. So testing is necessary.

Testing can help in identifying the strengths and weaknesses of students. Such information is very important, especially when testing may identify tomorrow's school dropout. This may sound like a strange statement coming from an elementary principal, but potential dropouts can be identified in each grade, no matter what level.

In a recent U.S. General Accounting Office survey, the G.A.O. reported that the most common reason for leaving school is poor academic performance. A child's abilities in the basic skills are the single best predictors of dropping out of school. Studies of school dropouts across the nation indicate that dropouts are more likely than other students to have scored low or failed standardized tests. As you can see from this research, potential school dropouts can be indentified at a very early age with the help of testing.

The information we receive from assessment instruments not only identifies the success of a student, but also can relate, to a degree, the success of a teacher. A successful teacher is one that has a class of successful achievers. The biggest disappointment a teacher has is when one of his/her students fail. To have failed with a student is one of the hardest things to accept as a teacher.

Like it or not, testing is necessary. Though painful and time consuming, the information the test produces is most valuable. This is why Plains Elementary School students have been active in taking tests recently.



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# Temperatures Critical For Good Cotton Stand

Spring rains and temperature variations make it critical that cotton farmers pay close attention to the five-day weather forecast, says a cotton agronomist, Dr. James Supak.

Proper moisture, aeration and temperature conditions are essential for good germination and emergence of cotton, Supak said.

If fields are too dry at planting, it hinders germination and seedling development; if they are too wet, it restricts the oxygen needed for germinating seed, Supak noted. And cottonseed are highly vulnerable to chilling injury for approximately five days after planting, he stressed.

"Ideally, soil moisture levels at planting are at or near field capacity," Supak said. "This not only assures adequate moisture for seed hydration, but also sufficient oxygen to support the germination."

Inadequate moisture slows the germination and seedling development and may even be fatal to stands if fields "dry out" too rapidly, the Extension agronomist said. "Waterlogged conditions, on the other hand, restrict free air movement to germinating seed and the lack of oxygen may also cause stand failure," he noted.

The ideal temperatures for cotton

The ideal temperatures for cotton germination are around 75 to 80 degrees Fahrenheit. Because of the short growing season on the Texas High Plains, Supak said, most cotton is planted into much cooler soil.

"The earliest recommended date for planting occurs when the 10-day average of the minimum soil temperature at the eight-inch soil depth reaches 60°F," Supak said. Cottonseed requires about 100 hours with temperature above 64° at seed level for germination and initial emergence.

For about five days after planting, cottonseed are highly vulnerable to chilling injury, the Extension specialist emphasized. This vulnerable period usually has two phases: The hydration phase, which may last up to 48 hours after planting, and the enzyme activation period, which can occur from 48 to about 120 hours after planting.

"During the hydration phase,

seed zone temperatures of 40° or less for as few as four hours can be fatal," Supak said. Other symptoms of chilling injury include delayed emergence and low seedling vigor.

Temperatures below 50°F during the enzyme activation phase contribute to the leakage of sugars, amino acids and electrolytes through delicate membranes, the agronomist said. "The result is a weakened seedling that is more susceptible to diseases and environmental stresses. Chilling injury during this phase results in more abnormal plants, delayed crop maturity and reduced yields."

Seed zone temperatures of 50°F or less aren't uncommon in late April and early May, Supak warned.

"Delaying planting until the 10-day average minimum temperature at eight inches reaches 60°F provides some assurance that temperatures in the seed zone won't drop to these critical levels," he said.

To minimize chilling injury, the agronomist urged producers to also consider extended weather forecasts when selecting a planting date. "Keep in mind that the five days after planting are critical. Plantings just ahead of a wet cold front are likely to encounter periods when soil temperatures in the seed zone fall below the critical 50-degree level."

David Kight, Yoakum County Agent, recommends a general planting time of April 26 in southern Yoakum County and around May 4 for the rest of the county. In all cases, the long range forecast needs to be looked at before planting.


