

Four Plains Youngsters To Compete In World Meet

Power tumbling their way into their second World Championships are Plains' youngsters, Ashlee, Ladd and Shyloh Winn. The competitive event for power tumbling, trampoline and mini trampoline is scheduled for Lubbock. Also scheduled to compete in the World Meet is another Plains youngster, Chase Clanahan. Sherry Arnwine is coach of the talented young com-

In his first World competition, Chase has been in gymnastics five vears and has won various awards. Maintaining an A average in school, he is also active in 4-H, UIL and plays baseball and basketball.

The young Winns were a bit disappointed to find the World Meet so close to home, having competed in the last world competition in Paris, France. Held every two years, the 1990 World Age Group Games will be held in Germany.

Eight hundred competitors from 29 countries are expected to compete in the 1988 World Meet in Lub-

Ashlee, 13, is hoping for her first World title. She brought home the bronze medal in tumbling from the Nationals Meet in Rockford. She placed fifth in platform tumbling.

At the State Meet in Lubbock. Ashlee won first in trampoline and first in synchronized trampoline. She went on to win the silver medal in tumbling and double mini and to be named STTA's Girl of the Year. She was awarded a plaque and bouquet of red roses.

Shyloh Winn, eight, will compete in the World Meet against nine and ten-year-olds. She placed fourth at Nationals in trampoline and was the youngest competitor to perform a double twisting back flip in the platform competition. She placed tenth in tumbling.

In the State Meet, Shyloh placed second in tumbling, third in trampoline and fourth in double mini.

The World Age Group Games will be held May 17-22 in Lubbock Memorial Civic Center. Opening ceremonies begin at 6 p.m. Wednesday, May 18 in exhibit hall. Competition is scheduled from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. daily. Free block tickets are available to groups or classes wishing to see the competition.

Admission at the door is \$1 for students and \$2 for adults.

Cholesterol & Triglyceride Screenings Slated

Cholesterol and triglyceride screenings will be held Thursday, May 12, 9 to 11 a.m. at the Denver City Community Building and Thursday, May 19, 9 to 11 a.m. at the Plains Clubroom. The

cholesterol screening will cost \$5; triglyceride, \$5. Those being screened will need to fast for twelve hours prior to testing. The screenings are a cooperative effort being made by the Yoakum County Extension Homemakers, Yoakum County Hospital, Department of Health and Chamber of Commerce.

High blood cholesterol levels is one of the risk factors associated with coronary heart disease. High

cholesterol levels can be controlled through diet and lifestyle changes.

Healthy Lifestyle programs will be conducted in June and July by County Extension Agent, Mary D. Williams. The first program is scheduled for June 15.





Mary D. Williams Reports Of Beef Fight-Back Program

For beef producers, it's all coming down to a fight for survival. After years of beef-bashing by consumer activists, beef producers now realize that their only choice is to fight back.

It's not a fight that the beef industry wanted. But when a misinformed minority suggest that beef is not healthy or that it has somehow become an old-fashioned food, it's a fight the industry must accept. For beef producers, the time has come to fight back with the facts.

These days, the entire industry is working together. It's fighting back with its own program called the Beef Checkoff.

What the Checkoff is about is changing consumer attitudes towards beef in order to increase consumption and demand in the short and long term. When an industry decides to promote itself, it can mean more profits for everybody.

The Checkoff is a producer-run program that seeks to win back beef eaters through consumer education, research, promotion and advertising. The way the Checkoff works is simple: every producer - even importers - invests \$1 per head of cattle sold. The funds are used for more than 100 programs whose sole purpose is to promote more beef consumption. And it is operated by the producers themselves. There is a 113 member Beef Board that makes all the decisions about how money is spent.

A common misperception is that Checkoff dollars somehow go to fancy offices, high salaries, or lots of airplane travel. "The fact is that Beef Board administrative costs for the Beef Checkoff are strictly limited, by law, to no more than five percent of the funds collected," says Mary D. Williams, County Extension agent.

Initial Checkoff results are indeed impressive. One recent survey shows that the number of consumers who believe beef is an important part of a well-balanced diet increased from 51 percent to 56 percent over a six month period.

But, some producers ask, is it really the Checkoff that's causing this positive shift in consumer attitudes? The answer appears to be "yes".

On May 10, every beef producer will have a chance to vote in a referendum on the future of the Beef Checkoff.


Anyone who has owned cattle between Oct. 1, 1986 (the start of the Checkoff program) and March 31, 1988 is eligible to vote regardless of age. Voting will take place at local County Extension Offices during normal business hours, and absentee ballots became available in most states beginning in early April.






