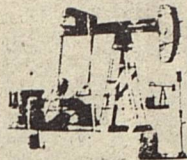

District Attorney Cites Successful War On Crime

District Attorney Linda Lowrey was guest speaker Thursday for the regular luncheon meeting of Plains Lions Club.

Commenting on the county's war against hot checks, Ms. Lowrey stated that \$8,342.24 in fines for hot check cases were collected in Yoakum County in 1987 and the total through June 1988 is \$6,319.50. This is a 23 percent increase for the first six months of 1988 as compared for the same period in 1987. She stated CDA office has paid out a total of \$18,806.07 in restitution to merchants for hot checks in 1987 and the first half year of 1988 shows an increase of 41 percent over the same period last year.

Ms. Lowrey said there were 122 misdemeanors filed through June 1988; with DWI cases increased by 45 percent and drug cases up 11 percent. Alcohol and drug cases accounted for 57 percent of the misdemeanors filed, she said.

Reporting felony statistics, she said that DWI cases comprise 16 percent of the total number filed through June 1988, 37. Adding drug cases brings the percentage to 21 percent.

Theft related offenses of burglary, theft and unauthorized use of a motor vehicle make up 38 percent of the felony total.

Revenues generated by criminal cases, Ms. Lowrey reported, totaled \$48,440 for the first six months in 1988. Total fines collected by the District and County Courts for 1987 was \$72,603.50.

Ms. Lowrey stated that she and her staff are grateful for the efforts of all persons who make up the criminal justice system in Yoakum County.

Class of 1983 To Hold Reunion

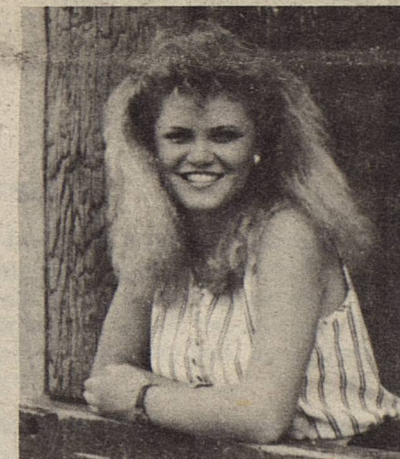

Commissioners' Court



Yoakum County Commissioners Court met in regular session Monday morning.

Reports were given on taxes collected in June and the treasurer's second quarterly report was presented.

Bids were opened for the purchase of a new copier for the County Clerk's office. Accepted was a bid for a 60 month lease from Lamesa Printing. Other bids were submitted by Seminole Sentinel and IBM.

Extra hire and disbursements were approved for payment including hospital bills totaling \$97,218.16. Line item transfers were made to take care of anticipated expenditures for the balance of 1988 for Plains Library.

The court approved an easement allowing the City of Denver City access to alley at the south city limits of Denver City.

Election judges and alternate judges were appointed for one year terms beginning Aug. 1 and election precinct boundaries set to remain unchanged. Named as judges and alternates were Chip Bennett and Kent Davis, Election Precinct 1-5; Marjorie Freeman and Kathy Smiley, Election Precinct 1-6; Pauline Hilburn and Earlene Freeman, Election Precinct 2-2; Maurine Wehrend and Pearl Prewitt, Election Precinct 2-7; Pat Henard and Deryl Hobbs, Election Precinct 3-3; Lloyd Steele and Mrs. Lloyd Steele, Election Precinct 3-8; Nick Ford and Sandra Ford, Election Precinct 4-1; Louise Tuggle and Louise Goehry, Election Precinct 4-4; and Lanny Smith and Sheron Smith, Absentee Ballot Board.

In final action by the Court, one bid was received and accepted for seal coating four or more miles of roads for precinct four.

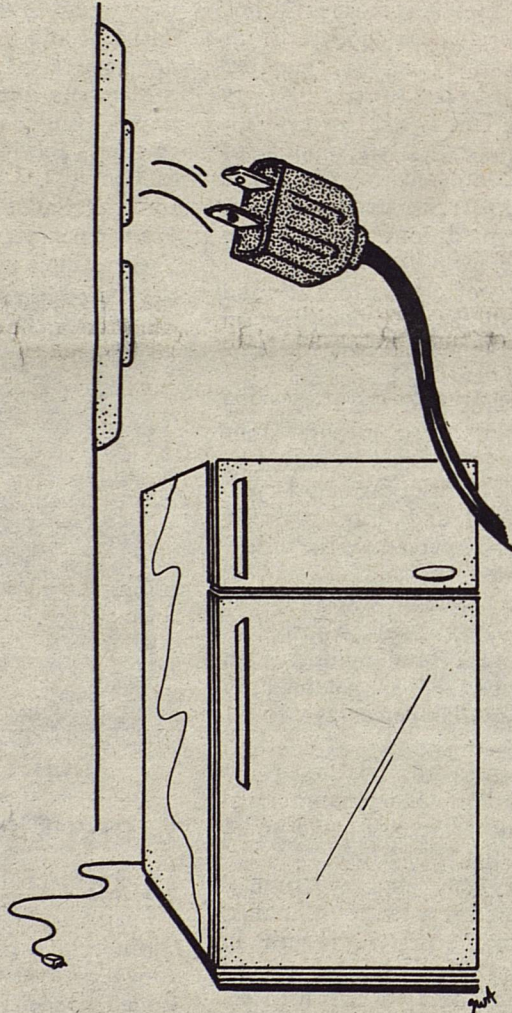

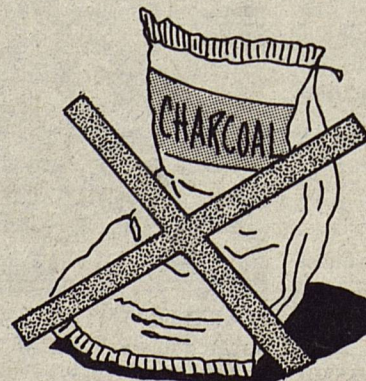

LIGHTS OUT!

You can make many preparations ahead of time to deal with a power outage. What steps can you take to ensure safety once the outage occurs?

- Shut off and/or unplug appliances with electric motors or electric heating elements until after service is restored. This will prevent voltage surge damage when the electricity comes back on.
- Keep refrigerators and freezers tightly closed to maintain the refrigerated atmosphere and preserve frozen and fresh foods for long periods without power. Opening the doors rapidly exhausts this atmosphere.
- Use any combustion-type heater (natural gas or liquid gas, wood) or lighting only in properly ventilated areas to avoid burning up the breathable air. Burning charcoal indoors will replace breathable oxygen with deadly carbon monoxide gas.
- Conserve your heating and lighting fuel. Move into one room or area of the house that can be closed off or insulated.

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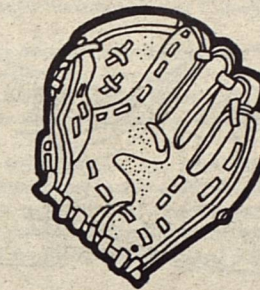

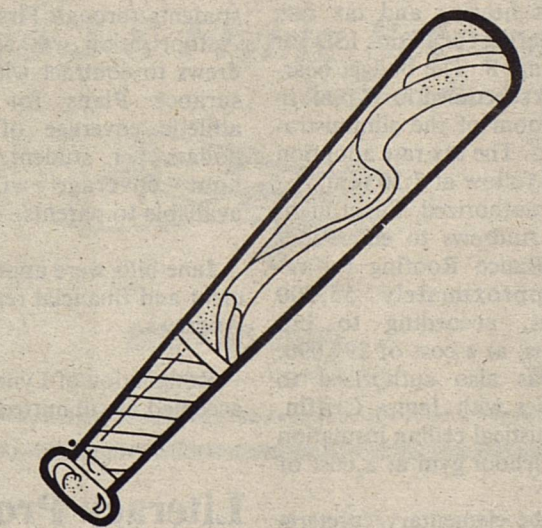

From The Superintendent's Desk

As students continue to enjoy a well-deserved summer break, summer work continues at school. Asbestos removal has begun on schedule and workmen are beginning to install acoustical tile in the high school gymnasium. Auditorium seats have been checked and re-upholstered as necessary, as have bus and vehicle seats. Soon, gym floors will be refinished. Maintenance employees continue to paint and clean and repair. In the transportation department vehicles are being checked, cleaned, and repaired as necessary.

Bids have been let for contracts to supply our school cafeteria with dairy products, and our transportation department with gasoline products for the 1988-89 school year. As contracts are awarded, administrators continue to build and refine the budget for the coming year.

Teachers, coaches, principals, and our Superintendent are attending workshops, seminars and clinics in order to sharpen and refresh their skills. School Board members have attended training and study sessions, and everyone involved in school business is busy with preparations for the 1988-89 school year.

We hope that while students are enjoying their summer break, they are also planning ahead. Perhaps our students can begin to set some goals, or to think about how they can sharpen their study skills and become even more successful in the coming year. In a few weeks school will begin again -- a fresh and new school year and all of us at Plains Schools want it to be another great year for our students. Let us all plan to that end.

Budget & Tax Rate Hearings To Be Held By School Board

School board members in regular session Thursday evening set the annual budget hearing and tax rate adoption hearing for Plains ISD for Monday, Aug. 8. The budget hearing has been scheduled for 7 p.m. in the board room of the administration building. The tax rate adoption hearing will follow at 7:30 p.m.

Trustees authorized Superintendent Dean Andrews to enter contract with Ranco Roofing for re-roofing approximately 55,000 square feet, according to bid specifications, at a cost of \$97,990. Andrews was also authorized to enter contract with James Griffin, Inc. for acoustical ceiling insulation in the high school gym at a cost of \$21,189.

Bids on the elementary/cafeteria project were rejected.

Also accepted was a bid by Carpet World for Type II carpet at a cost of \$21,884.40 plus \$1 per yard for tile removal and a maximum of \$500 for crack filler with total not to exceed \$24,393.40.

Trustees also authorized carpeting of four additional elementary classrooms and five high school rooms for a grand total of \$29,590.40.

Superintendent Andrews was also authorized to enter contract with Tarpley Music Company for installation of a sound system in the auditorium at a cost of \$9,643.85.

Bids for supplying milk for the 1988-89 school year were opened with the nod given to Borden's. Rip Griffin Inc. was awarded the contract for gasoline products for the upcoming school year.

The board also approved all-school insurance coverage for students through First Agency Inc. Authorization was also given Andrews to contract with Student Insurance Plans for catastrophic athletic coverage of one million dollars per student. Twenty-four hour coverage will be made available to parents.

June bills were approved for payment and financial reports given by Andrews.

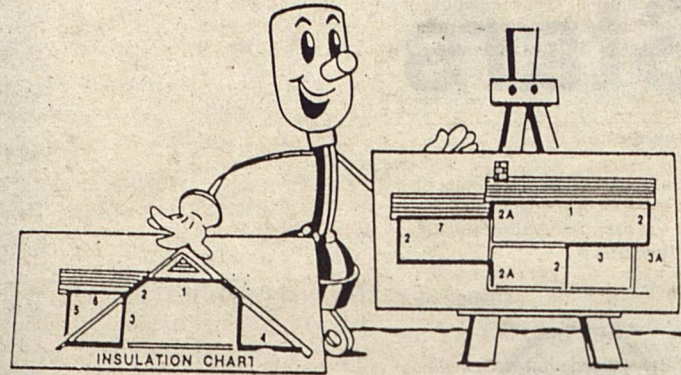
Resignation of Lynn Simpson was accepted as submitted.

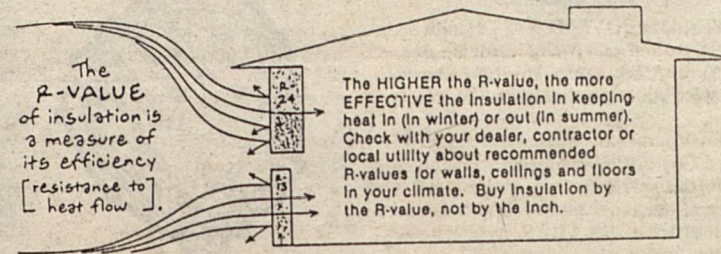

On or about August 1, 1988, the above-named City of Plains will request the Texas Department of Commerce to release Federal funds under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 as amended, to be used for the following project:

ACTIVITY TEXAS COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM
 Water Improvements 1987 Texas Department of Commerce Contract

Project to be located in the City limits of Plains, Yoakum County, Texas within Enumeration District #26 and #27. A more detailed description of the project and a map showing the specific locations of the proposed improvements is available for public examination at City Hall, 601 East Eleventh Street.

Finding of No Significant Impact

It has been determined that such request for release of funds will not constitute an action significantly affecting the quality of the human environment and accordingly the above-named City of Plains has decided not to prepare an Environmental Impact Statement under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969.

The Reasons for such decision not to prepare such Statement are as follows:

WATER IMPROVEMENTS - Health and safety hazards currently exist due to inadequate fire protection and insufficient potable domestic water. The proposed project should eliminate those health and safety hazards. Construction activities will produce certain amounts of air and noise pollution, however, the effects will be short term and low intensity.

An Environmental Assessment respecting the within project has been made by the above-named City of Plains which documents the environmental review of the project and more fully sets forth the reasons why such Statement is not required. This Environmental Assessment is on file at the above address and is available for public examination and copying upon request in the office of the City Secretary between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Public Comments on Finding

All interested agencies, groups and persons disagreeing with this decision are invited to submit written comments for consideration by the City of Plains, to the office of the undersigned. Such written comments should be received at City Hall on or before July 29, 1988. All such comments so received will be considered and the City of Plains, will not request the release of Federal funds or take any administrative action on the within project prior to the date specified in the preceding sentence.

Release of Funds

The City of Plains will undertake the project described above with Community Development funds from the Texas Department of Commerce under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974. The City of Plains is certifying to TDOC that the City of Plains and T.J. Miller in his official capacity as Mayor consent to accept the jurisdiction of the Federal Courts if an action is brought to enforce responsibilities in relation to environmental assessments, decision making and action; and that these responsibilities have been satisfied. The legal effect of the certification is that upon its approval the City of Plains may use the Texas Community Development Program funds and TDOC will have satisfied its responsibilities under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969.

Objections to State Release of Funds

Texas Department of Commerce will accept an objection to its approval only if it is on one of the following basis: (a) that the certification was not in fact executed by the certifying officer or other officer of applicant approved by TDOC; or (b) that applicant's environmental review record for the project indicates omission of a required decision finding or step applicable to the project in the environmental review process. Objections must be prepared and submitted in accordance with the required procedure (24 CFR Part 58.75) and may be addressed to Texas Community Development Program; Texas Department of Commerce, P.O. Box 12728, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711.

Objections to the release of funds on basis other than those stated above will not be considered by TDOC. No objection received after August 17, 1988 will be considered by TDOC. The Chief Executive Officer of the City of Plains is T.J. Miller, Mayor.
