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## APPLE PIE

1 recipe double crust pastry
2 pounds apples, cored, peeled, sliced (about 6 cups)
1 tablespoon lemon juice
3/4 cup sugar
1 tablespoon Argo corn starch
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1 tablespoon Mazola margarine
Line 9 -inch pie plate with one-half pastry rolled to $1 / 8$-inch thickness, allowing 1 -inch overhang. In large bowl toss apple slices with lemon juice. In small bowl stir sugar, corn starch and cinnamon. Add to apples; toss to coat well. Spoon into pie plate. Dot with margarine. Roll out remaining pastry to 12 -inch circle. Cover pie with pastry; seal and flute edge. If desired, reroll excess pastry; cut out apple shape. Place in center of top crust. If desired, brush crust lightly with milk and sprinkle with sugar. Make several slits in top crust to permit steam to escape. Bake in $425^{\circ} \mathrm{F}$ oven 50 minutes or until crust is golden and apples are tender. Makes 8 servings.

Our school board members and I attended the 28th Annual T.A.S.A.-T.A.S.B. Convention in San Antonio this past week along with 8,000 other board members and superintendents from around the state.

Some thoughts and concerns that were expressed across the state were interesting and I would like to share them with you this week.

1 think that we are focusing on the State Board of Education election to be conducted on November 8, 1988. I encourage each of you to vote in this election because this elected board will play a major role in the future of education in this state. The candidates are Paul Dunn, Democrat of Levelland, and Monte Hasie, Republican from Lubbock.

The S.B.O.E. is responsible for adopting rules for accreditation; investing permanent school funds, adopting rules for certifying teachers, administrators, and aides; adopting procedures for budgetary control, expending, and auditing of the budgets adopted; and all other laws placed on the central education agency of Texas.

Our meetings also dealt with school finance, personnel, curriculum, student-related concerns/at risk students, internal and external communications, long-range or strategic planning, applications for the use of technology, and Edgewood vs. Kirby law suit. We also had the opportunity to see exhibits of school supplies, furniture, buses, computers, roofing, air conditioning/heating and carpeting.

I think the most important aspect might be the association with other board members across the state. We all have the same concerns in wanting to provide the best education possible for all students.
