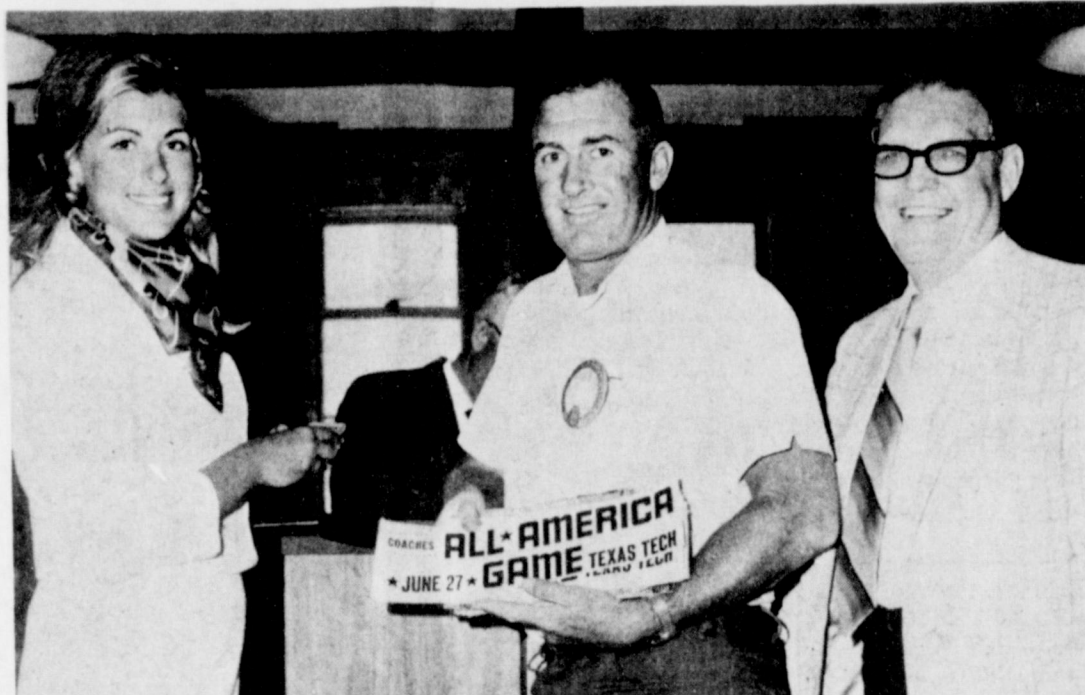

Because of the uniqueness of the name of 'Muleshoe' she and a friend decided to do a story about the town. "Now," she said, "I can tell my friend that I have finally visited the Muleshoe I wrote about when a third grade student."

The queen then spoke of the 100 years of college football. She said the first football game between colleges was played in 1869 between Princeton and Rutgers.

Spicing her brief talk with humorous incidents which had happened since she became the NCAA Centennial Queen, one of the incidents she told occurred at the Texas-Arkansas game in December while she was talking with President Nixon.

Queen Specht went on to tell of the upcoming Coaches All-American football game and what an impression could be made by local people supporting the game. She cited some of

### MISD School Board Initiates Changes

Meeting in special session Monday night, the school board for the Muleshoe Independent school board initiated several changes for the coming year.

Approved during the meeting were several new programs and projects authorized or made mandatory by the State Legislature during their last session.

Included was the new Kindergarten Program for Elementary Schools which will start in the school year of 1970-1971. The program was made mandatory through the Sixty-first Legislature.

The program will be educationally or economically deprived children who have reached the age of five years, five months.

An educationally handicapped child was defined as "being a child who cannot speak, read or comprehend the English language to the extent that he is not familiar with common English words that are necessary for normal progress in the first grade or a child who is from a family whose annual income is \$3,000 or less."

The school board also changed the curriculum in the junior high and dropped penmanship from the sixth grade; included art courses for sixth and seventh grade students and added Home and Family Living for eighth grade students. Mrs. Mac Moore will teach the course,

which is not a required course. Also added to the curriculum at Muleshoe High School is an E. M. R. Special Education

Joe Smith of First Southwest Co. will be the official bondsman and architect approved was Winger and Sharp of Wichita Falls.

### School Registration For Migrants Slated

Monday, June 8 and Tuesday, June 9 from 9:00 a.m. - 3:00 p.m. are Registration Days for the migrant children who will attend the Summer School beginning June 10, 1970 and ending August 5, 1970. The Summer Program will be held at the Mary DeShazo Elementary School each day from 8:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.

Any child who has moved into the Muleshoe L.S.D. since January 1, 1967 and whose parents are employed in agriculture or a related processing activity is eligible to attend. Preschool children must be six years old on or before September 1, 1970. Other students may be in grades one through eight.

The Summer School for non-English speaking students will also be held this summer in

cooperation with the Migrant Summer School. Mrs. Robert Sanders will be the teacher again this year for the children who will be six years old on or before September 1, 1970.

The program is not intended to be operated like a regular term classroom. Emphasis will be placed on a multi-sensory approach, a strong program of oral language development, social studies, science, arts and crafts, mathematics, and swimming.

Transportation will be provided for those living far enough from school to need it. Each child will participate in at least four field trips. Each child will receive a breakfast, a hot lunch and a snack each day.

The four boys will compete with other boys their ages for the regional title at 1 p.m. on June 6 in Amarillo Memorial Giant Stadium.

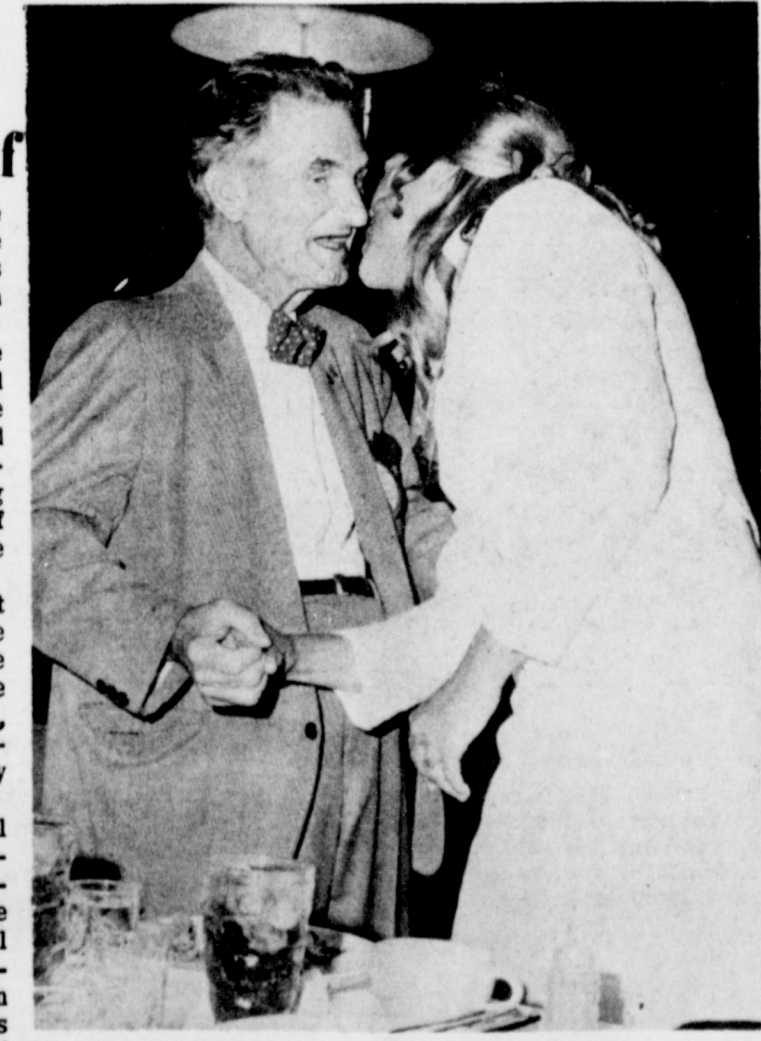

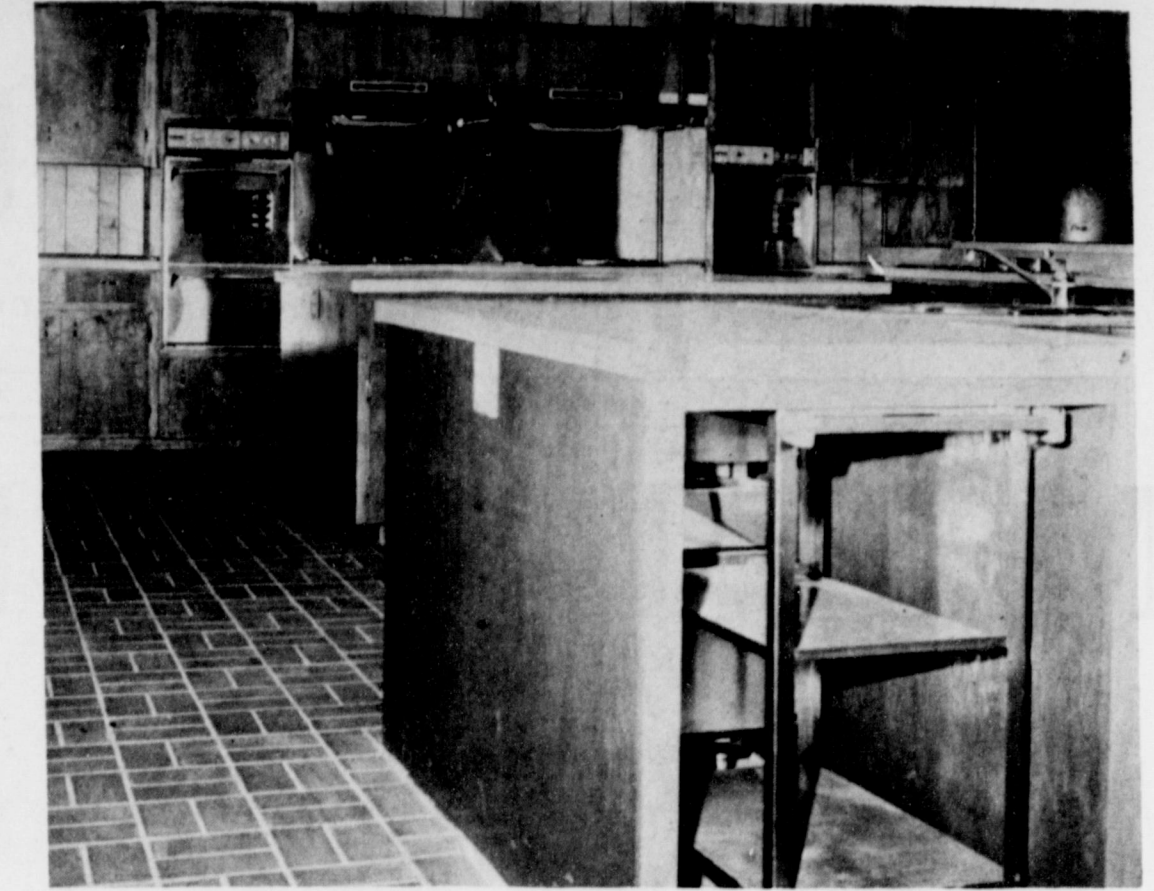

## Grain Bugs Getting Early Start

Greenbugs, those little green aphids which have been attacking grain sorghum on the Texas High Plains for the past few years, have recently been observed infesting small grain sorghum in several counties in the area.

Area Extension Entomologists Dr. Don R. Rummel and Dr. Bill C. Clymer report that greenbugs have been found in some fields in Oldham, Deaf Smith, Parmer, Castro and Bailey counties. "At present, infestations appear to be scattered and spotty," they point out.

"The main thing for producers to do right now is to keep a close check on their fields. Small grain sorghum up to about six inches in height is much more susceptible to greenbug injury than larger plants. Only a few greenbugs per plant may be necessary to damage small grain sorghum and damage in the seedling stage may result in stand loss."

that the extent of greenbug damage depends on greenbug numbers, plant size, stage of growth, plant vigor, moisture conditions and the presence or absence of parasites and predators. Parasites and predators are generally still in low numbers but should increase rapidly as greenbug numbers increase.

"Be sure that greenbugs are present in damaging numbers before starting a spray program," caution Rummel and Clymer. "Several other species of aphids, such as the corn leaf aphid, commonly infest grain sorghum but seldom cause economic damage."

Insecticides recommended for controlling greenbugs include carbofenthiol (Trithion), demeton (Systox), diazin-

on, disulfoton (Di-Syston), malathion and parathion. Disulfoton should not be applied as a foliar spray more than twice per crop season or as
