

# **Brownie Scouts To Sell Girl Scout Cookies Here**

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

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# Our Economic Destiny: In Whose Hands?

The State song "Texas Our Texas" may someday have to be changed to "Texas Their Texas" if we do not act soon to reverse the trend of foreign ownership of Texas businesses.

In the last twelve months, we have seen control of our major banks move from Texas to New York, Chicago, and North Carolina.

Of course, the ultimate solution is a strong Texas economy built on a diversified industrial base. A strong economy will be disinclined and resistant to foreign ownership.

A cooperative effort by the citizenry, business, industry and government can Keep Texas our Texas.

MCorp, the last of Texas' large bank holding companies, is struggling to remain a Texas property. The other gigantic Texas bank holding companies, that faced massive loan defaults, fell to bailouts by out-of-state baking interests.

Now an even more ominous cloud is on our economic horizon.

Recently, the Antitrust Division of the Attorney General's Office received complaints regarding Texaco's sale to Saudi Arabia of half of its refinery operations, including its Port Arthur refinery.

This will adversely affect the ability of

independent Texas businesses to compete in local markets and put thousands of employees at the mercy of foreign interests with no lasting ties to our state.

However terrible the results of such an acquisition, there are no state laws designed to stop or even detect such takeovers by foreign interests and the state's antitrust laws do not provide the answer to this problem.

The economic downturn in the Texas economy has resulted in bargain-basement prices for our businesses and property, and has made them easy targets for anyone with money to invest.

Internationally, as the dollar becomes weaker and weaker, and our trade balance worsens, the result will be increased foreign ownership of the vital industries of our state.

The solution to the problem of foreign ownership of our vital industries will not be easy. A recent bill in the United States Congress by Rep. John Bryant would have required reporting of foreign ownership. Unfortunately, the bill died in the Senate.

State Representative Paul Colbert has announced that a similar bill will be introduced in the Texas Legislature. Other approaches are also possible. However, the time to act is now.

We must require the reporting of foreign ownership. It is not a solution in itself, but such information is necessary if the extent of the problem is to be understood and an immediate remedy is to be found.

# Soil Test For '89 Crops

Soil testing should be one of the first steps in planning your 1989 crop production and now is the time to collect soil samples from fields to be planted in spring crops, said Yoakum County Agricultural Extension Agent Kirk Lewis.

"Cost of a soil test is a minor investment to make for the piece of mind it brings when faced with making fertilizer decisions," Lewis says.

Limited rainfall in may areas of Texas in 1988 resulted in crop yields below the yield goals for which crops were fertilized. Thus, some soils have fertilizer nutrient carry-over that could reduce 1989 fertilizer requirements. But only soil testing can determine the carry-over.

Following soil test recommendations can effectively reduce the per unit cost of producing a commodity and increase the chances of making a profit, says Lewis.

"Of course, a good fertility program can only ensure optimum yields when other conditions affecting crop yields are favorable," he says.

A good plant stand, adequate moisture, good physical condition of the soil and insect, disease and weed control are all important in obtaining profitable returns from money invested in fertilizers.

Crop producers who have not yet made a final decision about which crop to plant on which tield should submit soil samples now and request fertilizer recommendations for several cropping alternatives per soil sample, says Lewis.

"This information can be helpful in making final cropping decisions," he says.

Soil sampling bags and information sheets may be obtained from the Yoakum County Extension office at Plains.

A very good example of a role model to follow in learning contentment is the prophet Habakkuk, who could say:



These are certainly not the words of a man who allows negative circumstances in life to spoil his personal happiness. If we could translate Habakkuk's words into idioms of today, it might read something like this:

Though I'm living in a general recession, and my income has plummeted to zero; though I've lost my job, and my unemployment benefits expired yesterday; though I'm hungry, out of groceries, and don't know where my next meal is coming from; still I will rejoice in the Lord, I find joy in my Savior.





- Worried because you don't have time to sit down to breakfast? Have some leftovers or simple food-an oatmeal cookie, peanut butter sandwich, or even a slice of cold pizza. It doesn't matter that it's not "breakfast food." Your body doesn't differentiate which time of day you eat these foods.
- To fuel your muscles for training sessions, be sure you eat enough carbohydrate foods like bread, potatoes, pasta, fruit and cereal.

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




