

From The Superintendent's Desk

This past week I had the opportunity to attend the National School Board Convention in Anaheim, Calif. with Melvin Lowrey, Jack Palmer, Edwin Livengood, Jack Spears, John Nance, and Wanda Ashburn.

The underlying theme of the conference was the attitude that public education must survive regardless of the cost. We are faced with drug-related problems, teenage pregnancy, drop out problems, finances and increased pressure for academic success.

What I see from the meeting is an overall picture that public education where all people learn to live with each other, respect others' rights, and work for a common goal, is the lifeline of this country. If the cost of public education should become so high that private education became the way of life, then you would see schools only for whites, schools only for brown, and schools only for black, with special emphasis on each cultural interest, which would divide and split the interest of the American people.

My final thoughts on this matter are that public education in America is the best bargain and best insurance that can be bought. We, in Plains, are very fortunate because of the many good teachers working each and every day with the students of our school. Because of your support, and the dedication of our staff, the students of Plains I.S.D. have more going for them than any student I know of in Texas. Good things are happening at school.

PHS Spanish Classes Compete

Students from first and second year Spanish classes of PHS recently traveled to Texas Tech with their teacher Joyce Moore, where they participated in the National Spanish Examinations administered by the American Association of Teachers of Spanish and Portuguese.

A total of 133 students from Lubbock and surrounding area participated in the test for first year students and 88 competitors took the second-year test.

PHS students achieved the following places in their respective divisions:

Above Ground Precautions for Underground Service


Transformers, junction boxes and meter pedestals for underground power lines are almost always installed above ground. Unless you are digging, trenching or drilling, you are not likely to come into contact with the buried conductor - except where it enters an aboveground enclosure.

Avoid unwanted contact with underground power:

- * Make sure that all transformer enclosures are kept locked and alert your electric utility when they are not!
- * Never allow children to play on or near enclosures or other electrical facilities.
- * Don't allow garbage cans, junk or wood piles to be stacked on or near enclosures.
- * Don't allow construction of fences or outbuildings to contact enclosures or to restrict access to them.
- * Immediately report any damage to enclosure structures or foundations to your electric utility.
- Never assume that an enclosure is safe to touch some damage may cause metal cabinets to become energized and dangerous.

CAUTION: Always call your electric utility before digging.



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Dear Editor

Dear Editor:

I recently mailed the following letter to Governor Clements, and I request that you print it to show my opinion on an important issue facing Texas voters.

Dear Governor Clements:

I am writing to urge you not to veto the Sunset legislation on the Department of Agriculture. It is vitally important that agricultural producers retain the right to elect their commissioner of Agriculture. However, it is also an important right to all Texas voters. The Commissioner represents all Texans because the future of agriculture is extremely significant to our State's economy. The person elected to run TDA must consider the best interest of farmers, ranchers, farmworkers, ranch hands and consumers, both here and in other states and nations.

Our recent experience with the State Insurance Board provides ample evidence that appointed officials are not as accountable to the people as are elected officials. When Texas voters went to the polls in 1986, they chose to return the current commissioner to the office. However, the issue is not who is running TDA today, but rather what is the best method for selecting that person now and in future years. The Sunset Committee has recommended that we retain the current method, and their recommendation has been supported by the Texas Senate.

Please listen to the people's representatives in the legislature and avoid the appearance of political vindictiveness. I farm 3,000 acres in Yoakum County, and hope you will seriously consider my request and preserve my freedom of choice.

Chuck Wilson Feted At Party


