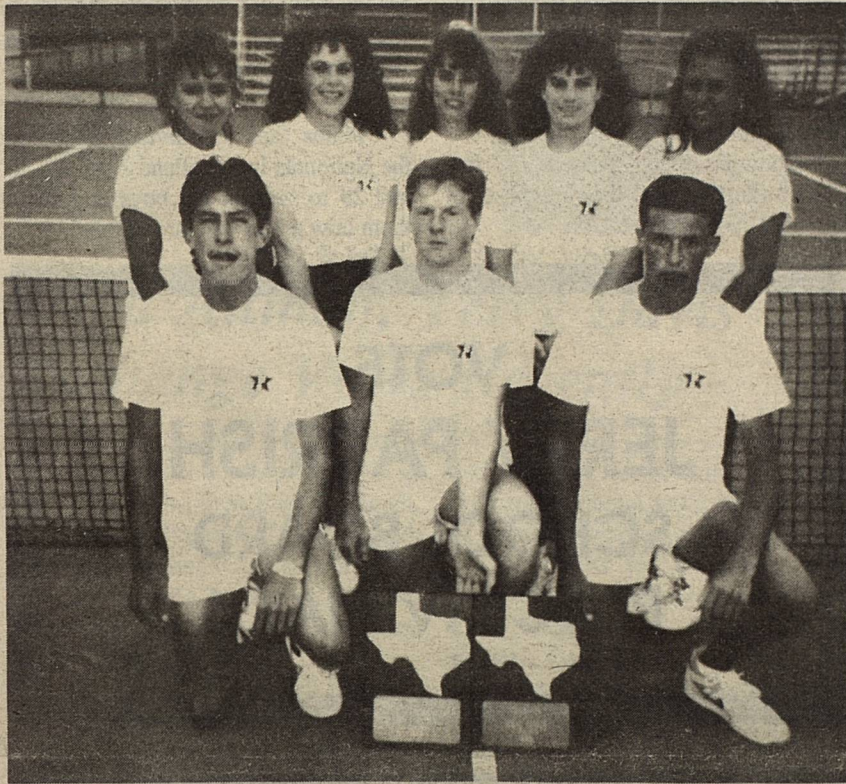

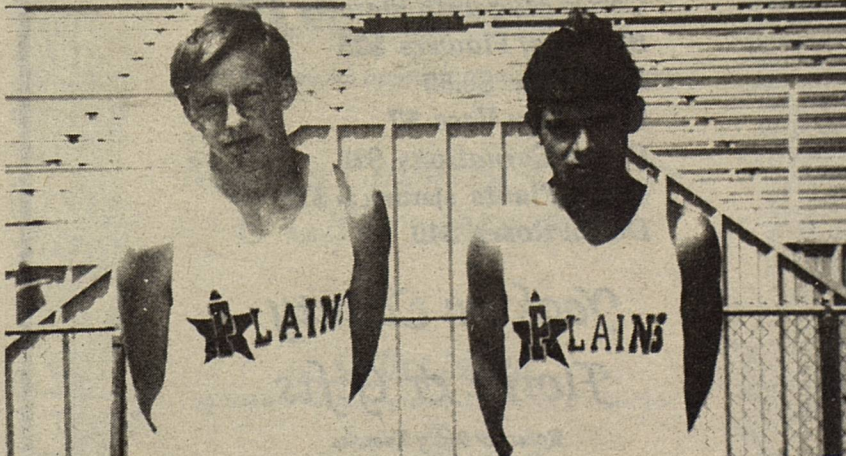

Two Bledsoe Transfer Students Die In Early Morning Mishap

A tragic accident Thursday morning on Texas 214 near Yoakum and Cochran County line took the life of two Plains High School students, Wendie Alexander, 16 and David Lynn Alexander, 14.

The brother and sister were pronounced dead at the scene of the head-on collision at 8:35 a.m. by Precinct 1 Yoakum County Justice of the Peace A.G. Brantley. The jaws of life extraction unit was dispatched at 8:16 a.m.

According to a Department of Public Safety report, the students were traveling southbound 13.5 miles north of Plains in a 1981 Isuzu four-door on the two-lane road shortly before 8 a.m., when they collided head-on with a pickup truck driven by Robert Krauter Jr. of Denver City. According to the report, Krauter was in the southbound lane at the time of the accident. Weather conditions were foggy and there was low visibility Thursday morning on the road, according to Trooper Danny Crawford of Plains.

Krauter, 22, was transported by Flight for Life helicopter to Lubbock's St. Mary of the Plains Hospital.

Wendie and David were transfer students from Bledsoe and had been making the 35-mile trip to Plains for the past five years. Wendy was to participate in the state concert band contest in Austin in May and had qualified as a solo saxophonist for state solo and ensemble contest in June. David participated in band, industrial arts program and school athletics.

Funeral services for the two were held Saturday at 2 p.m. in First Baptist Church in Morton. Officiating minister was the Rev. Richard Grisham, pastor of First Baptist Church in Bovina. He was assisted by the Rev. Tom Reynolds of Lubbock and the Rev. L.D. Hinson, pastor of the First Assembly of God Church in Plains.

Burial was in the Alexander Ranch Cemetery under direction of Franklin-Bartley Funeral Home of Lubbock.

Wendie and David were both born in Lubbock and attended Plains High School. They were members of Bledsoe Baptist Church.

Survivors include their parents, David and Lyndia Alexander; paternal grandparents, Robert and Delois Alexander of Slide; maternal grandparents, J.W. and Kathryn Stricklin of

Alvord; a paternal great-grandmother, Loreen Hitt of Wolfforth; and a sister, Dundie, of the home.

Pallbearers for Wendie were Chris Nock, Les Blackstock, Craig Cornett, Scott Shipley, Joey Young and Ricky Tindall.

Pallbearers for David were Keith York, Scott Elliott, Bill Durham, Billy Spears, Shawn Carroll and Johnny McElroy.

Approximately 170 persons attended. Guests were registered by Jodi Gayle of Tokio, a great-great niece of the honoree.

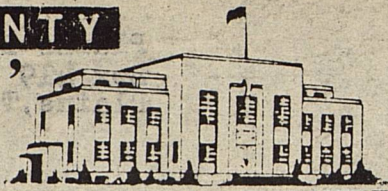

YOAKUM COUNTY Commissioners' Court



A special session of Commissioners Court was called April 13 for the purpose of taking action on a recommendation of the hospital board. In a split vote, it was decided to offer physicians \$20 per hour for 12 hours each weeknight in addition to amount presently being paid of \$20 per hour for 48 hours of weekend coverage at a total cost for the remainder of 1989 of \$44,400.

Voting in favor were John Avara, R.W. Thurston, and Judge Brewer. Against were Jim Barron and Johnnie Fitzgerald.

In special session, Monday, April 17, commissioners approved the County Treasurer's Quarterly Report for the quarter ending March 31.

Neel Associates, Inc. submitted the only bid on a grass-fire fighting unit and it was accepted. Amount of bid was \$19,749 with extended warranty of six years or 60,000 miles.

Brown Roofing was awarded the bid for roof repairs and reroofing of the community Building and the doctors offices at 4th and Mustang in Denver City. Total bid was \$18,680.

A resolution was adopted in which the court asked that Congress be urged to exempt State and local governments from the provision of Section 89 of the Internal Revenue Code, which would allow sizeable penalties for failure to conduct certain nondiscrimination tests, maintain written plans, send summary plan description to employ-

ees, file forms with the IRS and Labor Department or report such benefits as taxable income to employees. This would impose administrative requirements that would be extremely complex, labor intensive and be cost prohibitive, particularly to Texas Counties.

Joe Hester and Tony Wright were appointed to the Child Welfare Board due to the resignation of L.J. Sanders and Leslie Floyd. Terms will expire in March 1991. Marilyn Reinert was appointed to replace Diana Patters, who also resigned. Her term expires in March 1990.

Commissioners passed a resolution authorizing the purchase of property by Precinct 2.

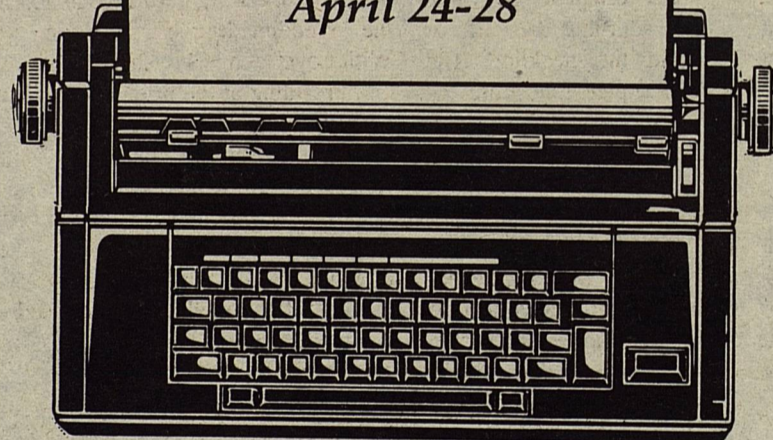

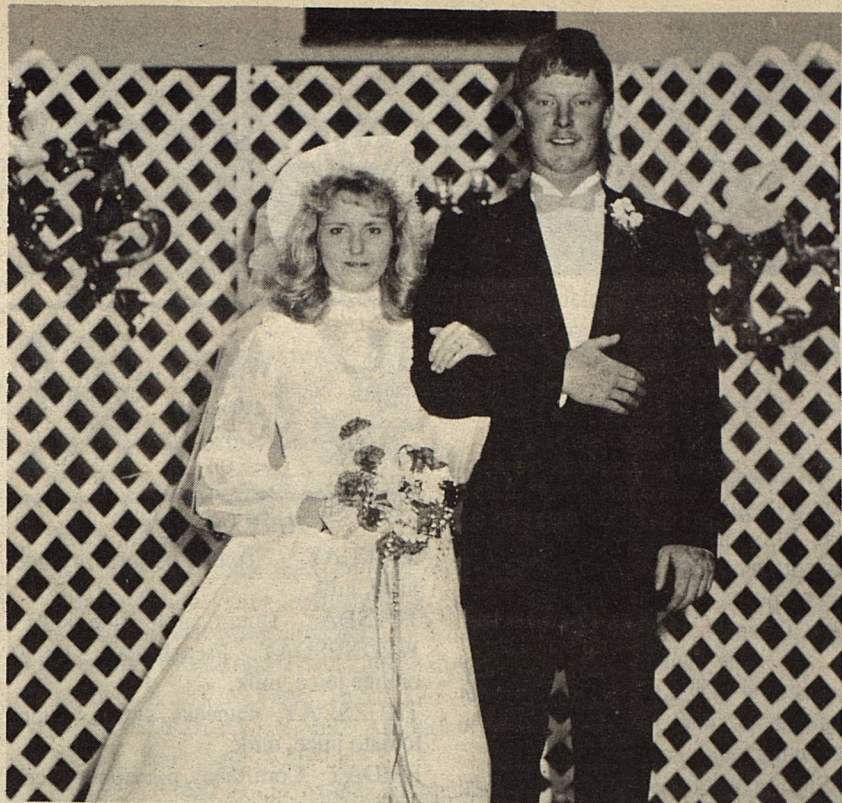

A bridal shower was given in the home of Jo Ann Barron March 10.

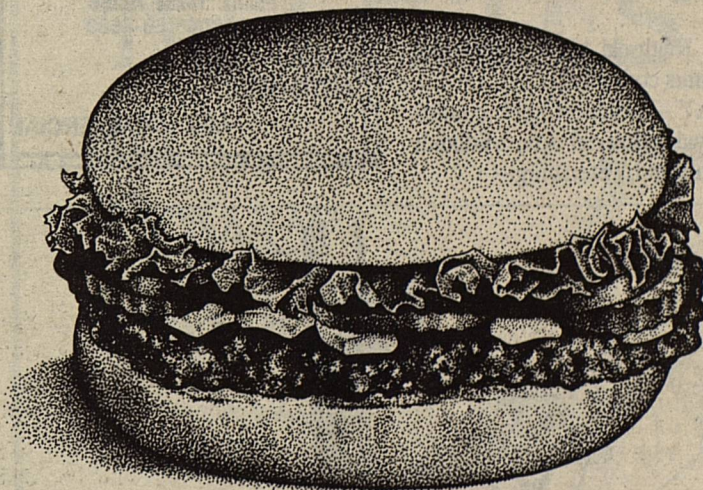
