Presently serving as president of the Turner Extension Homemakers Club and secretary-treasurer of Yoakum County Extension Homemakers Council, Dorothy is a busy person, but has time for her four grandchildren who enjoy helping her in the kitchen. The recipes are some of their favorite things to fix at "Me Me's" house.

She and husband Ray have lived on a farm since 1940. They have two sons, Jerry and Gregg, who graduated from PHS in 1962 and 1968. Both are involved in oilfield work, Jerry in Tulsa, Okla., and Gregg in Midland.

CARAMEL BUTTERSCOTCH ROLLS

1 pkg (Parkerhouse style) frozen rolls

1 c brown sugar

1 pkg butterscotch instant pudding

1/2 c melted oleo

1 c chopped pecans

Spray a 9x13 pan with Pam. Arrange chopped nuts evenly in pan and place frozen rolls on top of nuts, allowing space for rolls to rise. Put brown sugar evenly over rolls. Sprinkle dry pudding mix over sugar and rolls.

Melt oleo and drizzle over rolls. Put wax paper over top and let set on counter top overnight. Bake 30 mins at 375 degrees. Let set 5 mins. Turn out on foil paper. (Nuts will be on top)

COCONUT WHEATIES COOKIES

1 c shortening

1 c brown sugar

1 c white sugar

2 c coconut

2 c flour

2 eggs

2 c Wheaties

1/2 t salt

1 t soda 1 t vanilla

Cream shortening, sugars; add eggs. Stir in coconut, flour, Wheaties, salt, soda and vanilla. Roll in small balls. Bake at 350 degrees 8 to 10 mins.

Cut large cabbage head into 2"







Gayle and his wife, Jean, currently live at Bronco where he has farmed for many years.

He has been a leader in the conservation movement for many years. In 1952 he was appointed to the old CYT Soil and Water Conservation District Board of Directors. In 1953 the District split up into smaller areas and he was elected to the Yoakum Soil and Water Conservation District. He served in that position until 1987.

During all his years of farming, he has been in the forefront of innovation. This has been both in production and in conservation techniques.

In production methods, he has been a leader in new and better irrigation systems, soil fertility and cultural practices. He installed high efficiency center pivot irrigation systems that saved water and helped increase crop yields.

Gayle has consistently been a producer that has some of the highest production yields in the county. Using this, he has been able to show others that conserving soil and water pays.
