AUSTIN - The Texas Highway Department launched a new slogan in its anti-litter campaign: "Be a neatnik, not a litterbug."

New Anti-Litter Campaign Is

Opened By Hwy Department

This plea comes from Texas Highway Department maintenance crews all over the state as they haul mountains of cans, bottles, paper, decaying food and other litter from Texas highway right of way.

"Spring houseclean our Texas highways all year long by fighting that urge to toss litter from your car," they recommend.

Throwing litter on highways and roadsides is prohibited by law. Last year 281 cases against litter-throwing were completed in Texas courts. Of this number, 269 were found guilty and were fined or punished by other means.

Highway maintenance men point out that litter is local for the main part, coming from resident litterbugs and not from outof-staters or from phontob travelers from "up the road." Sur-veys reveal that the litter bug is a local person, possibly a civic-minded citizen in all other phases of his life, but he fails to see the multiplication factor when he tosses out an empty cigarette package, wad of paper, or soft-drink bottle. He would not toss these objects down in his own yard, or in a friend's; but he will thoughtlessly take over the highway as his own private

to be hand-picked. it an expensive operation. Last year the clean-up and mow-ing bill for 57,500 maintained miles of Texas highways totaled more than \$7,000,000. This in-fuded picking up, hauling, and unloading rubbish. A nother chore for maintenance men is removal of dead animals, removal of rocks and rock piles." Wrecked cors must be hauled off. Advertising signs in the right of way must be taken down. Maintenance crews are also responsible for mowing the grass, removing, brush, and keeping vegetation from the highway markers and guard posts. A maintenance foreman explains, "We could do our mowing job so much quicker and save money if we don't have to pick up all the cans, bottles, and litter before we start. A heap of litter hidden in the grass can wreck an expensive machine or automobile. Cutting grass is more than just trying to keep a neat high-

way yard. Mowing reduces fire hazard and preven's spreading of weed seed to nearby farms. Tall grass and brush can also distort sight distances and result in expensive and tragic automobile smashups.

"Take a count of the litter objects you see the next time you are on the road. Even though we have regular maintenance crews making periodic litter pickups, that busy litterbug is still way ahead of us. Help us out. Be a 'neatnik.' Litter? Don't throw it; stow it ---till you get to a proper disposal unit.'

A - The domiciliaries at Bay Pines, Fla.; Dayton, Ohio; Los Angeles, Calif.; and Martinsburg, West Va.

Q - What are official dates of the Korean War and of World War II for purposes of VA hos. pitalization?

A - June 27, 1950, through January 31, 1955, for the Korean War and December 7, 1941. through War II.

Q - Can I apply to the Veterans Administration for a headstone for my husband's grave? He was a World Warr II veteran.

A -- Yes. Headstones are available for eligible deceased veterans of World War II. Although applications must go to The Quartermaster General of the Army, and any VA office will provide information and other assistance in filling out the application.

Coaching Staff Changes Made At **Eastland High**

A change in the coaching staff of Eastland High School has been announced by School Superintendent. Wendell Siebert.

James (Jimmy) Hughes, a coach and teacher for 14 years, will replace Carrol Shelton as head coach and athletic director for Eastland High School. Hughes' assistant is to be Bennett Ragsdale, a former member of the EHS coaching staff.

Shelton, who has coached for the past eight years, led the Mavericks to the semi-finals in the 1956 season — the farthest any Eastland team has ever advanced in high school football. Shelton asked to be relieved of his coaching assignment, but will remain with the school faculty as a science teacher. He is presently attending summer school at Texas Tech in Lubbock on a science grant.
