(3) There will be no entry fee for student work. (4) No fees will be refunded. (5) All paintings must be framed and securely wired for hanging with NO WET PAINT, PLEASE. (6) Crafts will be displayed on tables, unless securely wired for hanging. (7) Any work not in good taste may be rejected and canvas size must not exceed 900 square inches. (8) While utmost care will be taken with work submitted, entries will be displayed at the artist's risk. The Yoakum County Art Association CANNOT be responsible for any damage or loss. (9) Each entry must have a card attached to the back stating the name of the artist, the category, division, article title, the original artist (if a copy) or the instruction under which it was done (if classwork) and the price or designated not for sale (NFS). School board members in regular session Friday, July 7 accepted a bid of \$4, 600 from Sandefur and Swindle of Lubbock to conduct the annual Plains ISD audit.

Resolutions commending coaches and students for their achievements in state UIL contests were signed and awarded Steve Crutcher, Chad Guetersloh, Lance Morrow, Layne Morrow, Macky McWhirter, Richie Cullins, Eric Banfield, the 1989 PHS band and Byron Morgan, band director.

Plains State Bank's bid to be the depository bank for the 1989-91 biennium was accepted with contract to begin Sept. 1, 1989 and end Aug. 31, 1991.

An employee benefit plan was adopted setting classroom teachers' salaries at \$6,000 above Texas Minimum Salary Schedule; supplementary retirement program at four percent matching; provide for family health care plan as presently provided; supplementary housing, providing \$100 monthly for full time employees in own housing; auxiliary employees' salaries as adopted in Policy DEA-guaranteed step promotion; local sick leave of one-half day per month of employment and temporary disability leave.

Trustees unanimously adopted the 1989-90 student handbook as presented and accepted a proposal for student insurance submitted by The Baker Agency, Inc. at a cost of \$16,980 for the 1989-90 school year.

The Plains ISD Budget Adoption Meeting was set for 7 p.m. Monday, Aug. 14 in the board room of the administration building. A motion was also approved to advertise in The Plains Pride July 9 a notice of intent to increase taxes with a public hearing set for Monday, July 31 and

City of Plains THE LIVING LIGHTNING ROD Living trees are lightning rods for electrical trouble. In a system similar to human circulation, water and sap move constantly from root to leaf. The water and the chemicals in the sap are excellent conductors of electricity. If a tree has grown into contact with a power line, the potential for electrical path to the ground exists. Never attempt to trim a tree that has power lines running through it. Have a treetrimming professional, preferably one that works with your utility, handle the job. Even when power lines do not contact a tree, a danger of contact exists. Treehouses and upper limbs may bring children within reach of the adjacent lines. Be sure that children do not climb trees with limbs within 10 feet of any power source; double-check the location of any treehouse before construction. PI-119






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This week I would like to discuss the 1989-90 budget building process. The first item to be considered in building the budget is personnel. We have eighty-nine employees and their salaries and benefits total \$2,533,709.44, or approximately 63.35 percent of the proposed budget. An additional \$408,343.00 or 10.21 percent of our budget is reserved for instructional supplies: paper, tools for shop classes, computers, typewriters, athletic equipment, band instruments, and uniforms, plus the travel involved in our extracurricular programs. It is easy to see that 73.56 percent of our budget is directly related to the instruction of students. Maintenance, utilities, and transportation costs are approximately \$607,750.00, or 15.20 percent. Our administrative team and Board of Trustees have been working on a proposed budget for the past two months and have tentatively agreed to a budget of \$3,999,158.00 for the 1989-90 school year. The amount reflects a budget of \$20,455.00 less than the budget approved for the 1988-89 school year.

Our other concern is the value on which our taxes are based. Our school district value in 1982-83 was \$1,008,712,850.00, in 1985-86 \$948,612,179.00, and in 1987-88 the value was \$741,487,975. The projected value for 1989-90 is \$670,817,610.00. In the last seven years we have lost \$337,895,240.00 in value and during those years the legislature has mandated new programs without providing funds to operate those programs. In 1985 we received \$183,979.00 in state revenues and this year it is estimated that we will receive \$128,934.00. These factors, and inflation, must be taken into account as we work through the budget building process.

Plains I.S.D. Board of Trustees and administrators continue their endeavor to use your tax dollars in ways that will be most beneficial to our students.
