## Paula McMinn To Coordinate Local St. Jude's 'Bike-A-Thon'

St. Jude Children's Research Hospital announced today that Paula McMinn will coordinate the St. Jude Children's Research Hospital "Wheels For Life" Bike-A-Thon in Plains on Oct. 8, 1989.

Founded by Danny Thomas in 1962, St. Jude Children's Research Hospital is the largest childhood cancer research-treatment-education center in America. St. Jude Hospital is non-sectarian, interracial and provides medical care for over 3,200 active patients. Currently, over $\$ 183,000$ is needed each day to keep the doors open. These funds come primarily from public contributions.

The Bike-A-Thon program this
year is dedicated to Ellen Marie Haynes. Five-year-old Ellen Marie, from Rossville, Georgia, developed a malignant tumor in her abdomen in June, 1986. After treatment at St. Jude Children's Research Hospital, which consisted of surgery, radiation, and chemotherapy, Ellen Marie was taken off all therapy in January, 1987. Although she isn't cured of her cancer yet, her prognosis is good.

The Plains Cowboys began football with two-a-day workouts on Aug. 14.

The Cowboys are starting out the 1989 season with a somewhat younger and inexperienced team than last year's bi-district championship team. The graduation of 17 seniors has left several positions open.

Quoting from "Top-of-Texas" football magazine, avoiding injuries and maturing in September are the two keys to Plains' degree of success this season, according to head coach Larry McMinn.

The Cowboys were tough customers in 1988, finishing second in District 4-1A with a 5-1 record and winning their first playoff game before a 36-14 loss to eventual state champion White Deer ended their season.

"We have to mature during our non-district games," the veteran mentor said. "And we have to stay away from injuries." Plains returns only eight lettermen from last season, and only five of those veterans were starting members of last year's squad, which averaged 263 yards and close to 20 points per game.

The three returning offensive starters are senior wide receiver Shawn Booth (6-0, 160), junior quarterback Monte Pierce ( $5-9,150$ ) and senio tackle Rodney Garland (5-11, 190).

Pierce enjoyed a fine sophomore season at the Plains helm, completing 44 of 85 passes for 492 yards and five touchdowns. He also scored three touchdowns. A year's experience should make him even more of a threat this fall.

Joining Pierce in the backfield will be senior Henry Gonzales $(5-6,140)$ and juniors Mario Medina (5-10, 160) and Dain Guetersloh (5-10, 145).

McMinn will likely fill his offensive lineup with senior Chris Gayle (65,290 ) at the tackle spot opposite Garland, junior Dusty Rafferty (5-9, 180) at center and seniors Chad Hudson (5-8, 160) and James Altman (6-2, 175) at guards.

Gayle (tackle), Garland (end) and Gonzales (secondary) are the three returning defensive starters.

Other players who could help the Cowboys this season are senior tackleend Anthony Day (5-10, 160), junior tackle Dwane Talley ( $6-0,215$ ), junior guards William Matta $(5-6,140)$ and Chris Chaves $(5-10,190)$, junior ends Brett Booth $6-0,150$ ) and Brandon McGinty (5-6, 120), junior defensive backs Dan Rushing (5-8, 140) and Shane Lowrey ( $5-8,150$ ) and sophomore backs Sterling Lovelace ( $6-0$, $150)$ and Garrick Engle $(5-10,165)$.

After two weeks of workouts the Cowboys took on Lorenzo in a scrimmage here Friday night, Aug. 25 and were scheduled to scrimmage Sudan Friday, Sept. 1 in Sudan. The season will open against Tahoka in Plains Friday, Sept. 8 at 8 p.m.

Pinto beans, a fresh "pico de gallo" mixture of chopped tomato, onion and jalapeno peppers, Monterey Jack cheese and crisp bacon are layered with the crumbled cornbread. The salad dressing is a lively mixture of bottled salsa and dairy sour cream.

TEX-MEX CORNBREAD SALAD
1 pkg. ( 6 ozs.) Martha White's Gladiola Mexican Cornbread Mix, prepared according to package directions
2 cans ( 15 ozs . each) pinto beans, drained
2 cups chopped tomatoes
1 cup chopped green onions
$1 / 2$ cup chopped bell peppers
$1 / 4$ to $1 / 2$ cup chopped and seeded jalapeno peppers
12 strips bacon, cooked and crumbled
2 cups ( 8 ozs.) grated Monterey Jack cheese
1 cup ( 8 ozs.) dairy sour cream 1 cup salsa

Additional sour cream and jalapeno pepper slices (optional)

Crumble half of prepared cornbread into bottom of large serving
bowl. Top with half of beans. In another bowl, combine tomatoes, onions, green pepper and jalapeno pepper; blend well. Spread half of vegetable mixture over beans. Sprinkle with half of the bacon and half of the cheese. Stir together sour cream and salsa in small bowl; spread half of dressing over cheese. Repeat layering procedure with remaining cornbread, beans, vegetables, bacon, chcese and dressing. Garnish with sour cream and jalapeno pepper slices, if desired. Cover tightly and chill 2 to 3 hours before serving. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

For example, residential sewer rates have been $\$ 7.00$ and will now be $\$ 8.00$ and residential garbage rates have been $\$ 8.00$ ( $\$ 8.56$ with state tax) and will now be $\$ 9.00$ ( $\$ 9.63$ with state tax). These new rates will become effective September 1, 1989, and will not be reflected on your utility bill until the end of September. It is the desire of the City Council to keep rates as low as possible, but new laws making many changes for the operation of sewer lift stations and sanitary landfills make it necessary for these increases.
