Cowgirls Win Regional Crown

The Cowgirls earned a third consecutive trip to Austin to compete in the 23rd Annual U.I.L. State Volleyball Tournament this weekend by capturing the Region I-A Championship.

They were scheduled to play Iola in a 10:15 a.m. match Friday, Nov. 17 at Tony Burger Center. Aspermont and Round Top-Carmine squared off at 9

a.m. The winners advanced to the Class A Championship match scheduled for 10 a.m. Saturday, Nov. 18.

The Cowgirls advanced to the State Finals by eliminating Fort Hancock and Water Valley in regional competition held at the Texas Tech Student Recreation Center in Lubbock last Saturday.

Leslie Patton fueled the Cowgirl

offense with ten kills in their 15-3 15-10 win over Water Valley in the championship match. The Wildcats put the first two points on the scoreboard for their only lead of the match. With the Cowgirls leading 10-3 after only five Cowgirl rotations, they took game one with five consecutive points.

The Cowgirls led 11-6 in the second game and reached match point

with three straight points but turned the ball over to the Wildcats when a Cowgirl hit went out of bounds. Water Valley capitalized on Cowgirl offensive errors and cut the margin to 14-10 before the Cowgirls notched a kill for side out. Cowgirl offense recorded a final kill to end the match.

Cowgirl statistics included Marsha

The Cowboys overcame their disappointment of last week with great zeal and ended their regular season with a heart stopping win over O'Donnell.

The win not only assured the Cowboys their part of a three-way tie for the District crown, but also a chance for a play-off berth in the drawing held in Brownfield after the game.

The Cowboy defense came out

playing strong and held the Eagles on their first possession. After the punt, the Cowboys immediately moved the ball. Mario Medina carried the ball four times including one for a 19 yard touchdown. The snap on the extra point try was fumbled giving Rodney Garland no chance to kick the ball.

The Cowboy defense held O'Donnell again on their second series forcing them to punt after three downs.

On the Eagles next possession

they moved the ball 52 yards for their first TD. Chris Rosales carried the ball in from the two for the score. Chad Vaughn's extra point kick was good.

The Cowboys came right back with their own scoring drive. Henry Gonzales carried for six yards; Monte Pierce connected with Shawn Booth for 10, then later for 23 yards. Medina carried for gains of two and three yards. Booth scored on a 30 yard completion from Pierce. The two point

conversion was no good.

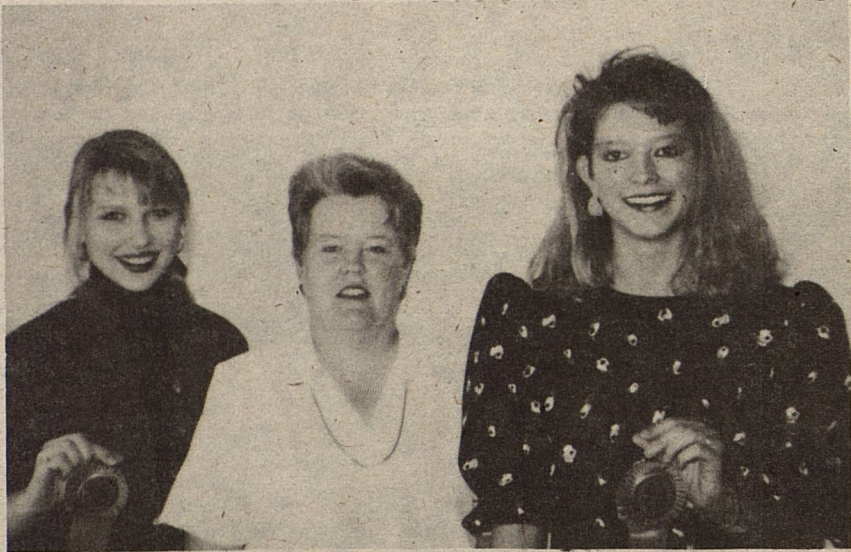
Halftime score was Plains 12, O'Donnell 7.

In the third quarter, Chris Chavez recovered an O'Donnell fumble on about the 41 yard line. Medina carried for 33 yards and Gonzales for two. After two incomplete passes Pierce connected with Dain Guetersloh on a five yard pass to the one yard line. It

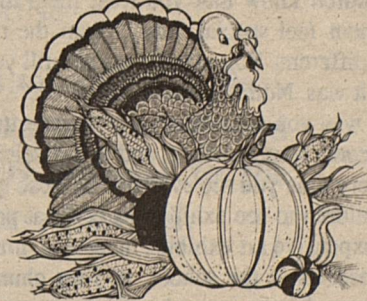

From The Superintendent's Desk

Dean Andrews



This is the eighth and last in the series of articles based on research entitled "What Works at Home". I hope you have found the articles informative.

RESEARCH FINDING:

Belief in the value of hard work, the importance of personal responsibility, and the importance of education itself contributes to greater success in school.

The ideals that children hold have important implications for their school experiences. Children who believe in the value of hard work and responsibility and who attach importance to education are likely to have higher academic achievement and fewer disciplinary problems than those who do not have these ideals. They are also less likely to drop out of school. Such children are more likely to use their out-of-school time in ways that reinforce learning. For example, high school students who believe in hard work, responsibility, and the value of education spend about three more hours a week on homework than do other students. This is a significant difference since the average student spends only about five hours a week doing homework.

Parents can improve their children's chances for success by emphasizing the importance of education, hard work, and responsibility, and by encouraging their children's friendships with peers who have similar values. The ideals that students, their parents, and their peers hold are more important than a student's socioeconomic and ethnic background in predicting academic success.

EXERCISES:

1) From the time your children are toddlers, let them know that you consider it a sure thing that they will get a good education. Never say, "I wish you would finish high school", or "I wish we were rich so you could get an education". Say, "After you graduate from high school..." or "When you have your degree". Let your child hear you tell other people, "Of course, she'll get a good education".

2) Let your children know that you trust them to work hard and achieve high goals. Make them feel special. Say, "From the time you were a baby, I could see you were different. You always worked till you got what you wanted, no matter how hard it was. Nothing discouraged you."

3) Show by the way you act and by your comments about other people that you consider hard work, responsibility, and self-discipline absolutely essential. Praise your child every time you see evidence of these qualities.

4) Take your children to see exhibitions of what people can achieve. There are many free or inexpensive art exhibits, museums, music recitals, sports activities. Ask for suggestions at the school, at your church, at your city library. Don't worry if it means leaving your house messy or if people will think you don't know what you're doing. Go.

5) Always remind your children that most of the things we admire were achieved by someone's hard work. Every building, road, book, medicine, appliance, whatever, was designed and produced by human beings - people who once were as young and knew as little as your child.

Policy Established To Allow Make Up Days For Absences

The board authorized the administration to set five evenings or Saturday mornings each semester for school to be opened in order that students may make up absences.

trict Improvement Committee Report and a stricter performance criteria for career ladder placement as presented. Jack Palmer was nominated as representative to Yoakum County Appraisal District Board of Directors.

October bills were approved for payment. Financial reports for general operating, cafeteria and tax areas were presented by Wanda Ashburn. Ms. Ashburn also presented a statistical report from McCreary, Veselka, Beck and Allen.

being fourth down, the ball went over to O'Donnell at that point. Using up the clock with four and five yard runs the Eagles covered 92 yards only to be stopped on the seven yard line by the Plains defense.

The Cowboys moved the ball 36 yards, but were forced to punt on fourth down. The punt was good for 30 yards.

Starting at their own 27 yard line, O'Donnell once again drove the ball down field. Using six different ball carriers, the Eagles came right at the Cowboy defense for short gains of three to five yards a carry and converting several fourth down tries. The Eagles scored on a four yard plunge by Jacob Lowe. The two point conversion by Lowe was good.

Letting none of the dust in the air settle and with 2:20 left in the game, the Cowboys moved the ball in eight plays for the TD. Pierce connected with Shane Lowrey for a 25 yard pass. He then went to Booth for 21 yards. Three incomplete passes later, the Cowboys had a fourth down "do or die" play. Pierce threw to Guetersloh for 14 yards and the first down.

While the Eagles were expecting another pass, Medina ran the ball in from 10 yards out. The two point conversion was no good.

In the longest 42 seconds of the game, the Cowboy defense held O'Donnell from scoring and secured the victory.

Later that night, at the drawing held in Brownfield, between O'Donnell, Whiteface and Plains; the Cowboys won the right to represent the District as the first place team. Because of their win over Whiteface,

O'Donnell represents the District in the runner-up position.

Medina carried 14 times for 124 yard and two TDs; Gonzales carried nine for 27 yards and Pierce three for 11 yards.

Pierce threw 21 times, completed nine for 148 yards and one TD.

Booth caught five passes for 100 yards and one TD. Lowrey had two for 30 yards and Guetersloh two for 19 yards.

The Cowboys had 162 yards rushing, 149 yards passing for a total of 315 yards.

Cowboys are scheduled to play Vega Longhorns, Saturday at 8 p.m. in the Wildcat Stadium in Littlefield.

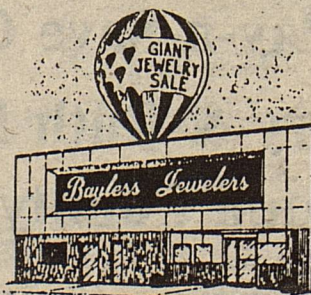

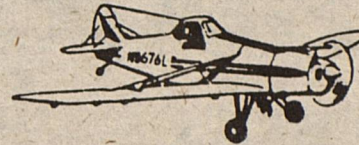
