PLAINS COWGIRLS WIN THE 1-A STATE CHAMPIONSHIP TITLE IN AUSTIN

## Cowgirls Win State

Plains Cowgirls captured the Class A State Volleyball Championship last weekend in Austin, the lucky thirteenth top victory for the Plains High School.

The Cowgirls powered past Round Top-Carmine 15-10 and 15-6 to take the championship match. Immediately following the title game, the Class A All State Tournament Team was announced by Bill Farney, UIL Athletic Director. Cowgirls selected to the elite team were juniors Leslie Patton and Melissa Green and sophomore Rena McElroy. Seniors Marsha Farnham, Martha Rivera and Corie Spencer accepted the championship trophy on behalf of the Cowgirls. Presentation of the trophy was by Gina Mazzolini, UIL Assistant Athletic Director.

Enroute to the state title, the Cowgirls posted a 30-5 record. Getting off to a slow start in the first game of their semi-final match with Iola Friday morning, it took the Cowgirls three games to eliminate the Lady Bulldogs. With Iola leading the entire first game, the Cowgirls staged a comeback at 10-14, scoring five consecutive points including Michelle Lowe's three aces and a dink put down by Leslie Patton. Corie Spencer's kill put the Cowgirls at game

point 15-14, but a Cowgirl hitting error forced a side out and Iola scored three points with their next two servers to hold off the Cowgirls 17-15.

Following the three minute between game rest, the Cowgirls rallied with 14 kills to blitz Iola 15-2, 15-4 and advance to the championship match.

Semi-final statistics included: Marsha Farnham, 10 kills, 5 blocks, 3 digs, 2 points; Melissa Green, 3 kills, 8 points, 1 ace; Michelle Lowe, 1 dig, 5 points, 3 aces; Rena McElroy, 5 kills, 1 block, 2 digs, 6 points; Leslie Patton, 2 kills, 2 digs, 20 points, 5 aces; Sandra Ramos, 3 digs, 1 ace; Corie Spencer, 4 kills, 3 digs, 3 points.

The Cowgirls met Round Top-Carmine, 29-3 (a semi-final winner of Aspermont) in the Class A Championship match Saturday morning. The Cowgirls got their offense fired up when they recorded a kill on their first possession. With the Cowgirls taking control of the net, they went ahead 12-2, but the Cubettes fought back on their next four rotations and put six points on the scoreboard before the Cowgirls reached game point at 14-8. Round Top dinked the Cowgirl defense and cut the margin to

15-10 until Marsha's kill forced the side out. Marsha aced the Cubette's serve receive for the final point and a 15-10 win.

Maintaining their momentum in the second game, the Cowgirls continued their domination of the net, recording 5 kills and 5 blocks. With the Cowgirls ahead 6-1, Round Top notched 3 consecutive points for 4-6, their closest margin of the game. The Cowgirls fought for 5 more points on their next 3 rotations, allowing Round Top 2 points before Rena blocked a hit to force a side out. Melissa alertly dinked the Cubette defense for 12-6 and the Cowgirls grabbed match point when Marsha put down a kill and Leslie aced the service receive. Round Top used their last time out and the Cowgirls came back on the court to score the winning point when a Round Top hater knocked the ball out of bounds.

Final statistics included: Marsha Farnham, 5 kills, 5 blocks, 7 points, 2 aces; Melissa Green, 2 kills, 2 digs, 1 point; Rena McElroy, 3 kills, 3 blocks, 4 points, 1 ace; Leslie Patton, 3 kills, 8 points, 3 aces; Sandra Ramos, 7 points, 2 aces, 2 digs; Corie Spencer, 3 points.

## Joint Dump Site To Be Established

Plains and Denver City have joined together to build a new garbage dump site.

The Environmental Protection Agency had approved more stringent regulations for landfills, but some environmental groups did not think that the new regulations were strict enough and took EPA to court, Ray Hohstadt, city manager of Denver City said.

The court decided that EPA was not stringent enough on landfill regulations and forced EPA to rewrite the new regulations. The regulations are expected to be published sometime in 1990.

Hohstadt said that both citizens know that one regulation requires that all landfills be closed by June 1991 if they do not have monitoring devices for pollution and contamination. Both cities have already made plans to jointly build a new dump site.

The two separate dump sites do not have any monitoring devices and are old and will not last much longer, Hohstadt said Plains and Denver City decided to build and operate a dump

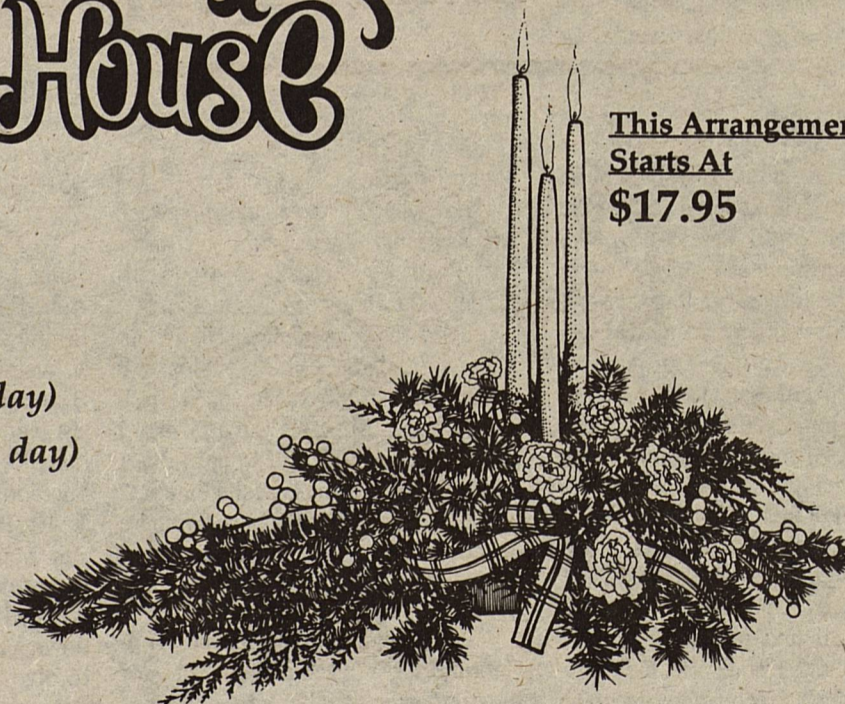

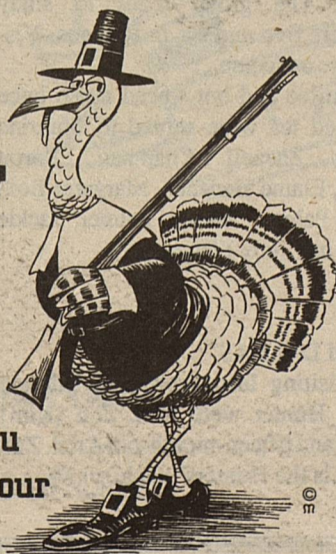

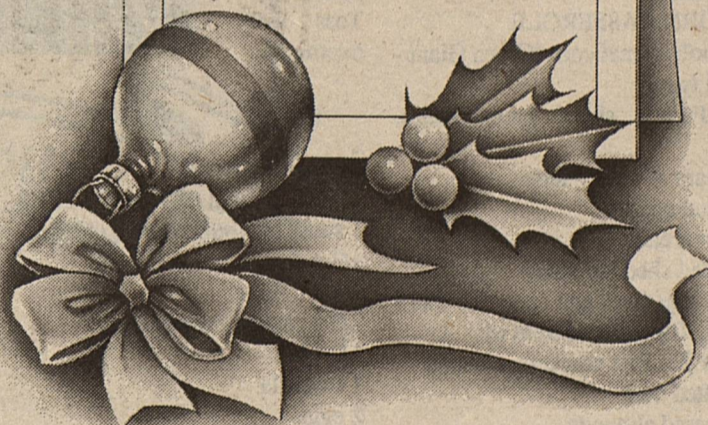

Recipes that are sure to become favorites are shared this week with the good cooks of Plains by Jan (Mrs. Jerry) Parrish. Always a hit with the young in years or young at heart, the brownies recipe is different from the traditional cocoa brownie. Jan also shares a recipe that offers a change from "ordinary" green beans.

## GREEN BEAN AND CORN CASSEROLE

1 can whole kernel corn (Green Giant - no liquid type)

1 can French sliced green beans, drained

1 can cream of celery soup

2 T minced onions

1/2 c sour cream

1/2 c grated cheddar cheese

Stir together and put in 9x13 casserole. Top with mixture of:

1 tube (or 35) Ritz crackers, crushed

1/2 c melted oleo

1/2 c slivered almonds

Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.

## PASTA SALAD

1 pkg curly pasta

1/2 to 3/4 c bottled Italian dressing about a cup each of the following raw vegetables, cut into bite size pieces:

broccoli

red onions

carrots

celery

cucumbers

bell peppers

tomatoes

Cook pasta according to package directions, drain. Combine pasta, veg-

etables and dressing in large bowl. Toss well. Chill 6-8 hours or overnight.

## DISAPPEARING MARSHMALLOW BROWNIES

1 small pkg butterscotch chips

1/2 c oleo

1 1/2 c flour

2/3 c packed brown sugar

1/2 t salt

1 t vanilla

2 eggs

2 t baking powder

2 c small marshmallows

1 12 oz pkg chocolate chips

1/2 c chopped pecans

Grease and flour 9x13 pan. In a 3-qt saucepan, melt butterscotch chips and oleo, stirring constantly over low heat. Remove and cool. Add flour, brown sugar, salt, vanilla, eggs, baking powder to melted mixture and mix well by hand. Add marshmallows, chocolate chips and nuts. Fold into batter, five strokes. Pour into prepared pan and smooth to corners. Bake at 350 degrees for 25 minutes. Cool before cutting.

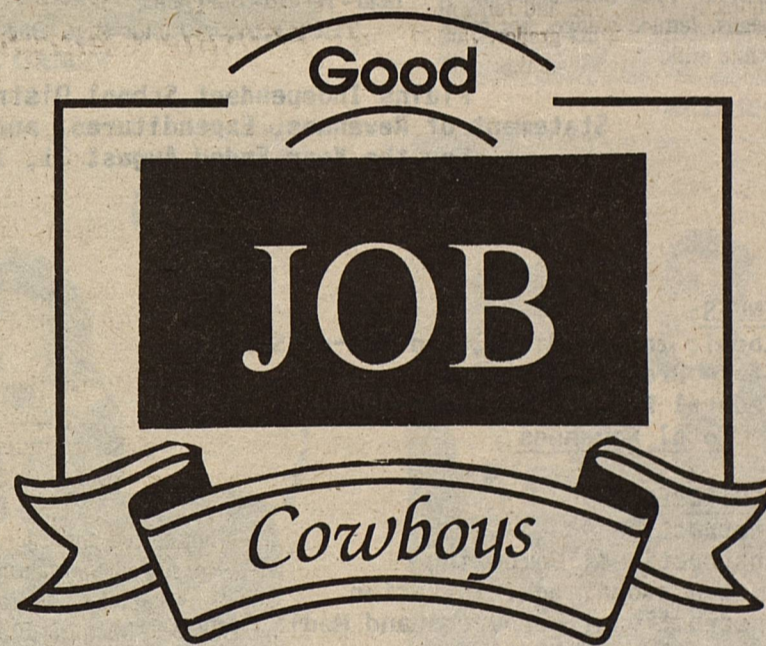

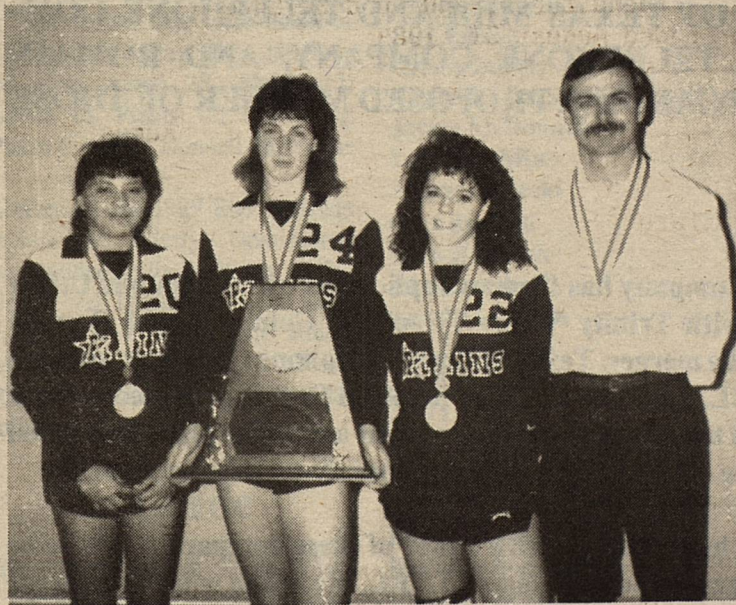

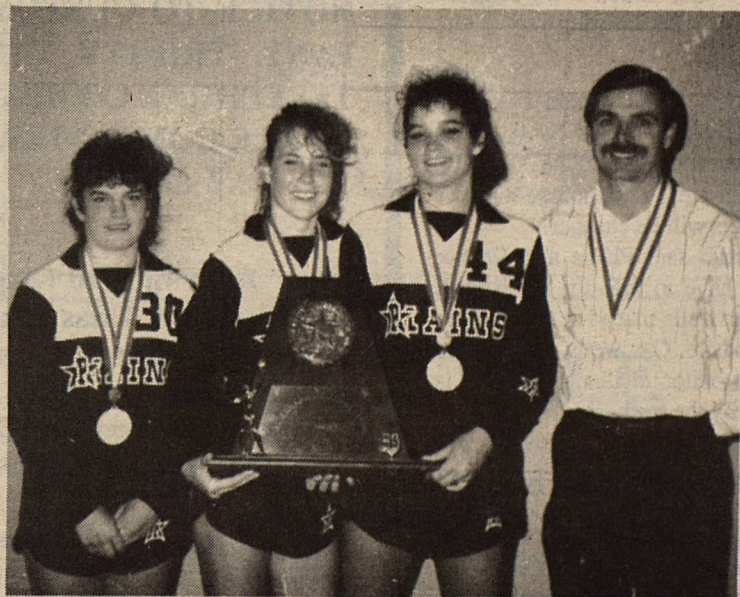

# YOAKUM COUNTY Commissioners' Court



Yoakum County Commissioners Court convened in regular session Nov. 13 with all members present. Also attending were temporary board members of Sandy Land Underground Water Conservation District, who were present for the joint canvass of the Nov. 7 election.

In other action, the court approved line item transfers and okayed a request by Criminal District Attorney Linda Lowrey to transfer of overage in the CDA Trust Account of \$51.25 to the CDA Fee Account.

A request by CP National to lay, construct, operate and maintain communications cable under and across certain country roads was approved. The court also okayed the disbursement of cash values in the Hospitalization Insurance Trust Fund to employees with current month's interest to go into the general fund and to enclose a notice with check that income tax will be due on the amount.

A motion was approved to declare an emergency and amend the 1989 budget to transfer from the general fund unbudgeted receipts in the amount of \$80,000 to the hospital fund for the next two payrolls.

In special session Nov. 20, the Court approved the release of securities as pledged by Plains State Bank. Also

approved was a \$50 per month raise for Evaristo Flores in precinct three effective Nov. 1, the end of the six month probationary period. A pay request in the amount of \$18,313 as presented by Mike Klein General Contractors Inc. was okayed.

Beverly Rector, Regional Coordinator for the South Plains Emergency Medical Service, gave an update on their work in the area. One of their main accomplishments in 1988 was the raising of the antenna in Lubbock from 310 feet to 810 feet, increasing their transmittability and receivability by approximately 25 percent.

Extra hire and disbursements were approved for payment. The court voted to advertise for bids to sell an emergency generator which may be seen at Yoakum County Hospital or by contact Bob Thurston. Bids will be opened Dec. 8 for study and action Dec. 11.

The court also voted to advertise for bids to purchase a front-end wheel loader for precinct two and to offer in trade a 936 front-end wheel loader with bids to be received Dec. 8 and to advertise for bids to buy three new pickup trucks for precinct three. Specifications may be obtained from Jim Barron and are to be opened for study Dec. 8 with action to be taken Dec. 11.

site jointly.

Hohstadt said it would cost both Denver City and Plains \$800,000 in monitoring costs over the next 30 years. Both cities have joined together so that costs will be cheaper.

Hohstadt said Plains and Denver City will have to monitor the landfill with water wells placed at each corner of the landsite. Gas wells will also be used to monitor methane gas that is produced by the trash.

Hohstadt said the gas well will burn off the gas if there is any present in the air.

Plains and Denver City have plans to close their present dump sites and have the new dump site operating by May 1991 to meet regulations before the deadline.

Both cities have investigated land sites and have placed advertisements in the local newspaper looking for those who want to sell their land, Hohstadt said. Hohstadt said some interested people have said they would sell their land to be used as a landfill.
