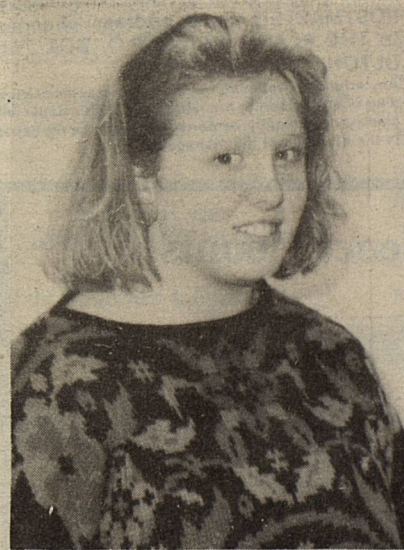

Chamber directors invite everyone in the community to attend.

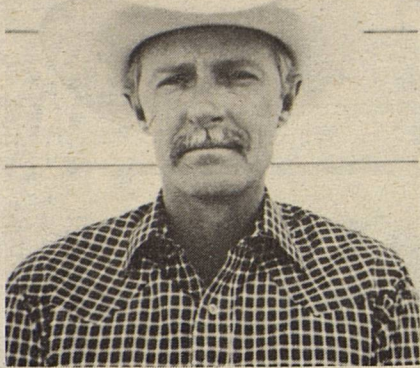

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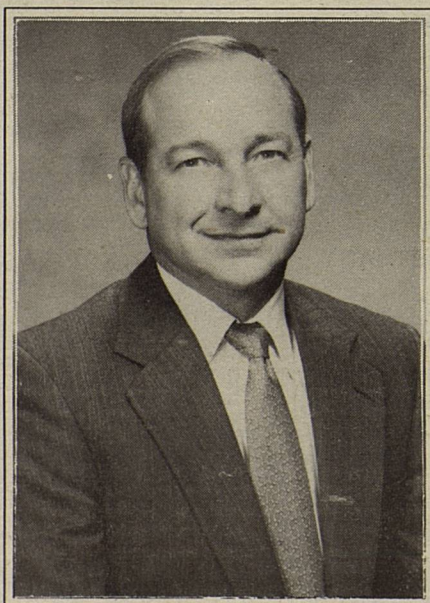

She enjoys playing the piano and has been playing by ear since she was very young. Other favorite pastimes are crocheting and reading.

Opal shares recipes for a yummy cake, different potatoes and two salads that are sure to tempt the taste buds.

CARAMEL CAKE

- 1 cup commercial sour cream
- ¼ cup milk
- 1 cup butter, softened
- 2 cups sugar
- 4 eggs
- 2¾ cups all-purpose flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- ½ teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 teaspoon rum extract
- Caramel Frosting
- Pecan halves (optional)
- Powdered sugar (optional)

Combine sour cream and milk; set mixture aside.

Cream 1 cup butter; gradually add 2 cups sugar, beating well at medium speed of an electric mixer. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition.

Combine flour, baking powder, and salt; add to creamed mixture alternately with sour cream mixture, beginning and ending with flour mixture. Mix after each addition. Stir in flavorings. Pour batter into 2 greased and floured 9-inch round cakepans; bake at 350° for 30 to 35 minutes or until a wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool in pans 10 minutes; remove from pans, and cool on wire racks. Spread Caramel Frosting between layers and on top and sides of cake. If desired, garnish with pecan halves, and sprinkle with powdered sugar. Yield: one 2-layer cake.

Caramel Frosting

- 3 cups sugar, divided
- 1 tablespoon all-purpose flour
- 1 cup milk
- ¾ cup butter or margarine
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Sprinkle ½ cup sugar in a shallow,

registers 238°. Add butter, stirring to blend. Remove from heat, and cool, without stirring, until temperature drops to 110° (about 1 hour). Add vanilla, and beat mixture with a wooden spoon or at medium speed of an electric mixer, until frosting reaches spreading consistency. Yield: enough to frost a 2-layer cake.

FREEZER COLESLAW

- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup vinegar
- 1 cup water
- ½ teaspoon celery seeds
- 1 medium cabbage, shredded (about 8 cups)
- 1 large carrot, shredded
- ½ cup chopped green pepper
- ½ cup chopped sweet red pepper
- 1 medium onion, finely chopped
- 1 teaspoon salt

Combine first 4 ingredients in a saucepan; bring to a boil, stirring occasionally. Boil 1 minute. Cool to room temperature.

Combine shredded cabbage and remaining ingredients in a large bowl, and stir well. Pour dressing over cabbage mixture; toss gently. Pack coleslaw into 4 (1-pint) freezer containers, leaving ½ inch headspace. Cover and freeze. Store in freezer up to 1 month. Thaw coleslaw at room temperature 3 hours before serving. Yield: 4 pints.

HARVEST CARROT SALAD

- 3 cups shredded carrot
- 1 (17-ounce) can apricot halves, drained and chopped
- ½ cup sliced celery
- ¾ cup raisins
- ¼ cup chopped walnuts, toasted
- ½ cup salad dressing or mayonnaise

Combine all ingredients, tossing well. Cover and refrigerate. Yield: 6 to 8 servings.

FIX-AHEAD MASHED POTATOES

- 3 pounds potatoes (about 4 large)
- ½ teaspoon salt
- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine

- 2 (3-ounce) packages cream cheese, softened
- ⅔ cup commercial sour cream
- ¼ cup milk
- ¾ teaspoon salt
- 1 tablespoon butter or margarine, melted
- ½ teaspoon paprika

Place potatoes in a saucepan; add water to cover and ½ teaspoon salt. Bring to a boil; cover, reduce heat to medium, and simmer 25 minutes or until potatoes are tender. Drain. Peel potatoes; place in a large mixing bowl, and mash with a potato masher. Add 2 tablespoons butter and next 4 ingredients, mixing until all ingredients are blended.

Spoon mixture into a lightly greased 12- x 8- x 2-inch baking dish. Brush top of mixture with melted butter; sprinkle with paprika. Bake immediately, or cover and refrigerate. If refrigerated, let stand at room temperature 30 minutes before baking. Bake at 350°, uncovered, 30 minutes or until hot. Yield: 6 to 8 servings.

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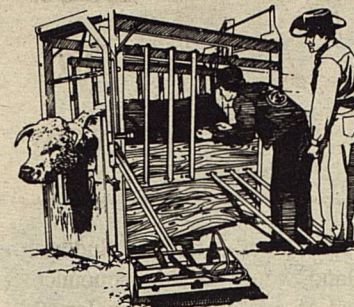

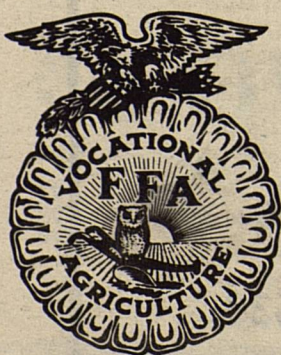

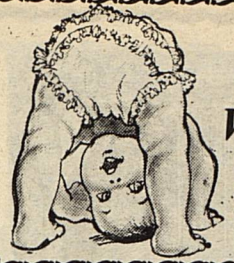

From The Superintendent's Desk

This past week, the University Interscholastic League announced the 1990-92 alignments for each classification. Plains has been assigned to Class A for the next two years, with a margin of 1.48 students. Our average daily membership as reported by the U.I.L. formula is 147.52 and the Class A cut-off is 149.

We will be in District 6A Football, District 9A Basketball and Volleyball. Spring Meet districts will be assigned at a later date. Schools in our football district are: Anton, Lorenzo, O'Donnell, Petersburg, Sudan, and Whiteface. In our basketball district, we have Amherst, Three Way, Sudan, and Whiteface.

We have some very exciting things happening in our elementary school with the IBM "Write to Read" program being in operation for students in K-2. We think this twenty-four station computer lab will be of great benefit to our students and will help to improve our test scores.

Our high school physical science classes are also using a new information window computer system that allows students to interact with the computer by touching the screen. This system uses a central processing unit which interacts with a video disc. There are other courses being developed to run on this system. Chemistry, algebra, and language arts programs will soon be available for use in our school.

The IBM "Write to Read" and the T.L.T.G. Physical Science programs are designed to meet the needs of our total student population. They are designed to let students progress at their maximum rate whether they are gifted/talented or students with special needs. These programs will benefit all students and give them a little added edge that other schools may not offer.

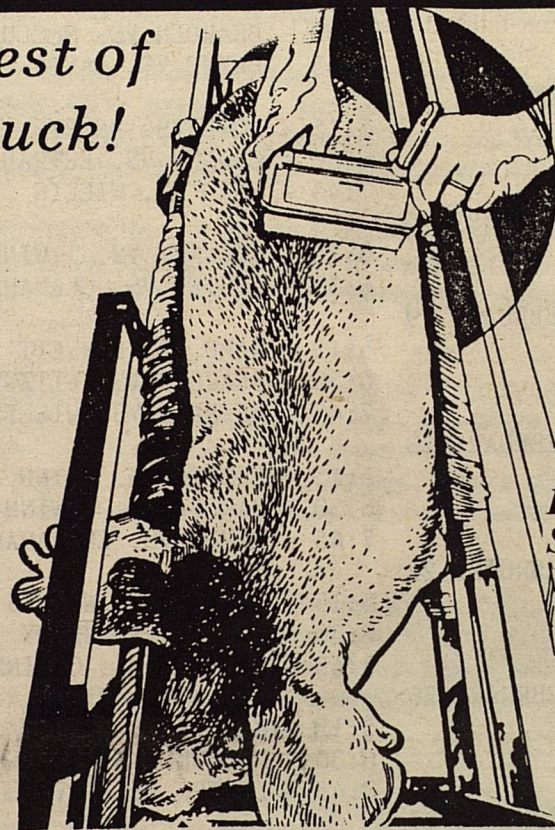
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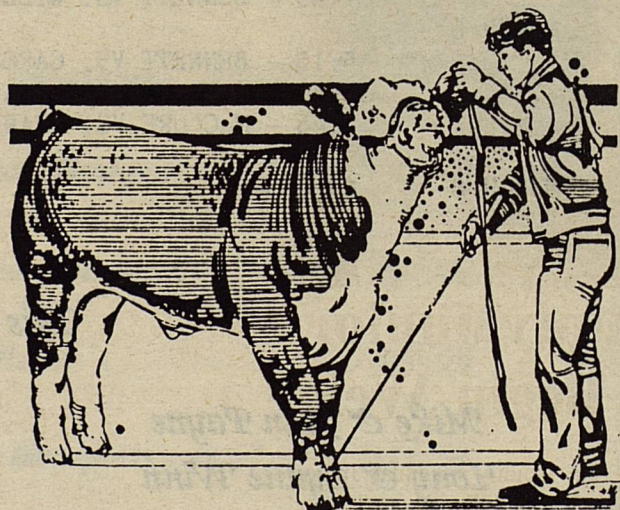

Chad Hudson finished second in science with Layne Morrow placing

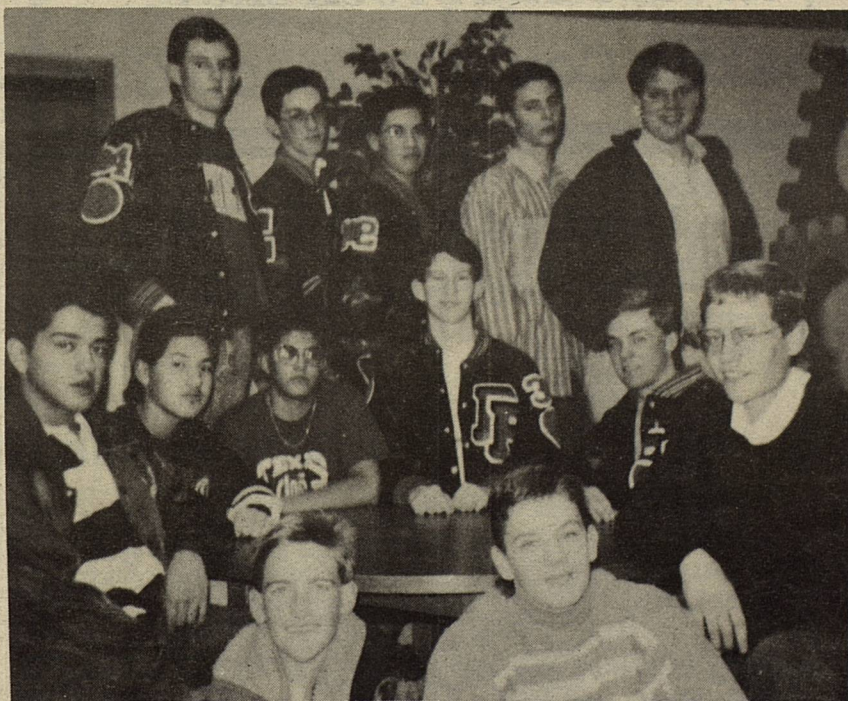
second in number sense and calculator. Daniel Canada was second in chemistry and third in science.

County Junior Livestock Show To Begin Weigh-Ins Thursday

Yoakum County's annual Junior Livestock Show will get underway Thursday with weigh-in of animals starting at 9 a.m.

Swine entries are to be weighed-in from 9 a.m. to 12 noon with lamb weigh-in from 1 to 4 p.m. Steers will be weighed-in from 4 to 5 p.m. with rabbits checked in from 5 to 7 p.m.

Judging begins with barrow competition scheduled for 8 a.m. Friday. Lambs will be judged beginning at 1

p.m. with rabbits, heifers and steers following. Champions pictures will be made beginning at 10:30 Saturday.

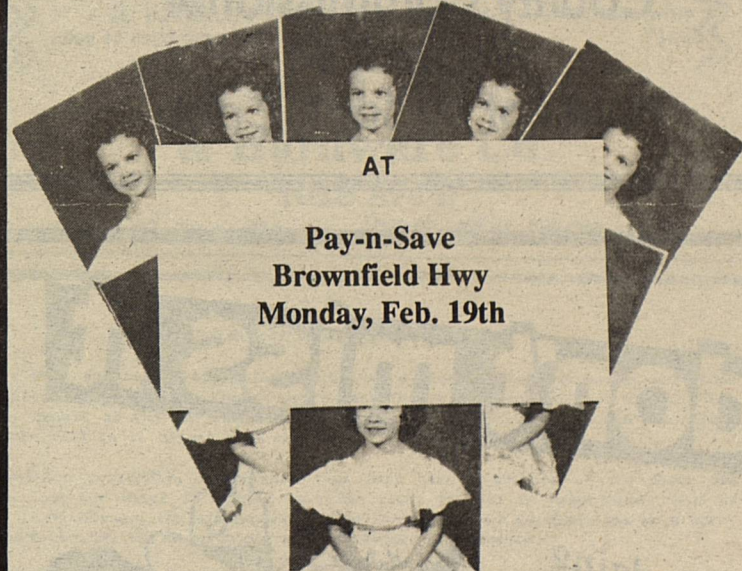

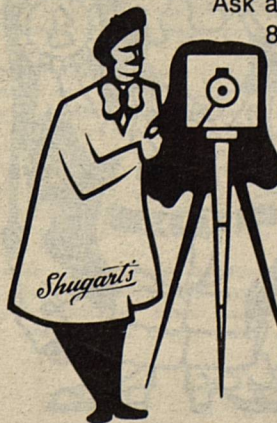

Gary Walker, manager of the newly formed Sandy Land Underground Water Conservation District, was guest speaker Feb. 1 of Plains Lions Club.

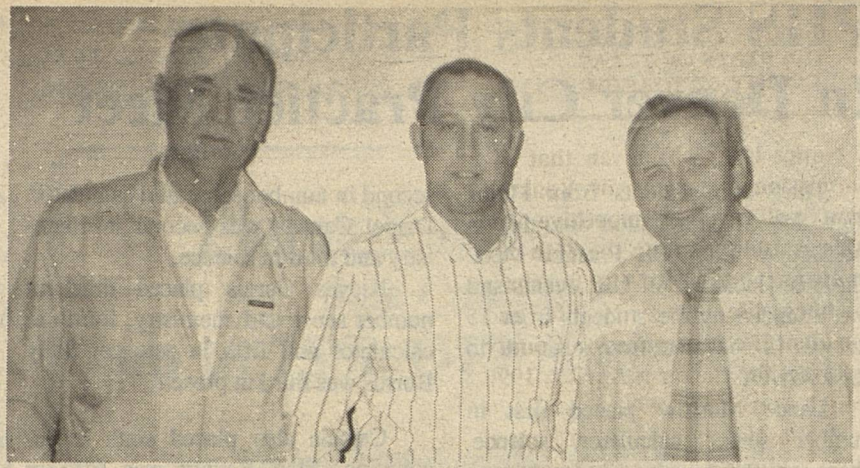
Sandy Land Underground Water Conservation District covers all of Yoakum County.

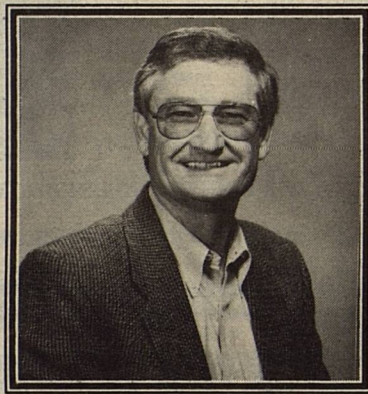
Sandy Land Water Conservation District has its offices in the old Plains Telephone Office. Walker invited residents to stop by and get acquainted.

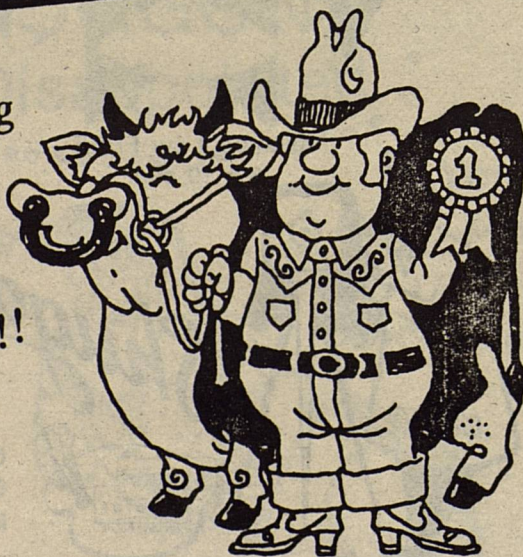

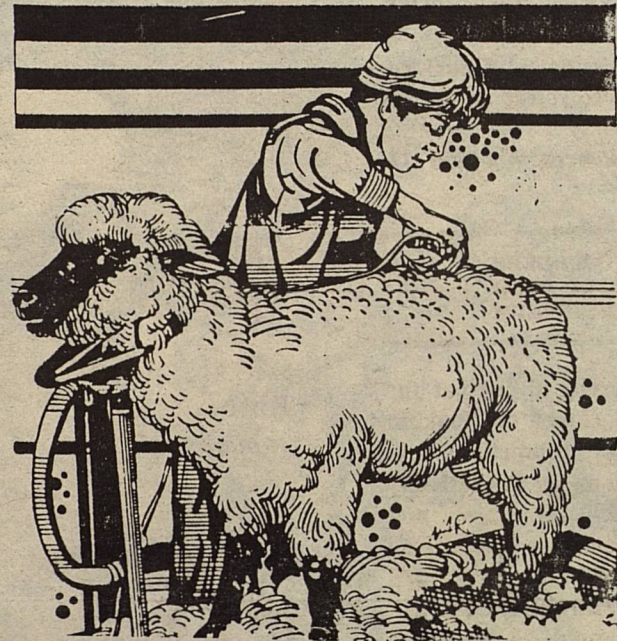

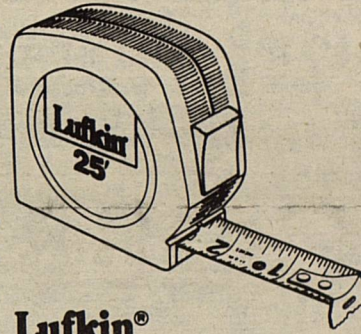

WATER PUMPS AND ELECTRIC BILLS

If the pump on your water system starts every time a faucet is opened and stops soon after it is closed, the pressure tank is probably too full of water. This is the result of what is called a waterlogged condition. And it can cause your electric bill to be higher than necessary.

To function correctly, a pressure tank must have a cushion of air above the water. As the water is pumped into the tank, the air is compressed. And as water is withdrawn, the air expands. The larger the air cushion, the more water the tank can deliver between any given extremes of pressure.

The size of the air cushion does not remain constant. Water absorbs the air, and eventually the air cushion becomes so small that even drawing a small amount of water causes the pump motor to start and stop.

Manufacturers have devised various methods to solve the problem. One method calls for an air valve that is controlled by a float, either inside or outside the pressure tank. When the water level in the tank rises too high, the float opens an air valve and permits the pump to "sniff" the air which is carried into the tank with the water. Should the valve core begin leaking, it should be replaced with another valve core. It should never be replaced with an automobile tire core. The springs in a tire core are too strong to permit the pump to suck air through the water. A new pump valve core may be obtained at stores that handle pumps and pump supplies.

The frequent starting and stopping of a waterlogged pump causes undue wear on the pump motor and other pump parts. Allowing a pump to continue operating in a waterlogged condition means unnecessary trouble, inconvenience, maintenance expense - and a higher electric bill.
