# Thirty-Seven Percent Voters Participate In Primary Election

Results from a five-candidate race for County Commissioner in Precinct Four in Yoakum County will lead to a runoff election between Jack Cobb and Larry Murphree.

Cobb garnered 177 votes to 118 for Murphree, according to unofficial returns in the primary election in which about 37 percent of the registered county voters participated.

Trailing in the contest were Melvin C. Lowrey with 95 votes. Morris Jay Rushing with 94 votes and Murrell A. Thompson with 66 votes.

Another runoff election will be necessary for the Justice of the Peace Precinct One slot, where Melba Crutcher outpaced Hershel Smith by a

margin of 281 to 108.

Other candidates in the six-man race, including their vote totals, were Gary Dyer, 106; Vennum Fitzgerald, 93; T.J. Bearden, 55; and Charlotte Kennedy, 51.

In the Democratic race for governor, Jim Mattox outpolled Ann Richards by 715 to 228 votes, while Mark White came in third with 200 votes.

Clayton Williams was favored by Yoakum County voters in the Republican gubernatorial race, pulling down 137 votes to 75 for Kent Hance. W.N. Otwell garnered one vote, and other candidates, including Jack Rains and Tom Luce, received no votes.







Yoakum County producers who apply restricted use or state-limiteduse chemicals may do so with a Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) private applicator certificate. However, producers who supervise the application of these chemicals by one or more employees must obtain a separate TDA private applicator license, said Kirk Lewis, Yoakum County Extension

To become licensed private applicators, individuals must attend a Texas Agricultural Extension Service private applicator training program, make a

passing score on a TDA examination and send an application with a required \$50 fee to the TDA. The TDA private applicator license is valid for five years, said Lewis.

Regulations brought about by the last Texas Legislature session mean that certified applicators can still purchase and apply these chemicals, but their employees may not handle the chemicals.

"Unless producers whose employees put out these chemicals have this additional license, they are in violation of the law," said Lewis.

The Yoakum County Extension Service recently hosted a private pesticide applicator seminar. "Out of almost 350 Yoakum County producers, 51 attended, and 49 of them were certified and received their license," said Lewis.

Producers holding TDA private applicator certificates dated after Jan. 10, 1989, may continue to buy and use regulated pesticides. But persons holding private applicator certificates dated prior to Jan. 1 of this year will be required to become licensed private applicators within five years.

Lewis said most cotton farmers will first be confronted with this law in early May, with the application of Temik, a pre-plant chemical. Because of this, the next workshop will be hosted in late March or early April in the Plains Club Room.

Producers who cannot attend these pesticide applicator workshops may watch a slide presentation in the Yoakum County Extension Office then take the examination at the TDA office in Lubbock.


