## April Designated To Observe Prevention Of Child Abuse

The 15 county area of the South Plains including Lubbock received 2634 reports of suspected child abuse and neglect in 1989. Yoakum County alone received 48 reports of suspected abuse and neglect.

Monday, April 9 has been named "Red Button Day". Focus of the day is for persons in the community to look at emotional abuse of children. Red buttons are imprinted with a teddy bear, universal symbol of solace, and the words, "Words Hurt, Watch Your Words".

Plains residents are asked to join other Yoakum County residents in wearing a red button during the month of April, especially during the week of April 9. Buttons are being made available by the local Child Welfare Board free of charge.

Yoakum County Child Welfare Board along with Children's Protective Services is available to present programs to groups, clubs or any other organizations concerning issues of child abuse and neglect. For more information contact one of the local Child Welfare Board members or call 592-3307.

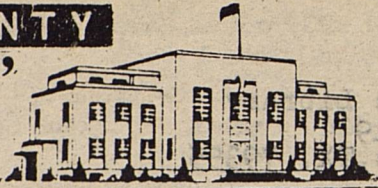
## Love Fund Established

**YOAKUM COUNTY**

**Commissioners' Court**



Yoakum County Commissioners' Court convened March 5 in special session with all members present.

The court approved a motion to advertise for bids to buy two motor graders for Precinct 3 and offer in trade two used motor graders. Bids were to be received March 23 for action March 26.

Extra hire and disbursements were approved for payment. Proposals of March 26 for cancer care and intensive care insurance were reviewed with Ross Shamburger, agent for Cancer America. Shamburger announced he and Eddie Taylor of Denver City would work together as servicing agents. Intensive care coverage will include injuries on precinct equipment such as road graders in the provision for injuries on farm tractors. He quoted optional dreaded disease rider covering 17 diseases with premium at \$1.25 per month for employees, \$2.50 for dependents.

The court voted to accept the cancer pay plus basic cancer policy at \$9.15 per month for employees, \$16.25 family with employees given the option at their own expense to take any other additional benefits offered. Term of policy is April 1, 1990 through March 31, 1991.

In other action, proposals for salary life, longevity life and dependent life insurance were reviewed. A proposal by Lyn Bauer for U.S. Life was not included in the comparison chart since it had been withdrawn at an earlier meeting until a rate for dependent coverage could be obtained. The U.S. Life proposal was accepted unanimously.

In regular session March 12, Commissioners' Court appointed or re-appointed Child Welfare Board members. Serving terms expiring March 1991 are Joe Hester, Mary Nell Maynard, Darla Welch, Jenny Coston and Tony Wright. Named to terms expiring March 1992 were Wayne Harper, Rosie Bitolas, Tanya Warren and Janie Crawford. To serve terms expiring March 1993 are Mavis Sessions, Pam Teaff, Darrell Bethany and Ronnie Lunsford.

The court also adopted a library policy.

All members voted to accept the donation of a 10 acre tract in precinct 2 from Southwestern Public Service.

Convening in special session March 19, the court opened bids on the sale of a 1973 Chevrolet pickup. A bid of \$799.99 from Darwin Hobbs was accepted.

James Melendez was employed as sheriff's deputy, assuming duties April 1. He replaces Robert Higgins whose resignation is effective March 31.

Approved was a motion to advertise for bids for the purchase of one chip spreader with trade-in of a 1986 chip spreader. Bids are to be received by April 9.

In special session March 26, the court opened the only bids received for

the purchase of two new motor graders from West Texas Equipment Company. They were accepted.

Wanda Smith, tax assessor/collector presented a report of taxes collected in February. A pay request by hospital administrator Ed

Rodgers was approved for payment in the amount of \$29,053. Extra hire and disbursements were approved for payment.

## SAUCY LITTLE MEAT LOAVES

Topping:  
 1/3 c catsup  
 1 T brown sugar  
 1 T mustard  
 Meat Loaf:  
 1 lb ground beef  
 1/2 c oats  
 1 t salt  
 1/4 t pepper  
 1/4 c chopped onion  
 1 egg, beaten  
 1/2 c milk

For meat loaves, combine all ingredients, thoroughly. Shape into six loaves and place in shallow baking pan. Spread topping on loaves and sprinkle with parsley flakes. Bake at 350 degrees for 35 minutes.

## OVEN-FRIED CHICKEN, DRESSING

1 4-lb ready to cook chicken  
 6 c dry bread cubes (I prefer cornbread)  
 1 t salt  
 Dash pepper  
 1 1/4 t sage  
 2 T chopped onion  
 1/2 c melted butter or margarine  
 1 10 1/2 or 11 oz can condensed cream of chicken soup

Dip chicken into flour seasoned with salt and pepper; brown in hot fat. Combine bread cubes, salt, pepper, sage, onion, and butter, using 1/2 c soup.

Arrange chicken in Dutch oven. Pile dressing in center. Make gravy of pan drippings, using 2 T flour and enough water with soup to make 2 cups; pour over chicken. Cover tightly; bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) for one hour.  
 Makes 6 servings.

## GREAT COOKIES

Blend and cream: 1 c brown sugar, 1 c white sugar, 1 c Crisco, 2 eggs.  
 Mix and add to creamed mixture:

1 t salt, 2 c sifted flour, 1 t baking powder, 1 t soda.  
 Add to the above ingredients: 1 t vanilla, 2 c oatmeal, 1 c coconut, 1 c chopped pecans.  
 Mix well and drop by teaspoons onto ungreased cookie sheet and bake 10 to 15 minutes at 350 degrees.

## SPECIAL CHERRY COBBLER

3/4 c sugar  
 1 egg  
 1 c flour  
 1 t baking powder  
 dash cinnamon  
 1/2 c pecans  
 1 stick margarine  
 1 #2 can red tart cherries  
 Pour juice off cherries and save for sauce. Place cherries in bottom of baking dish. Mix egg with sugar, then

add flour, baking powder, cinnamon and pecans. Spread over cherries. Melt margarine and pour over mixture. Bake at 350 degrees for about 30 minutes or until done.

SAUCE: Mix cherry juice with 3/4 c sugar and 1 1/2 T flour. Cook until thickened and serve over warm cobbler.

## Storing Foods Safe & Proper

Maintaining food quality starts with selecting high quality foods. It also involves storing foods properly and using them in a timely way. Tips for maintaining quality during storage include:

\*Rotate foods on hand with newly purchased foods so that older times are used first.

\*Reseal packages tightly after opening. Transfer foods such as flour, sugar, and cereal to airtight containers. Store whole wheat flour in the refrigerator or freezer.

\*Keep freezers at 0 degrees F. or colder. Store foods in airtight containers, freezer bags, or heavy duty freezer wrap or foil. Don't refreeze thawed foods unless they've been cooked.

\*Keep refrigerators below 40 degrees F. Store foods in airtight containers to prevent transfer of odors or flavors. Allow enough room between items for adequate circulation of air. Remove spoiled foods promptly to prevent cross-contamination.

\*Keep dry storage areas clean, cool, dark and dry. Store foods on shelves above the floor, away from water pipes and hot air ducts. Store foods in coolest areas of the kitchen. Keep cleaning supplies in a separate area, away from foods.

\*All foods have limits on how long they will stay at peak quality, even when stored properly. A guide for storing some common perishables can be obtained from your local county Extension Office. Times assume that foods are of high quality when purchased, and that they are properly handled and stored at home.

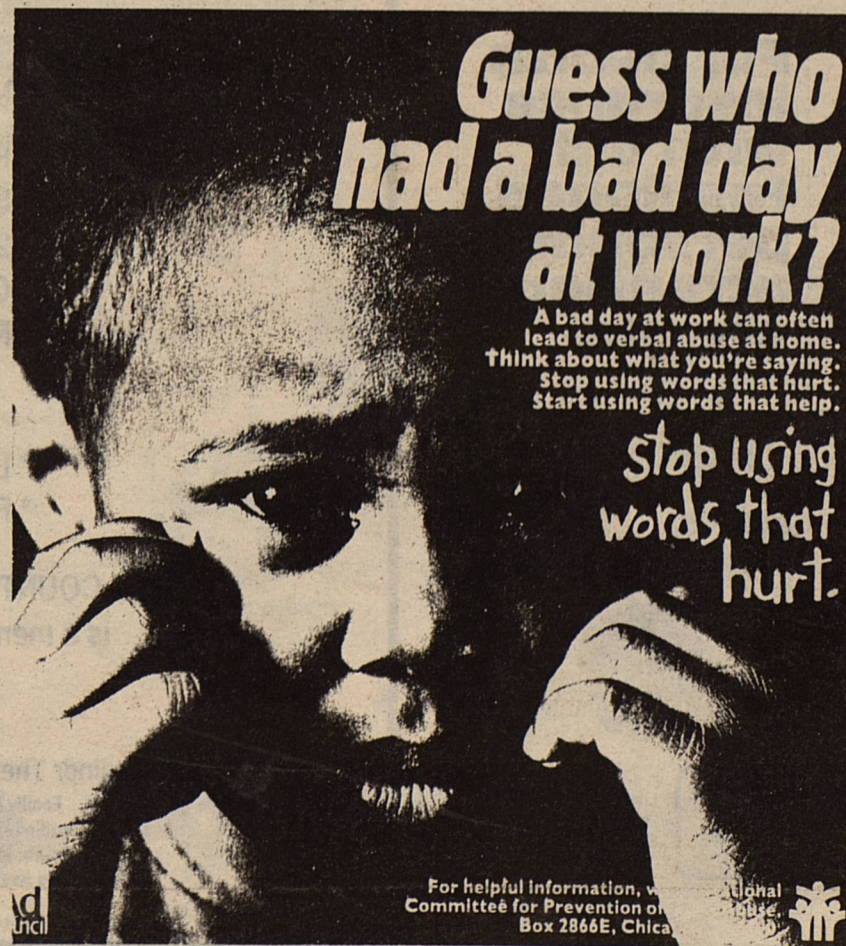
