## Darrel Lowrey Recognized As 1990 'Outstanding Farmer'

Darrel Lowrey has been named Yoakum County's Outstanding Conservation Farmer of 1990 by Yoakum Soil and Water Conservation District and Plains Lions Club.

A native of Yoakum County, he has been farming since 1970, with both dry land and irrigated operations. The land under irrigation is watered with center pivot systems, served by underground pipeline to supply water to crops in the most efficient manner possible. This allows crop uniformity and at the same time utilizes water with the least amount of waste possible.

Lowrey is a firm believer in crop rotation on all his land. Crop rotations enhance crop yields. High residue crops such as milo greatly reduce soil erosion, essential in maintaining soil fertility.

Because he feels erosion control is so important, Lowrey placed his most erosive land in the Conservation Reserve Program. The grass cover on the CRP land eliminates erosion and allows him to devote his time and re-

 fragile land.Lowrey married Beverly Allen of Denver City in 1969. They are parents of two sons, Jeff, a student in South Plains College and Shane, a junior in Plains High School.

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## 'Long Range Planning'

Community leaders from Yoakum County met recently to identify local issues and help determine possible solutions as the Texas Agricultural Extension Service began planning long range programs to meet these local concerns.

Citizens were invited by county officials and the Extension Program Council to meet and discuss these critical issues. The group met on Tuesday, March 27 in the Denver City Community Building, said Kirk Lewis, Yoakum County Extension Agent for Agriculture.

Four task forces were formed from the study group: agriculture and natural resources, home economics, youth and community development. Matters of wide public concern were identified in each area, said Lewis.
"Identifying these key issues, and incorporating them into a statewide plan will enable Extension Service faculty to better meet the public's needs," said Mary Dale Williams, Yoakum County Extension Agent for Home Economics.

Agriculture and natural resources task force members Gary Six, Ty Earl Powell and Tim Addison agreed that improving public perception of agriculture is a critical issue facing the county. The group suggested holding an Agriculture and Oil Industry Appreciation Day. The day's events might include a meal at Yoakum County Park and tours of both industries. Information would be provided about how federal farm programs are managed and other aspects of the federal agricultural budget.

The group also suggested educating the public about the functions and responsibilities of the Farmer's Home Loan Administration, food and fiber quality and chemical usage and safety. The task force wished to increase producer education through more producer meetings and increased political activity of local producer groups.

Addressing environmental issues such as labeling, safety and utilization of the Sandy Land Underground Water Conservation District to test wells and secure abandoned wells are other areas the group identified. The task force agreed that increased attention should be given to wildlife management in Yoakum County, specifically, predator control and hunting.

Studying new farming techniques, enhancing marketing skills and considering the feasibility of labor-intensified farming programs are areas the group thought would be critical in improving production efficiency in Yoakum County.

Home Economics task force members Beverly Sprouse and Sheila Stephens identified education as a critical issue. Parenting, drug and sex education were all areas of home economics programs the group discussed. Improved financial management skills for both youth and adults, as well as finding adequate, affordable housing
for county citizens were other issues the group pointed out.

The task force discussed a public elder day care program, where senior citizens offer time and expertise in childcare for the public. Sprouse and Stephens agreed that nutritional education for families is an area where programming should be concentrated.

The group also discussed the creation of a crisis hotline. Sprouse and Stephens concluded that the key to solving most of the issues identified is improving communications between parents and children.

Members of the youth task force included Vickee Faught, Judy Bethany, Glenna McMullin and Linda Risley. The group indentified the single most important issue as giving youth a vision for success. The group's findings said, "Youth should have a vision of themselves and their families as successful."

The task force decided that programs should involve all relevant county groups in planning activities and making decisions which affect youth. These county groups should represent persons from all backgrounds and income levels. Parenting skills, the group decided, could be enhanced through improved communications, better financial planning, better emotional support and increased self-esteem for parents and youth.

The group agreed that, through county cooperation, drug, alcohol and tobacco use among youth could be prevented to improve young people's lives.

The effects of the environment on youth were also discussed. Such environmental effects include the state of the world, nation, state and county, as well as influences from the community and youths' personal lives.

The youth task force concluded that healthy bodies and minds could be gained by realizing the benefits of nu-
trition and exercise and by forming support groups for the mental health of both youth and parents.
L.J. Sanders, Ron Hatfield and Linda Kay, all members of the community development task force agreed that merging the people of Yoakum County, improving economic opportunities and more education are the keys to boosting the Yoakum County economy.

The group discussed getting more people involved in county activities through joint committees and projects. Increasing minority involvement and getting more intergovernmental cooperation were two more ways the task force felt that the county could be united.

Creating more interest for new businesses by assisting with funding and involving the Chamber of Commerce, schools and city and county government are ways the group thought economic opportunities could be increased. The group also discussed the organization of an economic de-
velopment board and enhancement of current businesses.

Economic conditions might be improved through better education in such areas as conservation, drug and alcohol awareness, environment and parenting skills, the group concluded.

Williams and Lewis said similar study groups will meet in each county during March and April. More than 12,000 Texans took part in long range planning meetings in 1986. Almost 5,000 issues were identified, and county issues which were grouped into 12 broad statewide issues have directed Extension Service planning through 1990.

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## Quality Water, Major Concern For Water District Office

How many Aggies does it take to register a water well in Yoakum County? One, as long as it is Gary Walker, manager of the Sandy Land Underground. Water Conservation District.

Walker, a graduate of Texas A\&M University, supervises activities at the water district office in operation since Feb. 1.

The water district was originally proposed in the last session of the Texas Legislature. The proposal went to Yoakum County voters last November and was confirmed by a 3-to-1 ratio, Walker said.

Five at-large board members for the water district were also elected. The board consists of David Tumbow, president; L.J. Sanders, vice president; Ray Bearden, secretary; Brad Palmer and Don Parrish. Board members will meet once a month to discuss water district business, Walker said.

Located in what was the Plains telephone building, the water district's areás of concern are testing water quality, permitting water wells and checking the efficiency of irrigation methods. Walker is assisted in the office by Kathy Jones, secretary.

Walker's major concern is water quality rather than quantity.
"The decline of the (Ogallala) aquifer has not been to the extent that it is alarming in this area," Walker said.

Walker said chlorides, which are by-products of oil production, are the major culprits influencing water quality in Yoakum County.

The office plans to test water samples from domestic wells, although
much quality testing hasn't been performed yet. Testing will be increased as more laboratory equipment is added to the office, Walker said.

The water district has jurisdiction over the registration of all water wells in Yoakum County, Walker said. Through specifications in the Texas Water Code, the district regulates the production of water through the spacing of wells by issuing permits.

Sandy Land Underground Water Conservation District may cooperate with other agencies such as the Texas Agricultural Extension Service to concentrate most of their irrigation work on result demonstrations. Walker said these demonstrations may concern the use of low energy precision application (LEPA) irrigation.

LEPA cuts down on expense and conserves water, said Walker. It has a low application point and puts the water on the plant instead of in the air where it could be evaporated by wind or high temperatures.

Walker said center pivot irrigation is the chief method used for watering crops in Yoakum County.
"About 900 total irrigation systems exist in the county, with 70 to 80 percent of these being center pivots," Walker said.
"Many programs are still in the planning stage," said Walker. A budget, to be created in the summer, will be presented in the fall. The budget will allow for such things as cooperating in result demonstrations, purchasing laboratory equipment, flow meters, office equipment and other equipment necessary to begin full operation.

Walker plans to edit a regular newsletter to inform producers and consumers in Yoakum County of news and developments about water conservation. Walker said developments in the field of water conservation are con-
stantly changing in the last legislative session, 13 water districts like Sandy Land were created.

Walker received his degree in animal science at Texas A\&M University. He also completed some graduate work in feedyard management at West Texas State University. In 1986, Walker moved on to manage the Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District covering portions of Potter, Robertson and Armstrong Counties.

Walker and his wife, Frankie, have two children. Lorri is a sophomore at Texas A\&M, and Dare is a junior at White Deer High School.
