## ATTENTION WORKING PARENTS

Children's Enterprises, Inc. is considering a Kids Konnection afterschool program in Plains, beginning in the fall of 1990 . We want to determine how many parents are interested in such a program, and how many would commit to using it.

Children's Enterprises, Inc. is a non-profit children's resource agency dedicated to providing quality care for all children, and support services for those parents and adults who work with children. Our program is called Kids Konnection and our very first site which opened in January is in Ralls, Texas. This after-school child care program is licensed by the Texas Department of Human Services, and a ratio of one staff to fifteen children is maintained. During their stay, the children are provided a nutritious snack, supervised indoor and outdoor play, creative activities, educational games and toys, and some quiet time to read or do homework.

Hours are from school dismissal until 6:00 p.m. on regularly scheduled school days. Care can also be provided
on school holidays and in-service days, if there is enough interest for such a service. Those qualifying for enrollment are all students enrolled in Plains schools in pre-school through sixth grade. An advisory council, made up of local citizens, concerned parents and school officials, will be established to ensure that the needs of the community are expressed and met.

There is currently an annual enrollment fee of $\$ 15$ and $\$ 17.50$ per week will be charged for tuition. Depending on availability of funds, financial assistance is available for those who qualify. Guidelines for qualifying are approximately those which qualify families for the free-reduced lunch program at school.
