Both exemptions are in effect from March 1 to Aug. 31, 1990.

Persons receiving food stamps or aid to families with dependent children are encouraged to consider short-term employment as census takers. For information about temporary employment, contact Joe Garcia, 1-800-7428600. Workers will receive $\$ 5.50$ per hour plus mileage allowance of 24 cents per mile for any official use of a private vehicle.

Applicants must be 18 years old or older, a U.S. citizen and take a written test.
