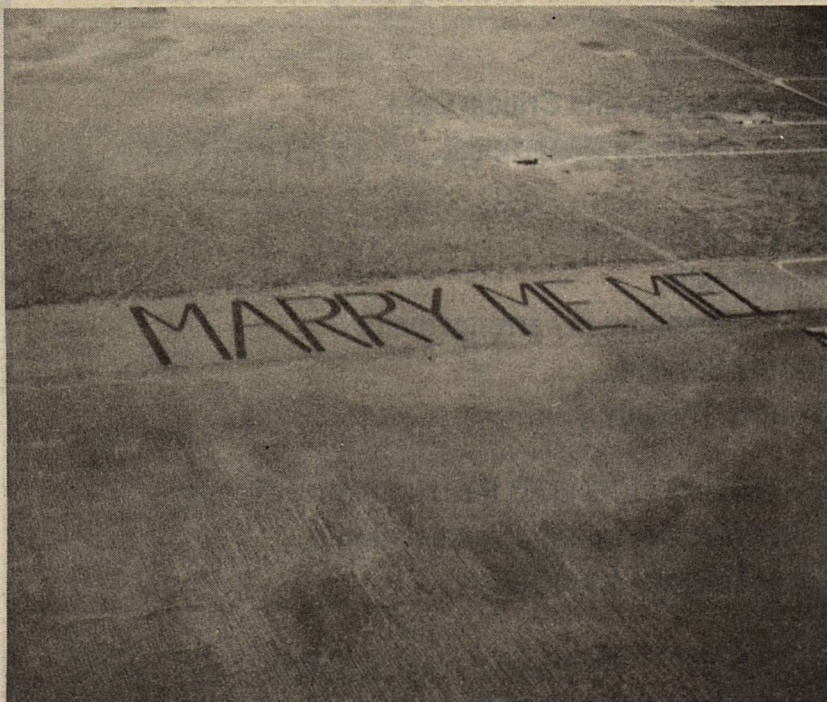

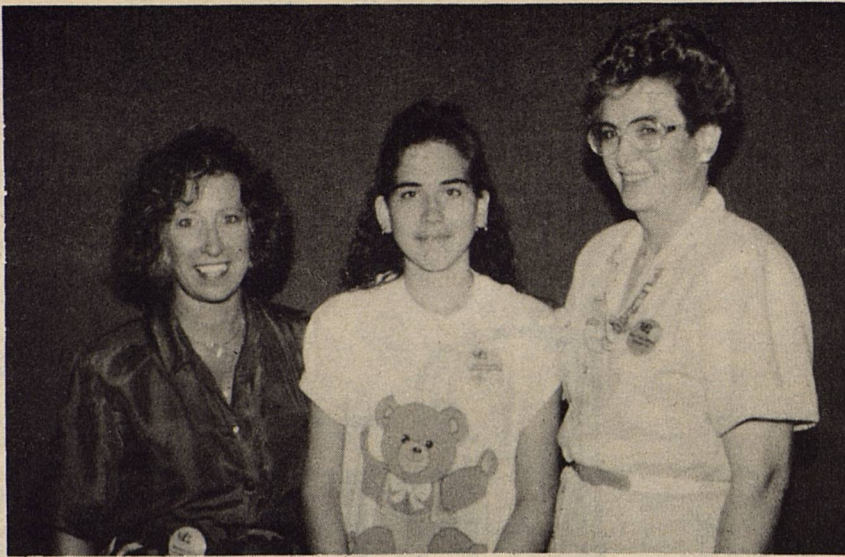
Leadership Award" from Texans' War on Drugs.

Said to have been Queen Elizabeth I's favorite dessert, syllabub is an old-fashioned pudding that modern methods make easy. You can even make it a day in advance.

Lemon Syllabub

Rind and juice of 1 large lemon; 4 ozs. (8 tablespoons) granulated sugar; 1/2 cup Sandeman's Armada Cream Sherry; 1 cup cream.

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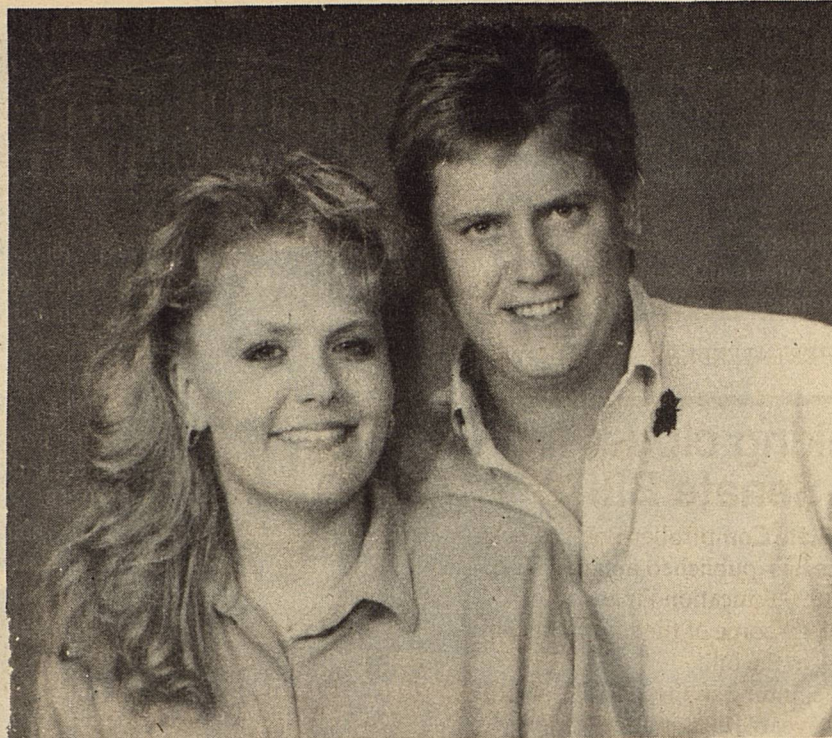

SUPERINTENDENTS COMMENTS

Taking closer look at Senate Bill 1

State Comptroller Bob Bullock's office has published an analysis of the 1990 Education Finance Act. Here are some of the highlights he notes in the bill:

- Beginning in the 1991-92 school year, Texas students in the fourth, sixth, eighth and tenth grades will be given standardized, nationally-recognized achievement tests. These tests are designed so that the performance of Texas' schoolchildren can be compared directly to students in other states, as well as between individual districts.
- The bill will require school districts to issue an annual "report card" to parents showing how the district compares to similar districts around the state on factors like test scores and dropout rates.
- The bill empowers the education commissioner to take over poorly performing districts, and to merge such districts with better-run neighboring districts for the purpose of improving their academic programs.
- In a move to free districts from red tape and over-regulation by state authorities, the bill removes all State Board of Education rules for local districts except those governing curriculum by 1993, unless the board specifically re-adopts them.
- Districts receiving the highest rating of "exemplary" under the school accreditation process will be exempted from many state rules and regulations.

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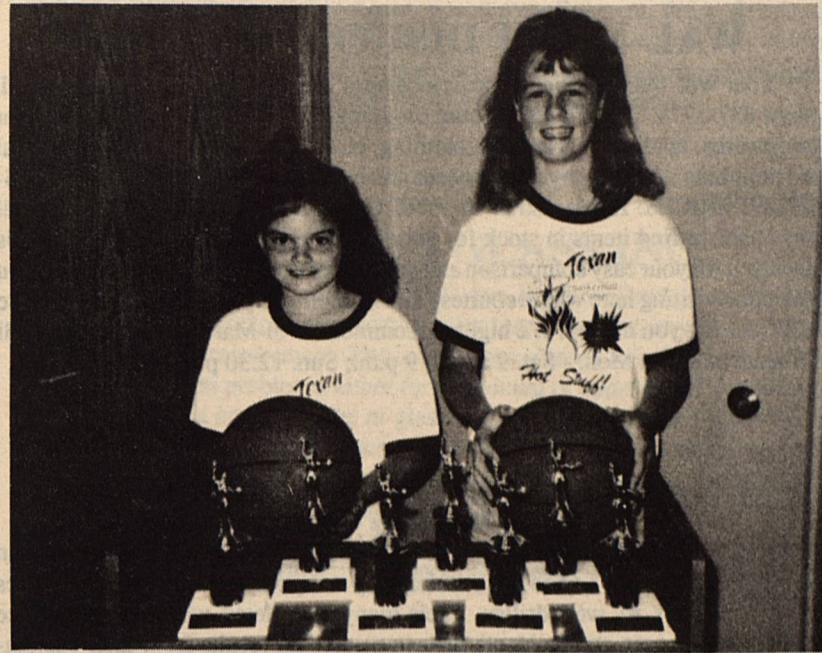

Also approved was a call for bids to be received for the purchase of computer equipment for Yoakum County Hospital. Bids will be opened for review Aug. 9 with action to be taken Aug. 13.

Special session of Yoakum County Commissioners Court July 30 found members approving a motion to publish intent to increase taxes by eight percent.

A budget work session was held and a motion approved to release a number of securities due in August. Extra hire and disbursements were approved for payment.

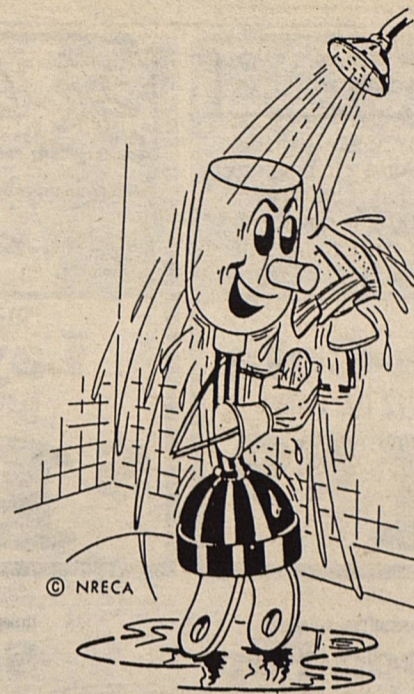
