## Cowboys Tromp Lorenzo For Second District Victory

Plains Cowboys rode to a $36-3$ victory over Lorenzo Friday night in their second district outing of the 90 season.

Monte Pierce connected with Dain Guetersloh on a 15 -yard pass and points on the scoreboard, in a "third time's a charm" possession. Two earlier drives had been unsuccessful. Chris Chavez kicked the extra point and the Cowboys were off running.

Starting their next scoring drive on their own 16, Wade Redman carried for gains of three and six yards. Pierce carried for six before connecting with Guetersloh on a 25 yarder for the TD. Kick was no good.

Score at halftime was Plains, 13; Lorenzo, O.

Medina, gaining 131 for the night, carried on runs of seven, seven, four and 11. Pierce then found Jason Smith for an eight yard toss on the first scoring drive of the second half. Medina capped the drive with a 25 yard run for pay dirt. Pierce connected with Smith for the two points conversion.

On their next possession, the Cowboys scored on a 35 yard pass from Pierce to Shane Lowrey. Kick was no good.

Guetersloh recovered a fumble on
the kick-off to give the ball back to the Cowboys. Pierce ran for 12 yards and Medina carried the ball into the end zone on a three yard run. Medina tacked on two more points.

A Cowboy fumble at the Lorenzo 46 gave the Hornets possession. They moved to the Plains 11 and with four seconds left on the clock, scored a field goal for their only score.

In addition to Medina's 131, Pierce carried nine times for 56 yards; Dusty Rafferty, three for 10; Redman, three for 10; and Guetersloh, one for six. Guetersloh had four catches for 43 yards and two TDs; Smith, five for 60 yards and Lowrey, three for 75 and one TD. Pierce threw 27 times with 12 completions for 181 yards, three TDs and one interception.

Fine defensive performances were turned in by the Cowboys. Stoney Garland had 10 tackles and caused a fumble; Jose Ramirez, nine tackles and a fumble recovery; Rafferty, seven, a quarterback sack and fumble recovery; Dan Rushing, five and a fumble recovery; Lowrey, five, forced a fumble and recovered a blocked punt; Chavez, five; and Guetersloh, a punt blocked.

Cowboys turned in an offensive total of 394 yards.

## Texas Birth Certificates Available At Courthouse

Yoakum County Clerk's office now has an automated system for producing certified copies of birth records from Texas Department of Health's data base in Austin. This enables one to obtain a certified copy of his or her birth certificate in minutes.

At present, the service is only available to persons born in Texas during 1926, 1927, 1928 and from 1942 until the present. Other years are being added to the data base.

Fee for a certified copy of birth certificate is $\$ 8$ each. Fee for search, if record is not found is $\$ 8$ each also.

## Ann Richards' Bid Earns Our Support

When oil was $\$ 40$ a barrel, he used to be 6-foot-4; now he's just 4-foot-6 but still around, Clayton Williams told appreciative summertime campaign audiences with a broad, disarming smile.

Now, it's October. The day we Texans will elect a new governor is just four weeks away. Oil, at least for the time being, is back in the $\$ 40$ range.

We as fellow West Texans say a little regretfully that neither of those circumstances has added anything to the stature of the man, as measured not in inches but in his potential to govern this state effectively.

That potential is rooted in credibility and in leadership skills. Since the actual powers of a Texas governor are limited, the effectiveness of any governor rests largely on the ability to communicate with others, without a script or cue cards.

We have talked both with Williams and with Ann Richards, up close and personal. And we concluded that Ms. Richards speaks our language, and yours, better than the man from Midland. That's true even though she has never lived any farther west than the near edge of Austin.

After giving the question the serious thought it deserves, we conclude that Ann Richards holds the promise of being a better governor than Clayton Williams. We support her election to that office.

Faced with a question about what she'd do as governor, she comes a whole lot closer than her opponent to giving a plain answer based on candor and common sense - and on the day-today experience of serving as a public official.

Williams suffers by comparison.
During an interview he is more inclined to wave a handsome brochure and pronounce: "It's all in here" - the answer to your substantive question, he means.

Most of us surely would prefer to hear his thinking couched in his own words, rather than the phrases and sloganeering of a skilled public relations practitioner.

We wish he would give Texans that chance during a one-on-one Williams-Richards debate. But apparently there'll be none. Williams was quoted the other day with respect to his - and his campaign handlers' - reluctance to debate Ms. Richards: "I'm a cowboy, not a lawyer."

He's also a man with a reputation for frequently putting his foot in his mouth, boot and all. That propensity has had him in hot water intermittently almost from the day he announced his candidacy. We will forgo a full rehashing of his remarks about rape, about prostitutes and the rest.

Those gaffes are most notable for what they reveal of Williams' underlying problems. They seem a symptom not just of insensitivity, but also of the superficial aspects of his outlook on significant issues.

There is a black-and-white pattern to his thinking and his emphatic statements that doesn't bode well for his ability to govern, or for his prospects for leadership.

Early last month, he pledged expansively that as governor he would "veto any and every attempt at...any kind of tax". Ever? Over the course of a four-year term? No matter what happens?

Yeaaa! cheered some Texans.
Get real, get honest, said a lot of others.

Given the ever-changing economic structure of Texas, changes in the taxing system to assure equity will most certainly be necessary, and attitudes such as that shown by Williams will cripple state government's ability to deal with that important issue.

Some very savvy people are challenging Williams? promises to cut costs in state government. He didn't even start with valid numbers in arriving at his projections, they assert.

Those detractors explain that he doesn't understand state government or recognize the inescapable fact that certain basic government services are not optional.

He has given himself no wiggleroom on taxes, but that stance appeals to citizens who, unlike the typical Texan who simply doesn't enjoy paying new taxes, suffer from a condition George Will describes in his column today as "taxaphobia".

It is another Williams position that really scares the daylights out of some of us - and should sound alarm bells for the rest. He has promised, under the governor's new power to appoint the state education commissioner, to name only an individual who subscribes to his notion that public tax money should be handed over to the parents who want to use it to pay tuition in private schools.

That goes against the grain so badly that it seems almost superfluous to point out that the Texas Constitution sets forth the fundamental right to an "efficient system" of public schools. Public schools.

At the heart of the Williams campaign for governor is the statement that he wants to "make Texas great again". The problem is that his vision of greatness is little more than a caricature. More substantive leadership is needed.

Thus, we support the candidacy of Ann Richards.

She has faced up to rough times, acknowledging and meeting 10 years ago the challenge of recovering from alcoholism. She has been a teacher, a county commissioner and probably the best state treasurer Texas has ever had, earning high marks from legislators of both parties

Following a meeting of the local Ann Richards For Governor Steering Committee, Ty Earl Powell announced the opening of a bank account for campaign contributions for the Democratic candidate. In other matters of local interest, Powell noted that Texas Tech University President Robert Lawless has expressed a serious concern that Republican Candidate Clayton Williams will cut funding for higher education. Teachers and administrators in public schools are alarmed over Williams' voucher system proposal whereby public tax dollars would be distributed to parents who could use the public
money to pay private school tuition for their children. Powell stated that Ann Richards believes a strong system of public education is vital for the survival of democracy. Also, most knowledgeable observers believe the Williams' voucher system would be unconstitutional and would pose another costly delay in working out the problems of adequate funding for the public schools of Texas.

## LARRY DEVITT, ELEMMENTARY PRINCIPAL

We have many special programs at Plains Elementary School which enable us to nelp students to learn more, achieve more, and be better able to cope in today's world. I would like to briefly introduce these programs to you.

HEADSTART is a federally funded program which is new at Plains Schools this year. This program is for those students who were four years old before September 1, 1990 and whose parents are able to meet certain income guidelines. Headstart is designed to teach students very basic skills.

CHAPTER I is also a federally funded program and is designed to help those students who score below 49 percentile on the SRA reading test. Help is provided to each qualifying student during regular class time.

The ENGLISH AS A SECOND LANGUAGE (ESL) program is designed to assist those students who have limited English proficiency and is available to all students who speak Spanish, or where Spanish is spoken in the home. Prospective ESL students are tested and placed according to their level of proficiency.

GIFTED/TALENTED is also a new program this year. This is a 'pull out' program designed for students who are gifted or talented in certain areas. Higher level thinking skills are taught using the SAGE curriculum.

SPECIAL EDUCATION is a 'pull out' program designed for those students who have learning difficulties. Students are identified, tested and placed according to their level of achievement.

SPEECH THERAPY also is a 'pull out' program and is designed for those students who need special help to overcome any speech problem they may have.
