The Plains Cowgirls opened the 1990-91 basketball season here last Monday night against a powerful Sundown team. With only four days practice, the Cowgirls played respectively well in a 53-41 loss. Plains outscored their opponents in the second and fourth quarters but strong first and third quarters for the Roughettes were too much to overcome.

Ashlee Winn led in scoring with 12 points in a balanced attack. She was followed by Leslie Patton with 9, Rena McElroy with 6, Melissa Green with 5, Daphne Lowe had 4, Jennifer Fillingim hit 3, and Shannon Squyres made 2.

Shannon led in field goal percentage with 100%, hitting her only attempt. She was followed by Ashlee with 63%. 


