


4-County SES Seeking Gifts For Christmas Distribution

The Tahoka Bulldogs came to Plains Monday night and left with one win and two losses. The 7th and 9th grade girls had big wins with the 8th losing in a close battle.

The 7th grade started slow in their 20-5 win, with a 2-2 tie at the end of the first quarter. In the 2nd and 3rd quarters, however, they outscored their opponents 13-0 in route to their victory. Amanda Koncaba led all scorers with 11 points followed by Valerie Blair with 5. Also scoring was Maria Moreno with 4. Other players on the team are Amber Davis, Heather Mc-Donnell, Becky St. Romain, and Sylvia Tarango.

Tied at the end of the first quarter 9-9, the 8th grade girls fell behind by halftime 17-13. The Wranglers, hampered by foul trouble much of the game, allowed Tahoka to pull away toward the end to win 33-20. Sandy Sainz led in scoring with 8 points followed by Stacy Jones with 5. Misty Willet had 3 and Jennifer Earnest and Belen Coronado each had 2 to round out the scoring. Also playing were Amber Bryan, Amber Massey, Pam Baker, Dusty Beckham, and Mary Ann Gonzales.

The 9th grade, in their 24-15 win, trailed at the end of the first quarter 8-5 but regained the lead 10-9 by halftime. Rhonda Cowart hit a shot at the buzzer to end the third quarter and gave Plains a slim 16-15 lead entering the last stanza. There, the Cowgirl defense shut down Tahoka while scoring 8 of their own points. Heather Bowlin led in scoring with 10 points followed by Rhonda with 8. Mandi Davis scored 4 points and Shandy Willett hit 2 to round out the scoring. Also playing were Jennifer Day and Tammy Lowrey.

Lubbock Trinity Lions came to Plains Friday night and received a rude welcome as the Cowgirls trounced both the Varsity and J.V. teams. The Varsity defeated the visitors 64-30 while the J.V. completely overwhelmed the Lions 76-7.

In the Varsity game, the Cowgirls jumped out to a 14-3 first quarter lead and extended it to 32-11 by halftime. In the lopsided win, Ashlee Winn led a trio of double figure scorers with 17 points. She was followed by Leslie Patton with 14 and Daphne Lowe with 12. Also scoring for Plains were Melissa Green with 7, Jennifer Fillingim with 6, and Shanen Squyres and Jo Lena Powell with 4 each. Jennifer led in field goal percentage with 60% followed by Ashlee with 53%. Daphne led in free throw percentage with 100%, hitting 2 of 2. Jennifer also led in steals with 4 followed by Melissa with 3. Daphne led in rebounds with 12 followed by Leslie and Ashlee with 10 each. Leslie led in assists with 5 followed by Ashlee with 4.

In the J.V. game, the Cowgirls exploded to a 19-0 first quarter lead and

extended it to 39-2 by halftime. They held a commanding 61-4 lead entering the last stanza. All eleven players scored for the J.V. in the win, led by Brandy Lester and Ogla Ramirez with 16 each. They were followed by Shandy Willett with 8, Darce Pierce, Andrea Salas and Amy Crutcher all scored 6, Monica Flores made 5, Rhonda Cowart, Jennifer Day, and Mandi Davis each had 4, and Tammy Lowrey added 1.

The win raised the Varsity's record to 3-3 on the year. They will be playing in the Plains Tournament this weekend starting at 5:30 on Thursday.

Cowboy Varsity basketballers participated Nov. 30-Dec. 2 in the Seagraves Tournament, capturing second place.

In their opener, the Cowboys whipped Roosevelt JV 56-49. Scoring for Plains were Brad Ashburn, 9; Monte Pierce and Layne Morrow, 8 each; Jason Smith, 7 and Dan Rushing, Brian Wilson and Joe Martinez, 6 each.

Plains overcame Stanton 58-48 in their second outing. Plains scorers were Smith, 13; Rushing, 10; Ashburn, 9; Morrow, 8 and Medina, 7.

In the final, the Cowboys lost a heartbreaker, 61-64 to Seagraves. Leading scoring for Plains were Morrow, 20; Rushing, 17 and Medina, 12.

Meeting Shallowater on the hardcourt, the Cowboys were defeated 34-40 by the Mustangs. Leading scorers were Morrow, 13; Rushing, 7 and Freshmen basketballers Dec. 3 fell to Seagraves 43-49. It was their first game of the season.

Scoring for Plains were Jerry Dominguez, 15; Stoney Garland, 11; Scotty Rains, 7; Lenny Morrow, 6; and Jay Rushing and Tracy Bearden, 2 each.

Eighth grade Wranglers whipped Seagraves 37-19 Dec. 3. Picking up points for Plains were Brad McMinn, 14; and Ladd Winn, 10; Lance Cole, 6; Ken McAdams, 5 and Shannon Ward, 2. The victory avenged the Wranglers only loss last year when Seagraves marred their record.

Seventh grade Wranglers lost to Seagraves 31-52. Scoring for Plains were Johnny Davis, 10; Jamey Garland, 8; Chase Clanahan and Jason Robertson, 4 each; Kirk Parrish, 3 and Chris Payne, 2.
