E. M. Spence, 71, father of C. T. Spence, superintendent of Carbon High School, passed away Sunday at 2:45 p. m. in Hendrick Memorial Hospital, Abilene, after suffering a heart attack about a week previously. Funeral service was held Tuesday at 2:30 p. m. in Elliott Funeral Chapel followed by interment in an Abilene cemetery.

Mr. and Mrs. Spence had lived in Carbon prior to moving to Abilene 12 years ago where he was employed by a cream Dairies before his retirement.

JUSTICE FAMILY, WINNERS OF CofC AWARD, LEADS BUSY LIFE

Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Justice and their three children, Madge, Harry Glenn, Jr., and Nancy, were named the winners of the outstanding farm family award at the Cisco Chamber of Commerce banquet held in the Junior College gymnasium April 11. A. Z. Myrick, chairman of the agriculture committee of the Chamber of Commerce, made the presentation.

The Justice family, who lives in a comfortable and attractive modern home four miles east of Carbon, is active in all phases of civic, social and religious life of their community.

Mr. Justice is now serving his second term as president of the Eastland County Farm Bureau and Mrs. Justice serves as a director and news reporter for that organization.

Extension Service Gives Hints On Pond Construction

COLLEGE STATION — Thinking about building a farm pond? If you are, some careful planning is in order, says W. L. Ulich, extension agricultural engineer.

Ulich says the first step is to decide what the pond is going to be used for — irrigation, livestock water, fishing, recreation, etc. If it is to be used for irrigation, and you have a choice of sites, locate the pond as near as possible to the fields to be irrigated. If the pond is to furnish livestock water, put it where the animals make maximum use of it.

The watershed for the pond should be large enough to supply your needs and keep water in the pond during dry periods, but not so large that it will create flood hazards during heavy rains. Watersheds may vary from 10 to 100 or more acres, depending on the rainfall and how much water you want to store. If possible select a watershed covered with grass or woodland. If you cultivate part of the watershed, however, be sure to use erosion control measures so heavy rains won't wash a lot of silt into the

pond, Ulich continues.

After you have selected a tentative site, test the soil to make sure it will hold water. The best soil is deep to bedrock, and is heavy, with a lot of clay. Try to avoid sites with rock outcroppings along the bank, or with rock or shale ledges near the surface. Also stay away from sites having sand, gravel, peat or marl through which the water might seep. If you build the pond on a shallow soil, don't borrow the dirt from the fill from the pond area itself, but get it from some other area.

Ask an SCS technician to survey the pond site and prepare plans for the dam. After this is done, get two or more good farm contractors to bid on the project. Be sure you get a reliable man to do the work, as the earth has to be well packed and the overflow part of the spillways must be properly installed. If you expect to get cost-share payments, the structure and pond must be approved and meet ASC specifications, Ulich concludes.

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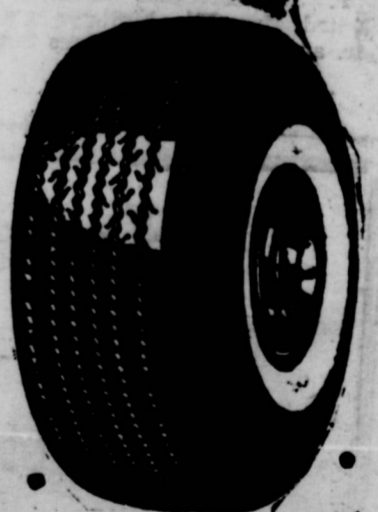

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VETS QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

Q — I hear that men being discharged from military service have a one-year deadline from date of discharge for applying for VA dental treatment. Is this true?

A — Generally, yes, for VA outpatient dental treatment, for which the dental condition must be service-connected. But there are a number of exceptions. These include veterans drawing compensation for dental conditions,

those whose dental conditions resulted from service injuries, and former prisoners of war.

Q — Can I get transportation to a VA domiciliary?

A — As a rule, transportation to a VA domiciliary at Government expense is provided only for the initial admission.

SOCIAL SECURITY TRUST FUND BENEFITS EXCEED EXPENSES

Income to the two trust funds out of which social security benefits are paid exceeded outgo by \$648 million during the year ending December 31, 1960, according to R. B. Tuley, Jr., district manager of the Abilene social security office.

"The 21st annual report of the trustees of the two funds also gives fiscal and calendar year estimates for the following five years, 15 years, and for the long-range future up until the year 2025," Mr. Tuley said.

These figures, based on provisions of the present social security law, show that income be sufficient to cover all outlays for benefits.

Income to the old-age and survivors insurance trust fund during the calendar year 1960 exceeded outgo by \$184 million. Total disbursements for the year amounted to just under \$11.2 billion. Total income for the year was close to \$11.4 billion. At the end of the year, the fund stood at \$20,324,000,000.

Total income to the disability insurance trust fund during 1960 exceeded outgo by \$464 million. Disbursements totaled \$604 million, and income totaled \$1,068 million. At the end of the year, assets of this fund totaled \$2,289,000,000.

"The estimates for the five

years following 1960," Tuley said, "show that under present law, total income to the old-age and survivors insurance trust fund over the 5-year period will amount to \$70.8 billion." Total outgo during that period will come to \$67.0 billion with a total excess of income over outgo amounting to \$3.8 billion. At the end of December 1965, the assets of the old-age and survivors insurance trust fund are expected to amount to \$24.2 billion.

During these same five years, the assets of the disability insurance trust fund are expected to grow from the present \$2.3 billion to 2.7 billion. Total income over the five years is estimated at \$5.9 billion and total disbursements at \$5.5 billion.

"By the end of December 1970," Tuley said, "the trustees estimate that the old-age and survivors insurance trust fund will have grown to \$46.6 billion. On the same date, disability insurance trust fund assets are estimated at \$4.1 billion."

"Persons desiring more detailed data are invited to write me at Box 5168, Abilene, and ask for booklet number 36 Fact About the OASDI Trust Funds; OASDI is short for Old-Age, Survivors, and Disability Insurance," Tuley concluded.

Spring Is Here: Check Snakes, Birds And Boats

AUSTIN — Spring is here in full bloom. Birds are pairing off, snakes are coming out and boats are being put into the water.

These things are of special significance to the Game and Fish Commission, according to Howard Dodgen, executive secretary.

Concerning birds, he suggests every person who is interested in bird life get a copy of the FIELD GUIDE TO THE BIRDS OF TEXAS by Roger Tory Peterson, who prepared this handbook especially for bird lovers of Texas. It contains pictures and descriptions of 592 Texas birds. There are also many color plates. These books are available now from the Game Commission in Austin at the publication price of \$3 each, postpaid. Fewer than 7,000 copies remain of the first printing of 25,000. After they are gone, the book will be published again for retail trade at \$4.95 each. If you are interested in a book on THE MAMMALS OF TEXAS, the Commission has one for 50 cents postpaid. It was prepared by Dr. William Davis of Texas A&M College.

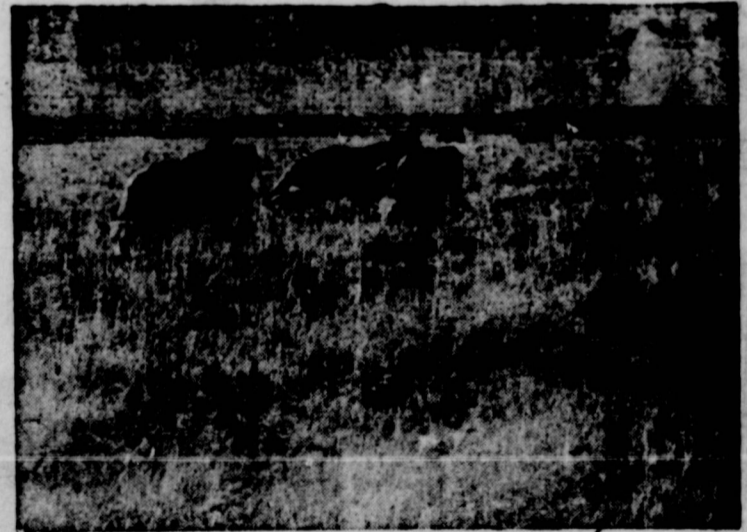
