Base Fertilizer Decisions On An Annual Soil Test

It's not too late to test soil samples to determine fertilizer needs for spring, says Kirk Lewis, Yoakum County Extension Agent, Agriculture.

When farmers look for ways to reduce production costs, they often consider reducing fertilizer usage. But such a practice may result in yields too low to cover production costs.

A soil test may indicate that fertilizer is needed to attain a desired yield goal. Fertilizing at recommended rates will increase the probability of boosting yields enough to more than pay for the fertilizer and provide some margin of profit.

On the other hand, savings can also result when a soil test shows adequate levels of nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium or other necessary nutrients.

In either case, following soil test recommendations would effectively reduce the per-unit production costs and increase the chances of making a profit.

The Texas A&M Soil Testing Laboratories at College Station and Lubbock routinely analyze soils to determine the amount of available nitrogen present in the soil. This analysis is especially important to determine carryover nitrogen following a dry, or low-yield year. A reduced nitrogen recommendation results in savings without sacrificing yield.

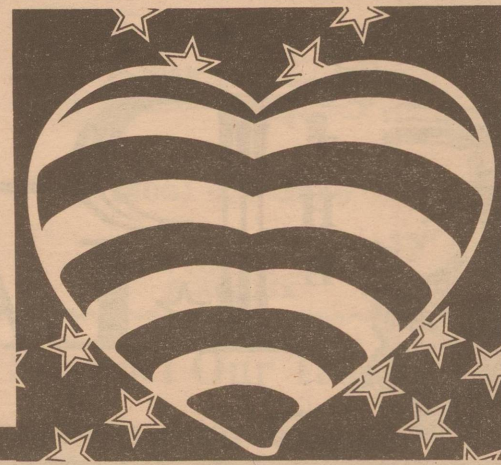
There is no substitute for knowing a soil's nutrient balance when planning for spring crops. Testing can provide an economical means of determining a soil's nutrient status and can help a farmer make those major economic decisions with greater confidence.

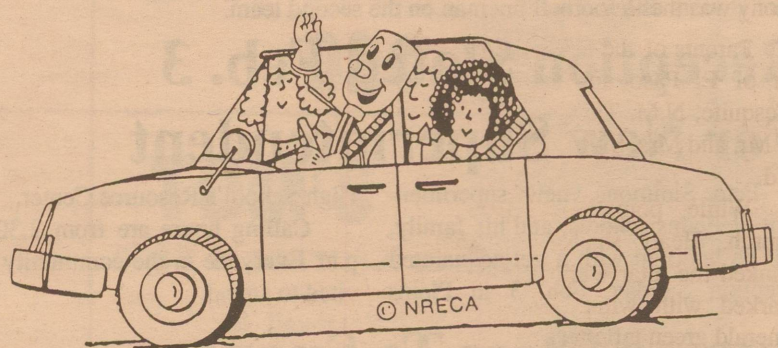

The Junior High Wrangler girls played three games in the Sundown Tournament this past weekend. In the first round they were defeated 34-24 by Meadow. Then they soundly defeated O'Donnell 29-12 in the next round before losing in a close battle 35-31 to Sundown for Consolation.

Turnovers proved to be the big difference in the first game as Meadow's full court press forced numerous turnovers that resulted in easy baskets. Misty Willett led in scoring with 13 points followed by Stacy Jones with 6. Belen Coronado and Jennifer Earnest each had 2 points and Sandy Sainz rounded out the scoring with a free throw.

In the win over O'Donnell, the Wranglers actually trailed at the end of the first stanza 3-4 before regaining the lead 12-8 by halftime. Then an explosive third quarter, where Plains outscored O'Donnell 10-0, pushed their lead to 22-8. Misty again led in scoring with 16 points followed by Jennifer with 6. Dusty Beckham had 3 points followed by Belen, Amber Bryan and Sandy with 2 each.

The Wranglers then faced the tournament host, Sundown, for the Consolation trophy. Plains jumped out to a 14-5 first quarter lead before Sundown cut the lead to 3, 20-17, entering the third quarter. The second half was a costly two quarters for the Wranglers as two starters were claimed by fouls and the Roughettes were able to pull out the win. 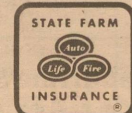

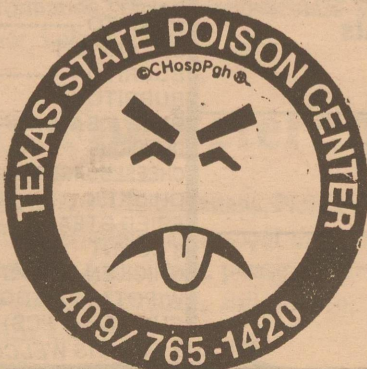

She was born Feb. 15, 1895 in Bridgeport and was married to H.D. Heath Jr. Oct. 31, 1919 in Bridgeport.

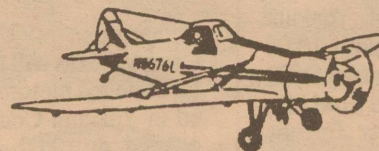
They moved to West Texas to farm and ranch. She taught school in Brownfield and Gomez before moving to Plains.

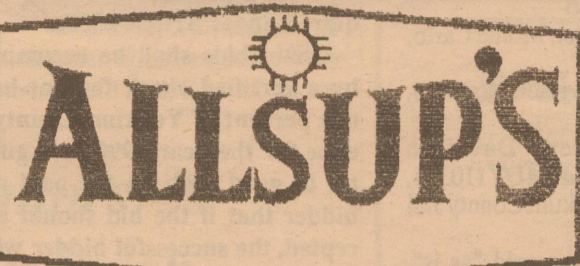
