Miss Poe was among the first American women to see in 1949 the disaster and ruin brought about by these dic-tators. tators.

In 1951, Miss Poe toured Con-tinental Europe, and has spent three months of every year since that time touring countries all over the world. Her travels in-

Junior College **Making Plans For** Summer Session


