Texas Health Department Offers Recycling Information

The Texas Department of Health (TDH) has begun a toll-free information service to help ease the state's growing glut of reusable trash. Now, anyone needing advice or materials about recycling programs can call 1-800-458-9796 to reach the Solid Waste/Recycling Clearinghouse for help.

T.A. Outlaw, Chief of the TDH Bureau of Solid Waste Management, said, "A lot of concerned people and communities are seriously interested in recycling their trash. But until now,

there has not been a central source of information on how to go about it."

Since February, the information line staff has answered the public's questions about markets for recyclable materials, and offered guidance on starting recycling programs. The staff also distributes "how to" posters and brochures, and makes referrals to existing programs.

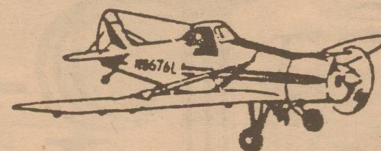

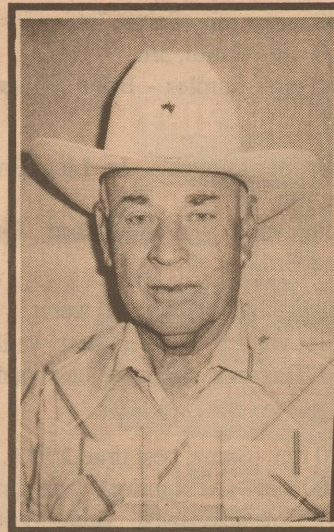

He then lost to Christiansen in the quarter-finals 6-1, 6-2.
