School Board Schedules Budget, Tax Hearings

School board members in regular session Tuesday evening set Aug. 12 for a public hearing on the budget adoption and Aug. 26 for a tax rate hearing. A meeting to adopt the tax rate was scheduled for Sept. 2.

Inoculation Fees Increase By \$1

The South Plains Public Health District announced recent changes in immunization fees.

Beginning July 15, there was an extra \$1 charge for each additional vaccination after the first immunization.

For example, the first immunization will cost \$3, two vaccinations is \$4, three inoculations will cost \$5, and four injections will cost \$6.

Services will not be denied to anyone because of the inability to pay.

In other action, trustees approved motions to purchase student insurance from Baker Agency of Ostego, Mi. and to conduct a joint election with the county amendment elections.

The 1990-91 school budget was amended in the amount of \$422,400 to be expended for areas of transportation, cafeteria, instructional supplies, technology and property.

Resignation of elementary principal Larry Devitt was accepted. Tess Deen Webb was employed on the professional staff.

Monthly bills were approved for payment and financial reports given for general operating, cafeteria and tax areas. Announcement was made by Brenda Canada on updating the district's technology equipment and programs.

An organizational meeting of the county education district held July 1 was reported.

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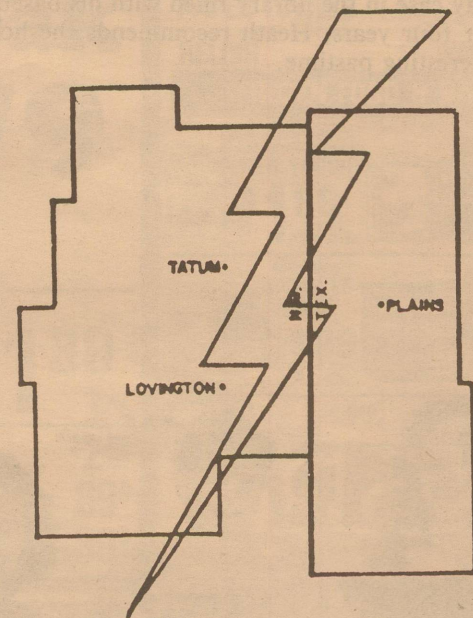

Gov. Ann Richards Announces Project To Help Cotton Gins

Texas Governor Ann Richards announced a new agricultural energy project to help Texas cotton ginner lower energy costs, as well as reduce air pollution. The project will be located at the Terry County Co-op Gin in Brownfield, on the Texas High Plains, the most highly concentrated cotton producing region in the world.

"Texas accounts for almost one-third of our country's annual cotton production, and we lead the nation in the number of operating cotton gins," said Governor Richards. "This new energy-saving technology can assist our cotton industry in keeping costs down, and it will help clean our air."

Texas Tech University will develop the project, under contract with the Governor's Energy Office. The new technology, which will eliminate the pneumatic handling of cotton within the gin, will not only yield annual savings of as much as \$90,000 in

Next council meeting will be Sept. 3. The council will sponsor a retirement party for Mary Dale Forbus in August.

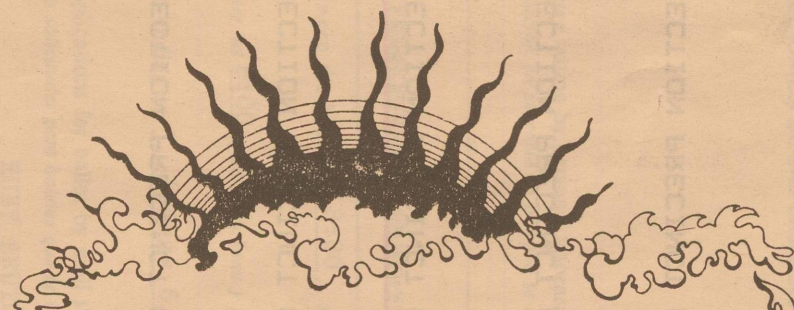
Art Association Makes Show Plans

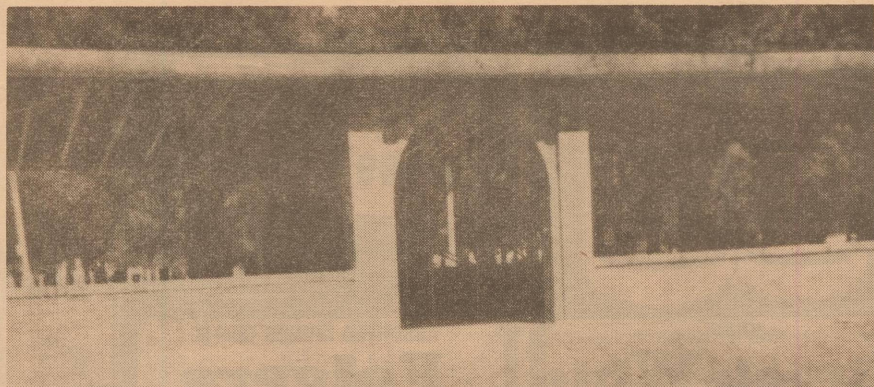
