Purpose of the school was to assist food service employees with safe food handling techniques.


Food Handling Schools are held regularly in one of the five counties making up the South Plains Public Health District; Terry, Hockley, Gaines, Yoakum and Dawson.





The Cowgirls traveled to Seminole this weekend for a dual match with the Maidens and Lamesa. They will host Denver City, Tuesday, Oct. 8.






