#### Abstract

Country roads in precinct four are now numbered and registered providing a system that will be of great benefit to the 911 emergency phone network.

Commissioner Macky McWhirter asks residents in precinct four to become familiar with their identifying home address and have it handy by their telephone in case of emergency. (Example: two miles north of intersection of 409-4B)

North-south roads are numbered such as $409,410,411$, etc. East-west roads are lettered, 4A, 4B, 4C, etc.
