Plains 4-H'ers Attend Workshop

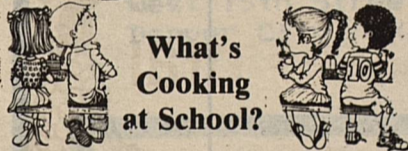
Eighteen members of Plains 4-H Club met Saturday for an all-day foods workshop.

Hutson, PGP and member of Chapters Under Dispensation committee and Worthy Patron; Ellen Bearden, member of Transportation and Mileage Committee, all of the Grand Chapter of Texas, OES.

Also from Brownfield were Sarah Rozean, WM; Edna Blankenship, PM; Frances Cross, PM; Pat Moore, conductress; and Gay and Ethel Price, members. Attending from Denver City were Cecil and Peggy Bickley, PP and PM; Lela Locklin, PM; Esther Holland, PM; Virginia Holland, PM and Kathy Smiley, WM.

A birthday card with a gift of \$100 from Plains' first Worthy Matron Ruby Mabry, was displayed. Mrs. Mabry, a charter member now living in Hartshorne, Ok. continues dual membership with Plains. She was present.

Red roses were presented to the four charter members attending, Mrs. Mabry, Wilma Powell, third Worthy Matron; Muriel Cross, fifth WM and Mary Jo St. Romain, twelfth WM. Fifty year certificates were presented to Mmes. Mabry and Cross and Jack and Florine Hayes, charter members of Denver City Chapter 863.

Louise Fitzgerald gave the history of the Plains Chapter which was instituted May 10, 1941. Members were Bernice Bartlett, Ludie Bedford, Della Beane, J.M. Cheek, Lucretia Cheek, Annette Cleveland, G.W. Cleveland, Roberta Elliott, Roy Elliott, Olga Hayhurst, Dovie Heath, Lillian Horn, Lillian Luna, Ruth Mabry, Kathryn Morris, Wilma Powell, Floye Robertson and Mary Jo St. Romain. Members of other chapters also attended.

Ida Bruton, Worthy Matron of Brownfield's Chapter presented the Plains Chapter a set of jewels which are still used today. The constituency of Plains Chapter was held Nov. 1, 1941 and charter 862 was granted by the Grand Chapter of Texas.

The first Masonic building in Plains was located on the south side of Highway 380, across from the courthouse. The building was approximately 20x30 feet, above the Post Office and had served as the old blank building in Gomez before being moved to Plains. Members had to climb steep, rickety steps on the outside of the building, walk across the roof of the Post Office to the door. It was very hot in the summer and cold in winter.

In 1942, Mrs. M.E. Dumas was hired to clean the hall for fifty cents each time it was cleaned.

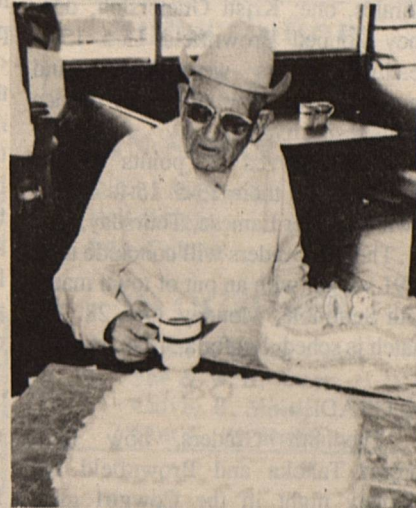
Two families in the chapter are third generation members, the Joe Cheek and Addie McGinty families.

Special dispensation to move to the new Masonic Hall at 812 Avenue E was granted Nov. 7, 1955.

Entertainment was provided by Leonard Ellington and B.F. Hutson who presented a medley of "Golden Favorites".

"Embrace the Stars" was read by the Worthy Matron before the ritualistic closing. Following the closing, everyone joined hands encircling the altar and gave the Mizpah benediction.

Refreshments were served and everyone enjoyed reminiscing and looking at the yearbooks of every Worthy Matron from 1941 to 1991, a collection belonging to Louise Fitzgerald.

1. When possible, purchase appliances and equipment with built in surge suppressors, interruptible power inputs and reset capability.
2. Install external surge protection devices and interruptible power supply systems at crucial outlets in your home or shop.
3. Deplug and discontinue operation of unprotected equipment during an electrical storm or severe windstorm.
4. Deplug all non-essential equipment when not in use or when you leave for a vacation.
5. Use backup power systems with computers and other essential electronics to prevent outages.

Rudd Favors Proposition 8

State Rep. Jim Rudd is a member of the statewide, bi-partisan steering committee to promote and encourage passage of Proposition 8 on the Nov. 5 ballot, State Treasurer Kay Bailey Hutchison announced.

Proposition 8 would require that future state debt-authorizing measures include a statement regarding the purpose of debt, amount of debt created and source of repayment.

"Having a person of Jim's caliber on this steering committee will go a long way in ensuring passage of Proposition 8," said Mrs. Hutchison, who has made state debt management a top priority of her administration. "A 'yes' vote for Proposition 8 is a vote

for good government, straightforward language and 'truth in advertising'."

Under Proposition 8, there is no change in the constitutional requirements for state debt authorization, Mrs. Hutchison said. The state constitution would continue to require a two-thirds majority vote in each house of the Legislature and a majority vote of the people for all general obligation debt.

"The most important element of Proposition 8 is that its passage would ensure that all future state debt issues are presented to voters in clear, concise language. The crux of this issue is clarity," she said. "Texans deserve no less than what Proposition 8 would require."

County To Crack Down On Hot Check Writers

Hot check writers should take notice that Yoakum County is waging war. Criminal District Attorney Linda Lowrey and Justices of the Peace Melba Crutcher and Esther Holland picked up new information in the war against hot checks at their annual "school" recently.

Merchants have been mailed memos concerning new procedures. In order to prosecute such cases, the court must now have the name of the person in the business establishment who took the check, the check writer's driver's license number or the identification card number of the person passing the check.

According to Mrs. Lowrey, the court can no longer issue a warrant on cases that do not have proper information.

Businesses have also been mailed complaint forms. "Although the new procedure is inconvenient for all of us," states Mrs. Lowrey, "it may cut down on your losses from forged items because an individual who must present full identification is less likely to try to pass a forged check. The new procedures will also make it very unlikely that Yoakum County, the peace Justices or I will ever be sued for filing a case without sufficient probable cause."

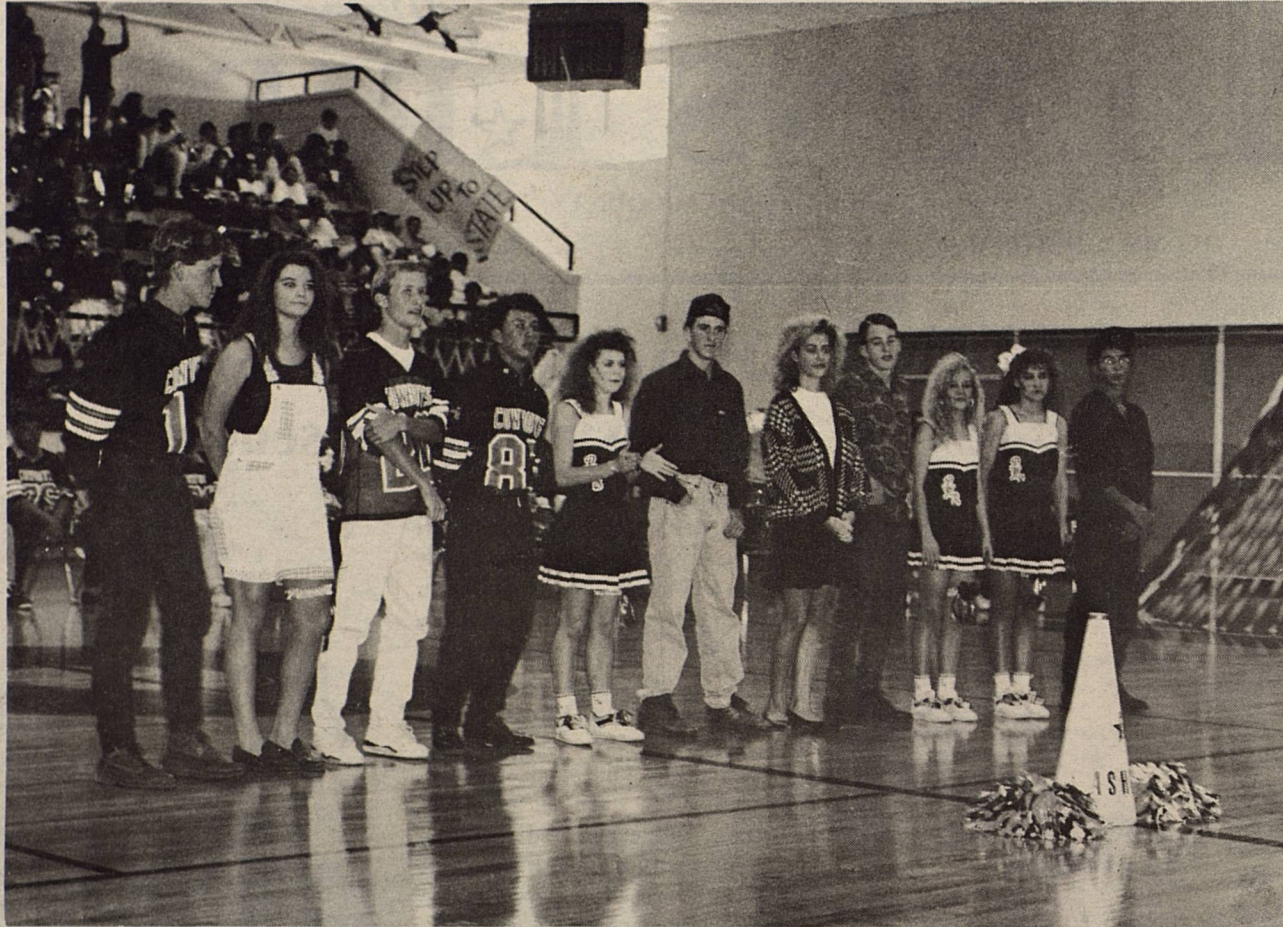
