State Treasurer Says 'Vote Yes On 8'

Would you buy a home without it costs and how long it's going to take to pay off your mortgage?

Of course not! The same common sense guidelines and requirements that apply to buying a home, a car - or anything for that matter - should apply to state government when it comes to authorizing debt.

For that reason, I am vigorously endorsing passage of Proposition 8 on the Nov. 5 constitutional amendment election ballot. Passage of this amendment would ensure that future ballot propositions calling for the issuance of state-backed bonds clearly state the amount of the issue, the purpose for which the money will be used and the method and source of repay-

Proposition 8, which I call the 'truth in advertising' proposal, is a major step in the direction of good government. Texans deserve no less from their elected representatives than what Proposition 8 would require.

As state treasurer, I have pushed for a state debt policy and have made debt management one of my top priorities. At the heart of this policy is fostering a relationship of honesty and integrity with Texas voters.

Under the current system, Texans knowing what it looks like, how much are asked over and over again to approve huge amounts of debt without knowing how much it is, what it's for and how it will be repaid.

> A classic example of this took place on Aug. 10 when voters were presented with a constitutional amendment that would have authorized the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide educational loans for

> This statewide proposition, which would have provided low-interest college loans for students to attend our colleges and universities, did not reveal the amount of bonds voters were being asked to consider. The amount was up to \$300 million.

> I am convinced this proposition was rejected in August because the ballot language was confusing, the amount was not stated and voters ultimately were skeptical about what they were being asked to approve.

> This same amendment, Proposition 13, will be reconsidered by voters in the Nov. 5 election. This time the amount of the bonds will be clearly stated. I favor the issuance of these state bonds to fund the Hinson-Hazelwood College Student Loan Program. Beginning in 1993, the Texas Higher

Education Coordinating Board says the entire program, including administrative costs, will be self-supporting.

This is not a new issue. Two years ago, voters approved nearly \$2 billion in state debt under the same confusing circumstances.

In that 1989 constitutional amendment election, one proposition read, "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the recovery and further development of the state's economy, with goals of increasing job opportunities and other benefits for Texas residents, through state financing of the development and production of Texas products and businesses."

That proposition's passage led to the authorization of \$75 million in

On Nov. 5, we have the opportunity to make it mandatory that all future debt-authorizing measures be stated in plain English.

Passage of Proposition 8 will ensure that we never again are asked to by the State Legislature to support the issuance of state debt without knowing its future costs and from what source it will be paid. It would place the state under the same standards that now apply to local government entities.

Passage of Proposition 8 will help solve part of the problem Texas voters have faced in the past. But even with this policy in place, there still needs to be legislative leadership to assure that all ballot propositions - not just debt issues - be stated clearly.

It is imperative that we take this first step in the direction of good government and public policy by supporting and voting for Proposition 8. The outcome of this proposition and the other 12 issues on the Nov. 5 ballot could have a tremendous impact on the future of Texas.



Fifth grade Junior Girl Scouts treated the fifth grade to a Halloween party Saturday evening in the home of David and Jerri Lollar.






